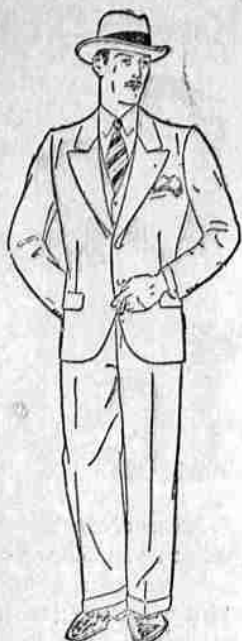

ENGLAND IS NOW SEARCHING FOR D'AUTREMONTS

LONDON, Aug. 30.—Scotland Yard operatives have begun a nationwide search for three robbers named D'Autremont, who are wanted in the United States for the alleged murder of four persons in connection with the holding up of a train near Siskiyou, Oregon, in 1923.

The operatives are being spurred on by an offer of \$15,000 as a reward for the capture of the men by the United States government and a tip that the men are hiding in England.

Two of the brothers, Roy and Ray, are 26 year old twins. The other brother is Hugh, the youngest of them and is said to have been leader in the robbery. He is said to be a graduate of a New Mexico high school.

A Trip to The Umpqua Valley In The Year 1826

Being the diary of David Douglas, Botanist, a Member of one of the first parties of white men to venture into the Unexplored Umpqua Country.

In 1826 a young Scotch botanist, David Douglas, sent out by the Royal Horticultural Society of London, made a visit to the Umpqua country in search of the sugar maple, which he had been directed to find when an Indian at Port Vancouver exhibited seeds of it. Douglas was with the Mead party, which, under orders from the Hudson Bay company, made one of the first expeditions into southern Oregon. It was from this young botanist that the Douglas fir received its name, as it was the first to bring it to the attention of the botanists of the world. This is done for the purpose of urging the deer to frequent certain parts to feed which they leave unburned, and of course they are easily killed. Others say that it is done in order that they might the better find wild honey and grasshoppers, which both serve as articles of winter food. I walked along the low hills but found nothing different. Saw four large bucks. Reached the camp at four o'clock, cleaned my gun, had supper and went out with a hunting party. One female and her kid were killed by the Indian hunter. Mr. McLeod passed a ball through the right shoulder of one and after wards had two other shots fired with effect, but not mortal. Notwithstanding, although to appearance seriously injured, she made her escape. Returned shortly after dark.

Sunday, October 1st.—Heavy dew during the night; clear and pleasant during the day, with a refreshing westerly wind. Started at the usual hour and continued our route. Had to make a circuitous turn east of south, south, and southwest to avoid two deep ravines that were impassable for the horses. Walker the greater part of the day, but found nothing new. On my way observed some trees of "Arbutus laurifolia," 15 inches to 2 feet in diameter, 30 to 45 feet high, much larger than any that I saw last year on the Columbia; fruit nearly ripe; soil deep rich black loam, near springs, and on a gravelly bottom. Passed at noon some Indians digging the roots of "Rhizophora Quamash" in one of the low plains. Eglis much larger than any I have seen, except those on Lewis and Clarke's river. Camped at four on the banks of a small stream which falls into the Multnomah three miles to the east. In the like journey Sunday is known only by the people changing their linen, and such of them as can read in the evenings peruse religious tracts, &c. &c. were more agreeable to the Church of Rome. In the dusk I walked out with my gun. I had not gone more than half a mile from the camp when I observed a very large wasp, which had been attached to a tree, lying on the plain where the ground was perfectly bare and the herbage burned, taken there by the bears. At the same time John Kennedy, one of the hunters, was out after deer and saw a very large male grizzly bear enter a small hummock of low brushwood two hundred yards from me. Being too dark, we thought it prudent to leave him unmolested; perhaps we may stand a chance of seeing him on our way. Marched eighteen miles.

Monday, 2nd.—Morning, heavy dew and chilly; clear and fine during the day; sheet lightning in the evening. Early in the morning a small doe was killed near our encampment and was placed on one of the horses. As we passed on the track, I went in search of the large bear seen last night but could see nothing of him. At noon passed two deep gulches which gave much trouble, the banks being thickly covered with brushwood, willow, dogwood, and low alder. Course nearly due south, inclining to the west. Country same as yesterday, rich, but not yet a vestige of green herbage; all burned except in the deep ravines. Covered with "Rosa aquifolia," "Solidago," and a strong species of "Carduus." On the elevated grounds where the soil is a deep rich loam, 3 to 7 feet thick on a clay bottom, some of the oaks measure 18 to 24 feet in circumference, but rarely exceeding 30 feet of trunk in height. On the less fertile places, on a gravelly dry bottom, where the trees are scrubby and small, a curious species of "Vacuum," (mistletoe) with ovate leaves, is found abundantly. I recollect Dr. Hooker asking me if I ever saw it on oak in Scotland, which I never did. As no place could be found suitable for fodder for the horses, we had to travel till four o'clock, when we camped at a low point of land near a woody rivulet. Marched about twenty-five miles; tonight are very painful and my toes cut with the burned stumps of a strong species of "Ailanto" and "Spiraea tomentosa."

Tuesday, 3rd.—Mr. McLeod returned shortly after dusk last night and brought with him one of the Indian guides from the coast sought of the country inhabited by the Killimuk (Tillamook). All unfortunate in the chase, and although nine small deer were seen in a group, yet by their keeping in the thickets near the small stream a few miles from our encampment, prevented the hunter from approaching them. Morning pleasant but chilly, with heavy dew. Thermometer 41 degrees. Started at eight o'clock, keeping a southwest course. Passed two small streams. About noon, in a small hummock of "Corvicia" and "Peris aquifolium," started four deer, one of which was killed by one of the hunters with his rifle at two hundred yards distance. The ball entered the left shoulder and passed through the neck on the opposite side, yet she ran three hundred yards before she fell. Camped on the south side of Yamhill river, a small stream about twenty-five miles from our encampment. Picked up a species of "Donia" in flower and seed and a small annual plant closely allied to "Phlox," both in rich light dry loam in open woods. Hunters out in search of deer and not yet come home. I expect a fine

fall, as seventeen shots were heard in various directions in the woods. Friday, 29th.—Morning dull and chilly. Only one young deer was killed last night, by Mr. McLeod; the mother, however, being in the dusk of the evening she could not be found. At eight one of the hunters returned with a very large fine doe. Started at nine and kept a southwest course, and camped not far from the point of a low hill at three o'clock. Heavy rain for the remainder of day and the greater part of the night. Country not different from yesterday. Traveled about thirteen miles. Nothing new came under my notice.

Saturday, 30th.—Cloudy until noon, after-part of the day clear and fine with a fanning westerly wind. In the morning dried some of my things which got wet the preceding day. Started at nine and continued our route in a southerly direction, on the opposite side of the hill from where we were yesterday. Most parts of the country burned; only on little patches in the valleys and on the flats near the low hills that verdure is to be seen. Some of the natives tell me it is done for the purpose of urging the deer to frequent certain parts to feed which they leave unburned, and of course they are easily killed. Others say that it is done in order that they might the better find wild honey and grasshoppers, which both serve as articles of winter food. I walked along the low hills but found nothing different. Saw four large bucks. Reached the camp at four o'clock, cleaned my gun, had supper and went out with a hunting party. One female and her kid were killed by the Indian hunter. Mr. McLeod passed a ball through the right shoulder of one and after wards had two other shots fired with effect, but not mortal.
