exception of Surveyor-General W. S. Kingsbury, were unopposed for their party nomination.

Modification or repeal of the prohibition law was a big issue in some of the congressional districts, but failed to arouse much discussion in the gubernatorial and senatorial rights.

Upton Sinclair, the novelist who in 1921 ran for United States senator, was on the ballot again today, this time as the unopposed candidate for the socialist gubernatorial nomination.

Eleventh hour statements from the opposing camps were uniformly optimistic.

South Carolina Voting. COLUMBIA, S. C., Aug. 31.—

American adherence to the world court was one of the issues of South Carolina passed upon today as they went to the polls to express their choice for party nominations to the offices of senator, governor and others in the first Democratic primary.

Though nomination is considered equivalent to election, a second primary on September 14 may be necessary in contests where the leading candidate does not receive a majority of the votes cast.

World Court Favored. Ellison D. Smith, three times a member of the United States senate, entered a three cornered battle for his seat and former Senator B. N. Dial of Laurens and Edgar A. Brown of Barnwell, speaker of the general assembly. The campaign was fought largely around Senator Smith's record, with Brown maintaining a continuance of attack on the incumbent for his stand on agricultural policies. Brown also denounced the world court as a "Republican creation" totally dissimilar from the league court endorsed by Woodrow Wilson and the party convention of 1924. He criticized Senator Smith's vote in favor of American participation in the court.

Candidates Numerous. Senator Smith related his activities in the cotton futures law, Muscle Shoals, restrictive immigration and farm legislation in general, while he defended the world court principle.

Former Senator Dial injected no personalities into his campaign, but insisted that his experience in the senate and as a business man, qualified him for the post.

Nine candidates sought the governorship, Governor Thomas G. McLeod not being among them. Representative McMillen, Stevenson and Fullmer face opposition in their efforts to be returned to congress.

SCENIC ROAD TO TOP OF MT. NEBO IS NEW PROJECT

Campaign Being Launched to Secure Funds for Drive—Park Near Summit Donated.

Construction of a scenic road to the summit of Mt. Nebo is a proposition now being placed before residents of Roseburg by J. V. Casey, the promoter of the Umpqua park improvement, which is now attracting a great deal of attention.

For many years there has been a great deal of discussion concerning a drive up Mt. Nebo. Such a road offers many evident attractions and during the summer months would form a most interesting diversion. Mr. Casey has had a survey made showing that a road can easily be constructed to the summit from Umpqua park, and O. J. Lindsey has agreed to donate from three to five acres, situated on a bench near the summit, for park purposes. This park is well shaded and would be a delightful spot with but little improvement work necessary.

It is proposed for the present to build a road to the summit, with a turn, making it necessary to return over the same route. Eventually, however, another approach could be built down the north-west slope.

Mt. Nebo has a peculiar fascination in that all who see it are immediately possessed of a desire to stand on the summit. Without question the construction of a good auto road would lure hundreds to view the beautiful panorama which is to be seen from the top of the promontory.

Mr. Casey hopes to secure sufficient financial support to make the improvement and is now engaged in a campaign to secure the funds necessary to make the work possible.

Opposes Sale of Ships.

All ships possible should fly the American flag, in the opinion of President Coolidge, who does not favor and would oppose any change in the American government policy of refusing to sell any of its merchant ships to Americans to be placed under foreign registry.

Matthew C. Brush of New York City, president of the American International Corporation, which holds an interest in the International Mercantile Marine, it was said at the summer executive offices today in response to questions, did not mention the question of foreign registry during a call upon Mr. Coolidge yesterday.

Any suggestion that Americans might seek to purchase the United States lines, now owned and operated by the government, and place the ships of that service, including the Leviathan, under foreign registry, it was indicated, could be dismissed as not coming within the scope of well defined shipping board policy on sales.
