Bull Moose Attacks Camp

A bull moose investigated a camp on the banks of Letell creek, along which runs a county road during the past week. As a result the camp of the hunters was badly damaged and their tent punched full of holes. Perhaps guided by curiosity, the bull moose investigated the contents of the tent, or else it was the call of the instincts which prompted the action. Nearby the camp was situated

a large stump and the big moose used it to sharpen his horns following his attack upon the camp. From this evidence it is presumed that the velvet of his horns is hardening and must be brushed away.

Paul Bendele, local resident who was called to that territory on business viewed the camp after the moose had attacked it. About 30 holes were counted which the moose had punched, evidently trying to find out what was underneath the canvas cover. Mr. Bendele also observed the stump which the bull moose had used to sharpen his horns.

The hunters are endeavoring to collect from the state game commission for damages which resulted from the investigation of the moose.

Mill Worker Loses Leg.
Hoyd Rondema, aged 21 years, second loader at the Umpqua Mills and Timber Camp, suffered the loss of his right leg, Monday afternoon when struck by a rolling log. Immediate attention was given to the injured man, who was later brought to Reedsport and sent to Eugene for hospital treatment.

The accident occurred when Rondema was switching a car near the landing slip. A log rolled off the landing and the end of it struck his right leg and threw him against the railguard of the car. The leg was crushed off about three inches below the knee.

The young man has made his home in Reedsport for some time, although his mother and brothers live at Centralia. It is stated that he has been their sole support, the eldest brother being fifteen years of age.

Mrs. Ivan Gay, trained nurse of Reedsport accompanied the injured man to the Eugene hospital.

Tagged Salmon Caught
Tagging salmon at sea is the latest method of checking up on the travels of the king of waters.

According to the latest announcements, a small metal tag with a number is attached to a small fish that is caught at sea. This tag in turn is observed when the salmon is caught by fishermen in the rivers or other places. In this manner, it is expected that a greater knowledge can be obtained of the travels of the salmon.

One of the tags recently placed on a two year old salmon by Deputy Warden Larson was taken from a fish caught in the Umpqua river during the week. From all reports, the tag was attached to the fish at a point near Bandon, several days ago. It is thought that the tag, numbered 215, is the first to be reported by fishermen.

Many thousands of dollars are being spent annually to find out about the salmon. Investigations are being carried on to determine where the fish go, where they feed and other data.

Blast Wrecks Water Line
A charge of dynamite placed under a stump served to blow the stump from its moorings as well as part of the city water service pipe Friday noon. The charge of powder was of sufficient strength to cause the line to be crushed.

The pipeline from the Clear Lake supply is unprotected and since the construction of the road began, the line has been in danger. The Friday episode is the first time the contractors have caused any interruption to the water supply of Reedsport. The line runs close to where the many teams and
