A Dollar Dinner for Four

Variation in the daily dinner menu, while still keeping within the household budget, is one of the housewife's hardest problems. The following suggestions for a \$1.00 menu which will serve four people may prove helpful.

Jellied Consomme
Kidney Bean Croquettes
Bread and Butter
Stewed Tomatoes
Coffee

FOR warm September days jellied consomme is often preferable to hot soup. A can of consomme costs 10 cents. Add 1 cup of boiling water. Soak 1/2 ounce gelatine a few minutes in cold water; season and add to boiling soup. The cost of gelatine may be estimated at about 5 cents.

The croquettes require one No. 2 size can of kidney beans costing 17 cents, 1 egg costing about 4 cents, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, seasoning, and bread crumbs. Mash the beans through a colander, add parsley and seasoning, and make into croquettes, adding a few breadcrumbs if not thick enough. Dip in well-

beaten egg, then in crumbs, and fry in deep, boiling fat. A large can of tomatoes, sufficient for four people, can be purchased for 13 cents. A loaf of bread costs 10 cents.

A delicious fruit cake put up in an attractive tin box costs \$1.75 cents. It should be cut into about 25 slices, making four slices each 23 cents (7 cents each). Enough coffee for four people, at an average cost of 40 cents a pound, is about 4 cents.

The various items of food listed above come to a total cost of 91 cents, allowing 9 cents to cover the cost of butter and sugar for the meal, parsley and fat for frying.

WOMAN CLIMBER HAS CLOSE CALL ON MOUNT HOOD

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 13.—Miss Vanda York of Portland had a narrow escape from death on the slopes of Mt. Hood yesterday afternoon when she slipped and fell 25 feet into a crevasse where she lay helpless, wedged in the ice, until her companions effected a rescue.

Accompanied by Herbert Gordon, forest ranger, and Mark Wetland, guide, Miss York was climbing to the summit of the mountain when she slipped and fell into the crevasse. Wetland was lowered into the crevasse by Gordon and chopped the young woman free from the ice. She was then lifted out with a rope and carried down to Cloud Cap Inn. Miss York sustained painful lacerations from the sharp ice.

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America Well Ahead in Lock-Making Art

America has made greater progress in lock making than has Europe. Casting of metals and use of machinery bring manufacturing costs much lower here than in the older countries, where hand methods were persisted in until recently.

Compression of bronze was developed in 1872, and with the discovery of the rust-retarding process the builders' hardware industry went forward at a rapid rate. The flat, corrugated key was devised in 1882 and the paracentric key in 1892. Mortised door locks were first used in 1890.

The master-keying system merits careful consideration. The convenience of having a single key which will pass all important openings, such as the entrance doors, basement garages, etc., is worth investment in such locks. Master keying has been in use for a number of years in hotels, and is rapidly spreading to residences of all classes.

Old Colonial Fort

Fort Frederick was erected under the personal supervision of Gov. Horatio Sharpe. He obtained a grant of \$11,000, for the purpose from the legislature May 10, 1750. It was named in honor of the sixth Lord Baltimore. It is situated on a knoll 100 feet above the Potomac, one-quarter mile north of this river, and 17 miles west of Hagerstown. It is in a rectangle of 240 feet. British prisoners were confined here December 23, 1777, from General Burgoyne's army. It was sold by the state September 6, 1791, and purchased again by it, after having been in other hands 131 years, December 30, 1922. During the Civil war it was garrisoned by the United States troops. It is probably the best preserved fort of the period in the United States.

Beneficial Rabbit Plague

Tularemia, a recurrent disease which kills off rabbits in great numbers, has been the subject of extended investigation by government biologists. The disease is carried by jack rabbits, snowshoe rabbits, cottontails and certain species of ground squirrels.

The disease occurs more or less periodically and serves as a natural means of reducing the numbers of these pests and affords a measure of relief from the damage they do to orchards, vineyards, farm crops and pasturage.

KITCHEN CUPBOARD

We All Like Chicken

A SMALL amount of chicken will attract, nourish and economize on a dish. With two cupsfuls of chicken and rice, and one cupful of chicken gravy, a bit of onion, served hot from a baking dish, you have a tasty luncheon.

Chicken Loaf.—Chop the meat from one chicken, add one cupful of cooked rice, one egg, one-half cupful of chopped celery, one-fourth of a cupful of milk, one-half cupful of nut meats, one small onion chopped and season to taste with salt and pepper. Roll in a long loaf and bake.

Chicken Pie.—Take two cupfuls of bits of chicken left from a roast of food, add any gravy left, a stalk of celery chopped, one small onion chopped, rich milk to make sufficient moisture, season well and cover with baking powder biscuits. Bake until brown. Have the chicken boiling hot before the biscuits are placed.

Escalloped Chicken.—Place layers of cooked chicken in the bottom of buttered baking pan, then add a layer of cooked rice, hominy or bread crumbs; repeat until all is used. Sprinkle with cornmeal which has been mixed with pepper and salt and pour another cupful of white sauce between the layers. Bake until hot and serve.

Creamy Chicken.—Take two cupfuls of chopped chicken, one cupful of onion, one green pepper chopped, two cupfuls of cooked tomato and one tablespoonful of butter. Cook the onion and pepper in the butter, add the other ingredients and serve poured over hot-cooked rice or hominy.

Sweetbread Soup.—Reheat one quart of veal stock and add two cupfuls of cream which has been beaten with the yolks of two eggs. Take from the fire, season to taste, add one cupful of uncooked sweetbreads cut into bits. Garnish with one cupful of whipped cream and a bit of parsley.
