LONG HAIR FOR READERS

There are still some thousands of women who would like to cut their hair, but haven't the courage. For they argue, if it is chopped off short and isn't becoming, think of the many months before it will be long enough to do up, and think of the discomfort of trying to make short hair stay with combs and hairpins.

They may be quite right, but if they want, they can achieve an effect of bobbing, without actually cutting off their hair. At least, they may cut off only a part of it, and they can thin it a bit underneath, so it will lie close against the head. And still they'll have enough so it will always do up nicely with hair pins, and gradually grow thicker and longer if they decide the new style is not becoming and that long hair and lots of its better. In any case, cutting the hair off in this partial fashion would do it good.

Long hair needs less washing than short, since it does not fly about so and does not pick up dirt so easily. But it needs more care in other ways. It needs a tonic every week or oftener, unless it is very, very healthy hair. It needs daily brushing, it needs a daily massage of the scalp, since long hair packs against the head, especially under the hot felt hats we all wear.

It needs airing. One of the greatest advantages of short hair is that, as it flies about, so it is always well ventilated. Long hair should be shaken out every night, the fingers of both hands should be spread out through it, and it should really be given a good shaking. This airs it beautifully—and then it should be thoroughly brushed.

Here's Advice for the unbobbed. when it is of a blonde shade in early youth. For tinting the grey hairs with henna, mix the contents of the small packages that come for a shampoo, with enough lather to cover the entire head of hair.

Let this stay on the hair for about 20 or more minutes, and then proceed as with any other method of shampooing. It requires some experimenting to know how long to retain the lather on the head, but you will not overdo it with a first trial of 20 minutes.

ANSWERS TO INQUIRIES

Strong suits of a good, white, soft-finish Press with a handful of soft rinds to absorb moisture, and leave on the trees till the leather is almost dry, then rub in a little petroleum or castor oil. Polish when completely dry.

Answer: "It is so hard to polish tinware. It is necessary to good housekeeping?" Answer: No, for tarnish protects the surface of tinware and makes it wear longer. Merely wipe tin-ware well after washing, to prevent rust.

INFANTILE PARALYSIS (No. 4)

The noble crippled victims of virus, which generally distributed in the system, does most of its damage in the anterior part of the spinal cord and so affects the nerves, especially those of the leg muscles, so that paralysis results a mere matter of time.

In the preceding papers, I told you of the preventive measures and the treatment in the convalescent (and acute) stages. I warned you (and during the acute stage you should not prefer the doctor to begin active physical measures such as massage and other things which would disturb the patient, and passive exercises; nor, what is worse, to surreptitiously practice them yourself. You must remember that in the short time the acute stage lasts, the inactivity of the muscles will not cause paralysis and that the real trouble is in the central nervous system, which these treatments cannot reach.

After the acute inflammation has not confined to infants and is so subdued and infrequently accompanied by paralysis, the name Infantile Paralysis is a misnomer. The technical name is Acute Poliomyelitis, and the
