SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—After being chased by a traffic officer for 20 miles, M. L. Lennon, Portland barber, crawled from beneath the wreck of a stolen automobile here before daylight this morning and surrendered to C. H. Libby, a traffic policeman. The automobile is the property of E. C. Holt, Portland.

Lennon, coming from Eugene, and accompanied by Miss B. Fleckes, passed through Jefferson at 3:10 o'clock this morning at 60 miles an hour, according to the officer.

Lennon drove the car in a zig-zag course through Salem and in attempting to make a turn at 55 miles an hour, the car turned over. To avoid running into the wreck, Officer Libby, who was in pursuit, swerved his cycle, hit a curb and was thrown. Lennon started to run, but Libby pulled down on him with a gun and was captured.

Neither Lennon or the girl was hurt in the wreck. Lennon admitted stealing the car, according to the police and indicated that it most of the time since the date of the theft.
