STANFIELD NOT TO BE MOLESTED ENTERING RACE

failure to win renomination were his own acts and his failures to act.
"Stanfield complains, rather childishly, it seems to me, of a radio address made by Frederick Steiwer during the primary campaign in which the junior senator was called a 'truant' from his post of duty at Washington during a large part of his term. It is to call the most conspicuous absentee in the whole senate a mere 'truant' is offensive to him, then Senator Stanfield is too sensitive to remain longer in political life.

"The senator paraded his Oregon and California land grant tax bill through his statement much like a hen with one chicken. He should have something to point to after six years in the senate. I understand this is the Hawley bill, the Stanfield bill on this subject having failed of passage. But I am willing to give him credit for all he claims. I understand he did more than anyone else in obtaining passage of the bill.

"What he hopes to do in the other matters he mentions as future possibilities may be not down as pre-election promises, worth as much, perhaps, as his former pledges, among them being one to support and uphold the direct primary law and another pledge of support to Frederick Steiwer, the Republican party nominee, whom he now seeks to defeat.

"The 'yellow ticket' excuse in of the filmdes nature. Senator Stanfield already satisfied himself that the circulation of this ticket had no appreciable effect in bringing about his defeat before he congratulated Mr. Steiwer and assured him of his support. Stanfield stands alone as being the only candidate on the 'yellow ticket' who has protested and claimed a new deal.

"The fact that a newspaper, the Oregonian or any other, champions any candidate for office, does not disqualify that candidate. In my opinion Senator Stanfield had newspapers just as outspoken for him in the primaries as the Oregonian was for Mr. Steiwer.

"Senator Stanfield is a poor loser. By his action he has forfeited any claim upon the support or sympathies of Republicans, for he is giving aid and comfort to their opponents by entering the senate race. He offends all supporters of the primary system because he is violating the primary law. Senator Stanfield is dignifying his own political disgrace.

Injunction Discussed.
SEATTLE, Ore., Sept. 1.—Political observers here today discussed the possibility that opponents of Robert N. Stanfield may file injunction suit against Secretary of State Koser in an attempt to prevent his accepting the nomination of Stanfield as an independent candidate for United States senator.

There is a state law that is designed to prohibit persons failing to receive a party nomination in the primary elections from becoming independent candidates or candidates of any other party. The injunction if filed will probably be for the purpose of testing the question whether the state law can be made to apply to the United States senatorship, which is a federal office. Many attorneys here believe the law is unconstitutional, and that any qualified citizen has the right to be a candidate for state office even though he may

Inquiry Date Fixed.
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 1.—The Marion county grand jury, before which will be laid the requests of W. S. U'Ren and John R. Latourette for a full investigation of Mr. U'Ren's allegations that the campaign expense statements filed by Frederick Steiwer, Republican nominee for United States senator, and by Latourette, treasurer of the Steiwer-for-senator committee, did not contain reports of money alleged to have been paid to Charles E. Henshaw and others for campaign purposes, will convene here on September 7. It was announced today by District Attorney John Carson.

No date for the appearance of U'Ren and Latourette before the grand jury to state their cases and submit their evidence has been set, although both have been invited to do so by the district attorney.

The scope of the investigation here will be determined by the grand jury in the light of its jurisdiction. Carson has advised both U'Ren and Latourette, and with this limitation it is not considered likely in legal circles here that the grand jury will concern itself with the alleged fraudulent "yellow ticket," which U'Ren has charged was issued and circulated by Henshaw and his associates in the county Republican club on behalf of Steiwer's candidacy, unless it is shown that the ticket was actually circulated in this county.

In response to an inquiry, District Attorney Carson explained that this is not to be a special session of the grand jury but a regular term at which the U'Ren charges would be taken up in the regular order of business.
