ALABAMA JUDGE

KILLED IN HOME; WIFE IS WOUNDED

WETUMKA, Ala., Aug. 31.—Judge Lamar Smith, probate judge of Elmore county, was shot to death and his wife seriously hurt last night when an unidentified person fired two charges of buckshot through a window of his home from ambush.
Judge Smith was lying on a bed reading a newspaper when the shots were fired. His skull was shattered by one of the charges. Mrs. Smith was discovered stretched on the floor by neighbors, who heard the shots.
A negro with whom Judge Smith was said to have had a dispute about a week ago is being sought by posse under direction of Sheriff John L. Golden.

HEALTH BULLETIN

IMMUNITY TO DIPHTHERIA
Between 6 months and 5 years of age is the period of life when children are most susceptible to diphtheria. 70 per cent of all children during this period will contract the disease if exposed and it is during this time that the illness is most to be dreaded.
These children who are now susceptible may be made immune to diphtheria by the injection of a small amount of harmless fluid (Toxin-Antitoxin) under the skin, once a week for three weeks. This process is absolutely harmless and without pain or discomfort in the young children except for the mere prick of a needle.

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Dempsey Has Fought Way to Over Million

NEW YORK, N. Y., Aug. 31.—Jack Dempsey, assured the staggering sum of \$475,000 for engaging Gene Tunney in defense of the world's heavyweight championship is the richest of all boxers.

The title-holder already has earned more than \$1,000,000 with his gloved fists, but mismanagement of enterprises in which he was interested cut deeply into his fortune. No matter if he loses his entire pile of money and holdings, he says he never will be an object of a benefit.

Income Secure.
This is because he has a \$200,000 trust fund out of which he will receive \$1,000 a month as long as he lives. No matter what happens, the champion cannot touch the \$200,000.

Dempsey is under tremendous expense. It cost him around \$80,000 to live last year. This included an amount used to offset the deficit in operating his hotel at Los Angeles. Also the expense of maintaining homes for his mother and father.

The "Manassa Mauler" since knocking Jess Willard out and winning the title in Toledo, O., July 4, 1919, has engaged in five contests. Including the Willard fight Dempsey has fought only forty rounds and has earned \$1,104,000, an average of \$27,600 per round or \$9,200 for every minute in the ring.

FRUIT GROWERS OF YAKIMA HARD HIT BY BURNED PLANT.

YAKIMA, Aug. 31.—Losses estimated at about \$365,000 were incurred last night when the cold storage plant of the Yakima Fruit Growers' association at Zillah was burned.

The plant and equipment is valued at \$225,000, one hundred and fifty cars of pears stored at \$100,000, general supplies at \$25,000 and ice at \$15,000.

The plant is a total loss as the walls, though still standing, cannot be utilized. It was declared. Rebuilding will not be done in time to handle the 1927 crop and it is impossible to care for the 1926 crop.

MEXICAN FLOODS TAKE 50 LIVES, RUIN PROPERTY

NOGALES, Ariz., Aug. 31.—Complications of the Herald today placed the flood toll in the states of Nayarit and Jalisco, Mexico, at more than fifty known dead, untold property loss and with prospects of further inundations on the Santiago and Lerma rivers, (the latter being an extension of the former in the state of Jalisco) over the whole banks.

A dispatch to the Herald today said that the town of Santiago Ixcuintla, Nayarit, is now an island. Los Barcos, in Jalisco, is threatened with inundation and six small towns along the course of the Rio Lerma already have been inundated with considerable loss of life.

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
