SLOGAN TO GO ON THE BALLOT FOR STANFIELD

that he refused to place anything after Stanfield's name except the word "Independent." Stanfield's right to use the name "Independent" was not questioned.

Slogan Same As Party. "The plaintiff contends," says the opinion, "that under subdivision 3 of section 3923, Oregon laws, he is entitled to have 'the political principle which he represents expressed (on the ballot) in not more than three words' and that 'freedom from dictatorship, independent' expresses a 'political principle.' It would seem that the words 'freedom from dictatorship' express a political principle quite as definitely as the words 'Republican,' 'Democrat,' or 'Socialist' and unless there is some inhibition in the statute the plaintiff is entitled to have them go upon the ballot, the idea of the framers of the statute being to inform the voters in a general way upon what particular political principle the candidate claims their suffrage. It may be a little hazy and ambiguous, but perhaps not much more than many political platforms or statements of political principles."

Law Doesn't Prohibit. The opinion interprets the law to mean simply that "no independent candidate can have himself designated as an 'independent democrat' or the like. But we find nothing prohibiting the use of these words by which to inform the voter of his political status. The words 'freedom from dictatorship, independent' succinctly inform the public that the candidate is opposed to dictatorship and he should have these three words placed on the ballot."

Justice Burnett dissented. The supreme court today in an oral opinion, overruled a second

petition for rehearing by the defense in the case of the state against Ellsworth Kelley and Jas. Willows. Kelly and Willows are two of the convicts involved in the prison break of August 12, 1925, in which two state prison guards were killed. The supreme court upheld the conviction in the lower court where they were sentenced to death.
