STANFIELD IN OPEN AGAINST FRED STEIWER

(Continued from page 1.)

Haney and Mr. Steiwer at the polls November 2. In its editorial above quoted, the Oregonian expresses the fear that Mr. Haney's election would be heralded throughout this wide country as a rebuke by Republican Oregon of Calvin Coolidge. If that be true, then by the same token—since the Oregonian admits that few senators have ever been given a more practical expression of trust by a president in their loyalty to party and administration, than was accorded myself by President Coolidge when he signed my O. and C. tax refund bill—it follows that my own election over Mr. Haney (and over Mr. Steiwer, too, for that matter, since he is unknown nationally) would be heralded throughout the country as a distant endorsement of Calvin Coolidge.

Believes U'fien's Charge
"As regards the investigation that followed the perpetration of the 'yellow ticket' outrage, I believe Mr. Haney's sworn statement of account is true and correct as filed July 17 with the secretary of state. Mr. Steiwer and his treasurer, Mr. Latourette, were informed of Mr. Haney's account as early as July 24. Both men are lawyers. Either or both of them could have sued Mr. Haney for libel and in addition have had him indicted for criminal libel and Haney would have been obliged to prove the truth of his charge or be convicted. At least one of the four resulting suits could have been a complete vindication for both Steiwer and Latourette. Neither of the latter made any denial or explanation until after Mr. U'fien filed his complaint with the secretary of state. Their failure to sue Haney and thereby speedily obtain a judicial investigation and decision, added to the evidence I have been corroborating Mr. Haney's charges me beyond a reasonable doubt that his statement above mentioned is true.

Says Steiwer Untruthful
"Speaking as the Oregonian candidate, Mr. Steiwer, on April 6, delivered an address over the Oregonian radio wherein he said: 'It becomes my duty to state adequate reasons why Senator Stanfield should not be nominated.' These alleged reasons comprised a tirade of untruths, a mass of prolixities such as has probably never been paralleled in any senatorial

"Mr. Steiwer branded me as the most conspicuous senatorial traitor in history, when he knew full well that my absence from the senate were occasioned and necessitated by the opportunity to render highly important services to our state and country. If he did not know the facts concerning these absences from roll call, he could easily have ascertained them before he made his unparliamentary attacks upon me. He could have readily determined that many senators were absent from roll call more frequently than I was and, above all, he could have ascertained himself of the fact that the vitally important work on which I was engaged and which occasioned my absence, was fully approved by President Harding and Secretary Mellon.

"In his radio address he said, further, 'There is no state in the union that has more at stake at the national capital than Oregon; the welfare of Oregon demands constant care and jealous guardianship. With this I agree, only Mr. Steiwer should have added: 'And also demands the ability properly to propose and secure favorable consideration for constructive relief and federal aid.'

Steiwer's Ability Unproven
"Notwithstanding Mr. Steiwer has reached middle life, there is nothing in his record, to my knowledge, which demonstrates that he possesses the ability to initiate, construct and execute projects of weighty import in a progressive manner. Indeed, I am not aware that he has any record whatever along this line. During the primary he did, however, demonstrate the possession of a distinct talent for dissimulation and faking, as was most startlingly evidenced his his open bid for the anti-union league endorsement.

"Another art of Mr. Steiwer, which showed his ability to accommodate his views to changing conditions was his stand on the direct primary. Rather late in the recent campaign he made loud acclamations of his loyalty to that statute. After the campaign was over, when the contest between the advocates of the direct primary, led by Charles E. Haney, and the advocates of the convention system, led by Jack Day and the Oregonian, came to a head at the election of the republican county central committee, Mr. Steiwer switched his support to Jack Day, whose original followers ran under the slogan, 'favoring recommending candidates by convention.'

Oregonian Assailed
"Leaving Mr. Steiwer for the present and passing to his sponsor, the Oregonian, I cannot refrain from expressing my opinion of the manner in which that newspaper exerted its great influence to hinder the passage of the O. and C. land grant tax refund bill.

"At a time when I was excelling every other, as chairman of the senate committee on public lands, to secure the enactment of this legislation bringing \$7,772,000, as the equivalent to back taxes, to Oregon, the Oregonian went out of its way to attempt to prevent the 15 counties interested from sending representatives to Washington to present their cause. This attempt, Oregonian, which unfortunately failed of accomplishment, was designed to rob me during the primary campaign of whatever credit might have been accorded me by the citizens of Oregon for my efforts to get this difficult piece of legislation successfully through the senate.

"On April 23 last again, as 'Big 15' the Oregonian, apparently with the deliberate intention of deceiving its readers, published campaign cartoons which represented me as neglecting my senatorial duties and failing to render aid to the Oregon congressional delegation in matters of the highest importance to the state.

Cartoons Alleged Lies
"One of these lying cartoons conveyed the thought that I was refusing to help my colleague, Senator McNary, in his efforts to advance and protect the welfare of Oregon's shipping and port interests. The other cartoon pictured me as being the only absentee while the other members of our delegation were out to perform important public work, though my assistants, these lying cartoons, which allow the depths to which a great newspaper can descend when it forgets its duty, to its

readers in the effort to put over a hand picked candidate on them, were both published when 'the Oregonian knew that I was not only present and on the job in Washington, but was engaged in the most important work of my public career in behalf of the state. "In the foregoing I have touched upon just a few of the acts of the Oregonian and its senatorial nominee, which, in my opinion, clearly demonstrates that grossly unfair methods were employed by both of them to help bring about by defeat in the primary campaign by deceiving the electorate.

"In view of the unfair methods which I consider Mr. Steiwer made use of during the primary campaign, it would be inconsistent and impossible for me to endorse Mr. Steiwer's candidacy at this fall election, and I therefore, at this time withdraw my proffer of support given at a time when I was not apprised of the facts showing his conduct during the primary."

DEMAND FOR WOOL GROWS STRONGER

BOSTON, Aug. 27.—The Commercial Bulletin tomorrow will say: "There is a more general and a keener demand for wool, with a consequent slight strengthening in values perhaps 2c for the week. Medium wools are relatively keenest at the moment but there is a recently good demand for the finer qualities. Mostly the call is for domestic wools, but some interest is shown also in foreign lines. "Not only do the reports from the goods market indicate a much better tone with substantial sales of repeat orders on heavy weight

season goods but the business in markets for raw materials reflect the improvement in goods quite strongly. "The foreign markets are in better shape than they have been for a long while. With the miners going back to work in England in large numbers, the industrial situation in Great Britain is much better and this has been reflected in better business in wool and wool textiles with higher prices prevailing.
