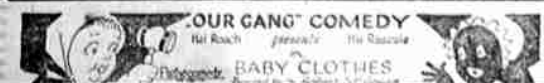

TRANS-ATLANTIC
FLIGHT SQUABBLE
FINALLY AT END

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—Fricition reported to be threatening Rene Fonck's trans-Atlantic airplane flight was described as "all cleared up" today by Lieutenant Harold E. Hartney, vice president and general manager of the Argonauts, the company backing the flight.

His statement came in response to a published newspaper story that an administrative discord threatened to postpone the flight indefinitely and to cause the removal of the French ace as commander, in favor of an all-American crew.

Colonel Hartney said there were some disagreements about ten days ago but they had been satisfactorily adjusted.

"The non-stop trans-Atlantic flight to be attempted by the Shirsby plane S-35 sometime in September is still on, as originally contemplated," he said, "and Captain Fonck and Lieutenant

Shody will be the ones to make it." "The flight is impossible without me," said Captain Rene Fonck, when asked for a statement about the possibility of change of personnel.
