

# CITY SUPERINTENDENT COMPILES INFORMATION ON SCHOOLS FOR BENEFIT OF PARENTS AND PUPILS

### Statistical Data Shows Studies Open to Students in All Schools, Text Books to Be Used Tuition Charges, Deposits, Etc. Schools Open Sept. 20

For the information of parents and school children, M. S. Hamm, city school superintendent, has compiled a great deal of statistical information completely covering matters incident to the opening of the city schools on September 20.

Owing to the fact that the city is to occupy its new high school building, and a complete reorganization of the schools is necessary, there are many matters requiring attention on the part of the parents.

Mr. Hamm, in his compilation, shows all facts regarding the schools, including a list of textbooks, studies open in the junior and senior high school, tuition charges, deposits, uniforms, etc. The data is as follows:

**School Calendar 1926-1927**  
September 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th—Registration of Junior and Senior high school pupils.

Elementary Schools, Grades 1-6  
Truancy Law.

Section 439 of the Oregon State School Code, provides that, every parent or guardian having control of any child between the ages of nine and fifteen years, shall be required to send such child or children to school during the time it is in session and for the failure of complying with this act on the part of any parent or guardian he shall be liable of a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00 or by imprisonment in jail not less than two nor more than ten days.

**Tuition.**  
All persons of school age whose parents or guardians are registered voters in school district No. 4, Douglas county, Oregon, are entitled to attend the public schools free of charge. Those who live out of the district No. 4 may be admitted to the Roseburg grade schools upon the payment in advance of each semester's tuition, prior to September 20, 1926 and January 31, 1927, to the school clerk, at the rate of \$22.50 per semester.

Pupils permanently withdrawing from school for unavoidable causes shall have refunded to them the tuition which would have been necessary for the remainder of the semester or year.

**First Grade Classes**  
New classes in the lowest grade of the primary department shall be formed at the Rose and Benson schools at the beginning of each semester. No pupil commencing the work of the first year shall enter school during any semester later than the second Friday. Any pupil becoming six years of age prior to November 1st, may enter the Fall class while any pupil becoming six years of age prior to June 1st may enter the second semester beginning class, provided there is room for the latter pupils.

**School Limits**  
B class pupils living west of the railroad tracks shall attend school at the Fullerton building. A class pupils shall attend the Rose school. Pupils in all grades who live on the south side of Washington street and south of this street and east of the railroad tracks shall attend school at the Rose building. Pupils living on the north side of Washington street, and north from this street and east of the railroad tracks shall attend school at the Benson building. Pupils on or near these boundary limits may be transferred from one school to another if any grade becomes congested.

**Text Books and Supplies**  
Each pupil shall be furnished by his parents with books and other materials needed in the grade to which he belongs. A pupil should consult his teacher before purchasing supplies.

The following text books are used by elementary grade pupils. Other supplies should not be purchased until after school opens: such as crayolas, tablets, pencils, pens, those paper, art books, etc. Ink is furnished by the district, and no other ink should be brought to school.

**Junior High School, Grades 7-9**  
**Admission and Classification**  
Any pupil who has satisfactorily completed the work of the sixth grade of any standard school may enter Roseburg Junior High School. At the discretion of both the superintendent and principal, pupils over the age for the elementary classes or who have failed to make passing marks, may be admitted on condition to the regular classes or to special subjects.

Students having taken ninth grade work elsewhere will be given full credit for same if the school attended is standardized by the state department of public instruction; otherwise examinations must be taken in all subjects where credit is desired.

Pupils coming from other districts shall pay each semester in advance a tuition fee of \$37.50.

Classification depends upon the number of credits gained. Ninth graders must have 18; eighth graders 8.

**School hours:** Tardy bell, 8:40; first period, 8:45-9:40; second period, 9:45-10:35; activity period, 10:40-11:31; third period, 11:34-12:08; tardy bell, 1:05; fourth period, 1:10-2:05; fifth period, 2:08-3:03; sixth period, 3:06-4:01.

Each pupil must have a clean towel for bathing after Physical Education classes twice a week. These may be brought from home or will be furnished by the district freshly laundered, at the cost of 75c each semester.

Gymnasium suits, including rubber soled shoes, are to be provided by all pupils. Boys will use the usual gymnasium white shirt and trunks. Girls will wear white middie and Zip-Knick gym trunks. Other styles of bloomers may be used if already purchased.

During the coming year no uniform dress will be worn by the girls.

**Requirements for Graduation**  
Twenty seven credits are required for graduation, all of which must be gained by completing the required and necessary elective subjects of the curriculum. A unit of credit is earned by pursuing one subject five days per week for a semester. One half of a credit will be given for the completion of a nine weeks' course.

**Registration**  
Students are to register for their first semester's work on the first four days of the week preceding the opening of school. Ninth graders will register on Monday and Tuesday, eighth graders on Wednesday and Tuesday, and seventh graders on Thursday. Students are urged to study the curriculum and be ready to choose their electives without undue delay.

At registration time each pupil must deposit 75c for a locker padlock. The lock will be furnished by the district. At the close of the year 50c will be returned when the padlock is checked in.

At this time also the 75c for towels will be paid by those who desire this service.

Gymnasium suits, including rubber soled shoes, are to be provided by all pupils. Boys will use the usual gymnasium white shirt and trunks. Girls will wear white middie and Zip-Knick gym trunks. Other styles of bloomers may be used if already purchased.

**Requirements for Graduation**  
Students eligible for diplomas must have completed with passing marks, three years of work in at least two major departments or subjects and two years of work in two other departments or subjects.

**Possible Major Subjects:** English, Latin, History (including Civics), Science (Laboratory), Mathematics.  
**Possible Minor Subjects:** History, Science, Latin, Spanish, Mathematics, Agriculture, Shortland, Typewriting, Local Trades, Home Economics.

**State College Entrance Requirements**  
A student should keep in mind the entrance requirements of the college he plans to enter upon completing high school courses, so that he may obtain credit in the necessary subjects. The requirements of Oregon institutions are as follows:

Entrance to the colleges, universities, and normal schools of Oregon is contingent upon presentation of 15 units, with at least 10 (except schools of commerce and business administration) units in English, mathematics, foreign languages (including Latin), laboratory sciences and history (including civics and economics).

The remaining five units may be taken in any subject regularly or occasionally offered in the high school course of study in this state; no credit being granted, however, for penmanship, spelling, military drill, physical training, or work which may be classified as largely a student activity.

**Registration Days**  
Students are to register for their year's studies from 3:00 to 12:00 p. m. and 5:00 to 8:00 p. m. on the first three days of the week preceding the opening of school. The seniors are to come on Monday; the juniors on Tuesday and the sophomores on Wednesday. Students should register at the above time and have everything ready for the first day. The superintendent and principal will be glad to help plan the year's work. School will take up on Monday, Sept. 20, 1926.

At registration time each pupil must deposit 75c for a locker padlock. The lock will be furnished by the district. At the close of the year, 50c will be returned when the padlock is checked in.

At this time also the 75c for towels will be paid by those who desire this service, and the chemistry fee must be deposited.

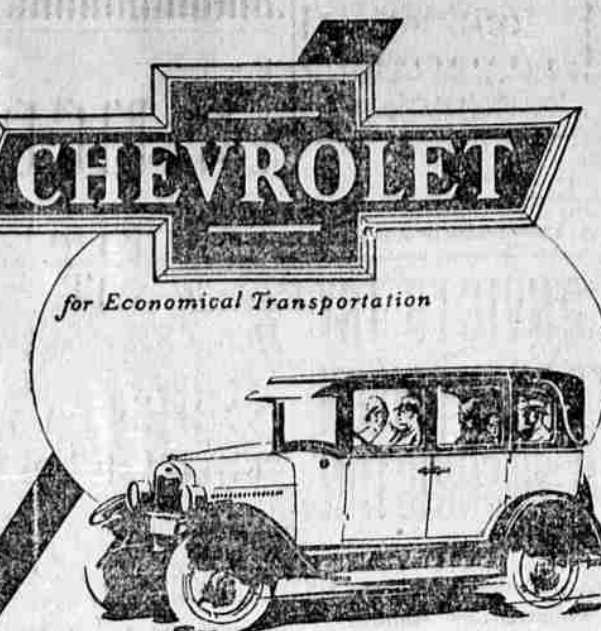
