1,750,000 Dodge
Cars in 11 Years

Dodge Brothers Motor Car No. 1,750,000 rolled from the assembly line Monday, August 23, at three o'clock p. m., just 11 years, 9 months and 9 days after the first Dodge Brothers car was completed. During this period the plant at Detroit has expanded from a scant 30 acres of floor space to over 150 acres to which additions are constantly being made to care for increased demand.

Car No. 1,750,000, an all steel Special Sedan, is the crowning achievement of nearly twelve years devoted to the constant improvement and refinement of a modern basic design. The data when Dodge Brothers output passed important production figures show clearly the continuously accelerated demand for the product. The first car was completed November 11, 1914. Two years, lacking 19 days, were required to build the first 100,000.

Car No. 1,750,000 was completed July 12, 1926. Car No. 1,000,000 on July 12, 1925. One million cars had been produced at the end of nine years and one month. The last 250,000 cars were built in 7 months and 9 days; the first 250,000 in 41 months and 12 days. Car No. 1,500,000 left the line on January 14 this year and was shipped to the Alhambra Motor Company of Los Angeles to take its place in the famous "Scout Fleet" consisting of Cars Nos. 300,000, 600,000, 900,000 and 1,200,000. Car No. 1,750,000 was shipped to Frank Van Syckle, Dodge Brothers dealer at Perth Amboy, New Jersey.

Franklin Would Have
Put Maxims on Coins

The first of the Nineteenth century was the heyday of Staffordshire ware decorated with pictures. And not the least interesting of this china was the series picturing maxims, proverbs and morals.

Of this dainty china many pieces carried reproductions of "Poor Richard's" sayings, which our great American, Benjamin Franklin, industriously circulated through his Poor Richard's Almanack for 25 years.

The Poor Richard maxims were very near to Franklin's heart, and he let no chance slip to get them into greater circulation. One of his projects—which, however, was not carried out—was to imprint on one side of the copper coins of the new American republic some proverbs of Solomon and other sayings encouraging thrift.

"Diligence is the mother of good luck," and "Plow deep while augurs sleep" were among those he suggested. His practical and benevolent mind pictured how many a family would read and ponder his precepts as they gathered round the hearth.—The Antiquarian.

"Pony Express" Hailed
as Fast Mail Service

The first trip of the "pony express," from St. Joseph to Sacramento, carried about 85 pieces of mail, according to Glenn D. Bradley's "The Story of the Pony Express." This run began in the early evening of April 3, 1860, and required 30 days and 23 hours. At the same time an unbound express was also on the way with about 70 pieces.

"The first pony express from St. Joseph," writes Bradley, "brought a message of congratulation from President Buchanan to Governor of California, which was first telegraphed to the Missouri river town. It also brought one or two official government communications, some New York, Chicago and St. Louis newspapers, a few bank drafts, and some business letters addressed to banks and commercial houses in San Francisco.

Sold by Auction

Morganatic marriages of royalty are freely discussed, but perhaps the most curious stories are about the auctioning of wives and husbands as recently as 90 years ago. According to the Annual Register the inhabitants of Carlisle witnessed the sale of a wife by her husband, Joseph Thompson, in 1832. A bellman was sent round to give notice of the sale, which attracted the attention of thousands. The woman stood on a large oak chair with a rope or halter of straw round her neck, and Thompson addressed the crowd.

After an hour or two she was purchased by a pensioner for the sum of 20 shillings and a Newfoundland dog—London Tit-Bits.

Tower Famous Landmark

As a landmark nothing can equal a tower on a hilltop. For instance, the noted tower on the top of Leith hill, the culminating point of the North Downs, England, can be seen 40 miles away.

The story goes that it marks the spot where an eccentric farmer of the neighborhood was buried on horseback, and upside down, so that when the world was turned topsy-turvy at the last day he would be in the right position. This story is probably founded on the fact that Mr. Hall of Leith place built the tower in 1766 and was buried there six years later.

Early Rulers of Egypt

The name "Ptolemies" is given to a dynasty of Greek rulers that governed Egypt from 323 to 30 B. C., a period of 293 years. The dynasty was founded by Ptolemy Lagus, surnamed also Soter, who, at the time of the death of Alexander the Great (323 B. C.), was governor of Egypt, and after the division of the empire into four monarchies became king of that country. The dynasty of the Ptolemies comprised 14 sovereigns. On the death of Cleopatra, the last of the line, in 30 B. C., Egypt became a province of Rome.

LANE COUNTY BOY,
HUNTING, VICTIM
OF HIS OWN GUN

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 20.—Maxwell Victor Whippis, 26, was killed Saturday while deer hunting in the vicinity of Mosby Creek, 12 miles from town, and about 17 miles from Cottage Grove. It was the first hunting casualty of the year in Lane county.

Young Whippis, his father, and two other men were hunting. They had separated, and Whippis was not missed until he failed to respond to the signal to return to the car. He was apparently killed from a shot from his own gun, a 30-30 calibre rifle. No inquest was held.
