MERITS OF IODINE ARE DESCRIBED BY FEDERAL EXPERT

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 8.—Iodine from seaweeds as a preventive of high blood pressure and hardening of the arteries was outlined today before the American Chemical Society convention.

Dr. J. W. Turrentine of the bureau of soils, United States Department of Agriculture, speaking before the division of the chemistry of medicinal products, said studies in the government laboratories show that the excess weight of advancing years frequently may be attributed to an inactive thyroid

gland, indicating an inadequate supply of iodine in the human system.

The activity of iodine, naturally occurring in seaweed was shown to be some two hundred times greater than that of the iodine frequently used in the treatment and prevention of goiter, he said.

By activity, he explained, was meant the power of the iodine to increase or restore the normal functioning of the thyroid gland. The abnormal functioning of that gland results in goiter, he said.

"In clinical tests in which thyroid disturbances—goiter in its various forms—have been treated, the superior activity of this natural, vegetable form of iodine has been convincingly demonstrated," Dr. Turrentine added.

"Simple goiter has been shown to disappear promptly under this treatment. The enlargement of the glands has subsided. In toxic goiter, metabolism has been restored to normal and where the heart and nerves have become involved, these symptoms have disappeared."

Because of the body it was impossible to keep it longer without burial.

SALEM BANK BUILDING SCENE OF BAD MISHAP

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 8.—Joseph McDonald, route 8, Portland, received injuries on his head and right arm, when he fell from the fourth to the third floor of the First National Bank building here. He fell a distance of ten and one-half feet onto a floor of solid concrete.

Doctors at the local hospital where the man was rushed by ambulance have not yet determined whether his skull was fractured, nor have they given any definite opinion on the extent of his internal injuries. He is expected to live.

OREGON STOCKMEN WANT STRONG LAW TO CURB RUSTLERS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 8.—Abolition of the justice which meted out swift punishment at the end of a hemp rope to cattle rustlers has brought an alarming condition on the wide ranges of Klamath and Lake counties and new laws are needed to cope with the situation.

This is the opinion of the Southern Oregon Cattle Men's association, representatives of which indicated today that a measure with more stringent penalties would be brought up for passage at the next session of the state legislature.

The statute would establish a severe penalty for any buyer of beef carcasses who failed to examine the animals and ascertain their brands.

Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, is here conferring with local cattle men relative to passage of the law.

Gifford, Klan leader, whose signature was put on the campaign cards with out his authorization, and some of the men who distributed the cards are expected to appear as witnesses.

S. P. AND TRUNK LINE TO MEET AGAIN IN OCTOBER

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8.—Conferences between executives of the Southern Pacific and the Great Northern-Northern Pacific group over agreement to permit joint use of lines in the extension of the Oregon Trunk railway from Bend to Klamath Falls and further south, probably will be resumed in New York in October.

This is the opinion of William Sproule, president of the Southern Pacific system, who has arrived for a periodical inspection of his system's lines in Oregon and to confer with local officers.

Sproule would not forecast the probable result of the new conference.

BOY CONFESSES HE BURNED FATHER'S BARN, HAYSTACK

MEDFORD, Ore., Sept. 8.—After having set his father's barn on fire in the Evening Creek district yesterday to see if he burn, 13-year-old Jack Mayfield was hurried to a nearby creek to obtain water for the firefighters. While enroute, he also stippled a match to a 75-ton stack of hay, destroying it completely. The entire loss is estimated at \$1200, approximately the amount suffered last year when another barn on the same place was destroyed by flames. After weak denials, the boy made a complete confession to his father, according to the local state fire warden.

TWO SUICIDES ARE REPORTED FROM THE COOS BAY COUNTRY

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 8.—Charles Nordstrom, who recently retired as a pensioner after thirty years' service in the Coos Bay coast guard station, ended his life by hanging on the North Inlet ranch where he went to spend his declining days. He was a bachelor, aged 69. His aged mother lives in Sweden.

Nordstrom, who feared not the seas and who had rescued scores through his ability in handling old fashioned life boats, could not face illness and palsy which recently attacked him, he told friends shortly before his death.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Sept. 8.—August Manjus, a seaman of the lumber schooner Frank B. Stout, ended his life by jumping into the ocean south of Cape Blanco, while the ship was enroute here from San Francisco, shipmates reported on reaching here. Manjus refused to be saved when a life ring was thrown near him.

MARKET RATINGS

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8.—Fresh egg values, stimulated by a shortage in the receipts have reached the forty cent level in the local market. On the dairy exchange top grades are posted two cents higher for the day at 38 and 40c respectively. Pullets participated in only part of the advance now being listed at 23c. Under-sized and current receipts remained firm and unchanged.

Today's advance again places the Portland market more in line with other coast markets and the east. Seattle is quoting extras at 43c and San Francisco at 42c, while Los Angeles is up to 49c.

Fresh receipts in the local market have been unusually light and this together with a brisk shipping outlet, brought about today's advance.

Butter continues steady and unchanged in the local market. Demand for top grades remains active both for local and shipping use.

Demand for heavy, fat hams (five) has been good during the last few days. Receipts remain sufficient to meet the local requirements and prices are unchanged.

The country dressed veal market is slightly easier and the trade are not so keen to pay prices as they were a few days ago. Best calves still holding at 18 1/2 to 19 cents. Country dressed hogs holding around 13 1/2 cents for choice lights.
