have been notable exceptions in having sunny summer weather. In fact in Los Angeles and vicinity the mercury has been in the hundreds.

The traditional 10 days of rain after a rainy St. Swithun's Day has run into 12 in New York and the weather bureau gave no hope of relief for many of the deluged sections either today or tomorrow.

While rainfall has not been continuous throughout the period, there has been enough to damage cotton crops in the south and endanger hundreds of acres of grain in the shock or ready for reaping in the midwest. The corn crop, however, has benefited and the witness is said to have put western winter wheat fields into excellent condition for plowing.

The protracted spell of rain has been fairly general east of the Mississippi. The rain has usually been accompanied by disagreeable humidity and there has been considerable fog at Atlantic coast ports.

FRENCH ATTITUDE LOSES SUPPORTER OF WORLD COURT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)—BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 26.—In explaining his changed attitude toward the world court, expressed in his speech at the Republican state convention at Boise yesterday, United States Senator Frank R. Gooding declared that he is now opposed to the court or other alliance with European powers, because of the attitude of the French people toward the United States on the World War debt.

"Changed conditions have caused me to change my opinion on the world court," said Senator Gooding, who accepted renomination for the United States senatorship on a platform irrevocably opposed to the court or other alliances with European powers. "Had I the opportunity to vote over again, it would be against the world court." Purported connection of the court with the league of nations was given as another reason.
