CHINESE BANDITS CAPTURE PRIESTS

(Associated Press—Leased Wire.) WORCESTER, Mass., Aug. 30.—Monsignor J. E. Walsh and Rev. Robert J. Cairns, members of the Mary Knoll Mission band in China, were taken captive by a band of Chinese bandits headed by Chan Chuk-Saam in Kwang Hoi, China, on July 11, according to a letter received here today by the Evening Post from Rev. Father Cairns, a resident of the city.

The letter, dated July 14, says that the bandits made an attack on the city shortly after midnight and the soldiers in the fort, although greatly outnumbered by the 500 bandits, fled and left the civilians at the mercy of the bandits.

The robbers prowled around the city with lighted torches, smashed in doors of dwellings and took everything they could carry.

IMPORTATION OF STRIKE BREAKERS LEADS TO A RIOT

(Associated Press—Leased Wire.)

MANVILLE, R. I., Aug. 30.—An attempt to fire the cotton mill of the Manville-Jencks company here today was the climax of a series of disorders prompted by the arrival of strike breakers in armored cars yesterday.

Hooting and jeering, a crowd of 1,000 striking operatives and sympathizers gathered outside the mill last night after the strike breakers had been brought in with beds and stoves and quartered in the mill.

The appearance of men in the windows resulted in an avalanche of stones and the destruction of many panes before state and local police restored order. The crowd reassembled, 500 strong, later and soon after midnight flaming kerosene-soaked rags were hurled through the shattered windows. Police Chief Michael Finn of Cumberland stamped out the fire and made an unsuccessful attempt to find those responsible.

Threats to break down the mill gates and go after their tools were hurled by strikers as the chief made his way through the crowd and then another stone-throwing brigade of men and boys showered the opposite side of the plant with missiles. Chief Finn estimated damage would run to several hundred dollars.

Extensive preparations are in progress for the Douglas County Fair to be held at the armory on the dates of September 16, 17 and 18. The county court has delivered to the Chamber of Commerce approximately \$600 to be used for prizes, and the money is to be distributed according to the premium list, copies of which have been mailed out to nearly every producer in the county. The divisions are so varied that there is a place for nearly any kind of farm product, and it is anticipated that every section of the county will be represented in the exhibits. Poultry, flowers, fruit, grain, club work, farm exhibits, market gardens, granges, etc., will each have separate divisions, with valuable prizes offered for each class.

The program committee is preparing interesting entertainment for each afternoon and evening, with band and orchestra concerts, and special music by vocalists and other Roseburg musicians as features. Several speakers are to be brought in to address the growers of the county on various important topics, the lectures being largely of a nature of instructive courses in agricultural or horticultural lines.
