PIERCE OFFERS MASSACHUSETTS PHONE WAR HELP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 23.—Gov-
ernor Pierce today telegraphed Gov-
ernor Fuller of Massachusetts, offer-
ing to ask Attorney General
Van Winkle of Oregon to intervene
on behalf of this state in a petition
filed before the Interstate
Commerce Commission by the city
of Boston or the state of Massachu-
setts demanding a reduction in tele-
phone rates.

"Have been informed," says the
telegram, "that the city of Boston or
the state of Massachusetts has filed a
petition with the Interstate
Commerce Commission asking for an
investigation into the American
Telephone and Telegraph company
and their subsidiaries for the pur-
pose of securing relief from ex-
cessive telephone rates. Will ask At-
torney General of Oregon to inter-
vene if it would aid you in this
most laudable undertaking to se-
cure relief from the exactions of
this oppressive monopoly. Advise
nature of action being taken and
present status of case."

The governor some time ago an-
nounced that he was going to
cause an investigation in Oregon
of the Pacific Telephone and
Telegraph company, which is a
subsidiary of the American com-
pany and employed A. E. Clark of
Portland, to make a preliminary in-
vestigation and to report recom-
mendations. Clark reported, ad-
vising an investigation if funds
could be made available to secure
the necessary data.

LOCAL RED CROSS CHAPTER TO AID IN RELIEF WORK

The local chapter of the Ameri-
can Red Cross has been author-
ized to receive donations for the
stricken residents of the storm
swept areas of Florida and Ala-
bama, according to an announce-
ment made this morning by H. C.
Church, secretary of the organiza-
tion here. The local chapter will
accept cash donations of any de-
nomination and will see that the
money is conveyed to the national
headquarters to be distributed un-
der the direction of the Red Cross
organization.

KILN AND 50,000 POUNDS HOPS BURN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., Sept. 23.—Fire of
a mysterious origin last night de-
stroyed the Walker and Son hop
kilns near Independence, including
half of their crop. About 50,000
pounds of hopped hops were lost,
most of which were unsold. There
is some insurance. There had
been no fire in the kilns since
Tuesday.

Slave Marriages Valid

Pension Bureau Grants Claim of
Negro Soldier's Widow.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Slave
marriages among the negroes of
the South finally have been recog-
nized by the Pension Bureau.
The case was that of Gladys E.
Brown, now living at St. Paul, Minn-
nesota, the widow of Matthew
Brown, a slave, who after he was
freed enlisted in the Douglas In-
dependent Battery, U. S. Colored
Light Artillery.

The Browns were married before
freedom, according to the slave
custom. The widow wrote to Sena-
tor Shipstead of Minnesota that
after the war they were informed
that they would have to be married
again, which they did in 1872.

The Pension Bureau had the
record of that marriage. It at first
declined to allow the widow an
increase of pension from \$30 a
month to \$50 a month under the
recent pension act on the ground
that the wedding took place after
Brown's service with the Union
army.

After the letter explaining the
earlier slave marriage, the increase
was allowed.

had not held, as I do now, the
chairmanship of the senate com-
mittee on public lands. On the
other hand, you will be given an
opportunity to show just how you
expect, if elected, to advance any
of the above described legislation
to passage, when in all probability
you will not even be made a mem-
ber of such an important standing
committee.

On the subject of committee po-
sitions I shall show during the de-
bate that the finance committee
is the most powerful of all the
senate committees and that, when
by great good fortune I secured
my place on that committee, I was
selected from a list of thirty-two
senators who were applicants for
appointment to the one vacancy
that had occurred. Undoubtedly,
you, if elected, will aspire to a
place on the great finance com-
mittee and this debate will afford
you an opportunity to tell our
people just how you expect to at-
tain that membership, when un-
doubtedly the competition among
senators will be just as keen
as when I made my applica-
tion for my own place on that
committee.

Should you deem the above
mentioned subjects to be too lim-
ited in their scope, I shall gladly
debate with you any and every ad-
ditional subject which you may
care to add to the list, the com-
parison in each instance to apply
to both of us. The debate to be
held at the Municipal Auditorium
in this city not later than the 26th
of October, the chairman to be se-
lected by one representative named
by you and one by myself, acting
in conjunction with a third person
chosen by themselves.

**DODGE USED BY
FRED KNIGHT TO
CIRCLE STATES**

Around the United States in a
Dodge Brothers sedan at a cost of
slightly more than six-tenths of a
cent a mile per passenger a re-
cord of Fred Knight, former man-
ager of the Sheridan Street Meat
market. The entire 10,649 miles
were traveled at a cost of \$409.49
with a load of nearly three-quar-
ters of a ton. "The cost includes
gas, oil, grease, tires and depreciation,
which was estimated at \$187.

"Some of the roads we traveled
were almost unbelievably bad,"
said Mr. Knight. "Thirty-five miles
road in Montana were traveled
through mud hub deep. Low gear
was used all the way. It was in
Montana, too, that we had so many
punctures, causing extra tire ex-
pense for the trip. Cost for operat-
ing the car was 3.82 cents per mile.

"Much of the expense of the trip
was earned by our children who
gave concerts in 24 engagements
along the course of travel through
Chicago, Detroit, New York, Wash-
ington, St. Louis, Denver, Salt Lake
City and San Francisco. The
concerts were given in taverns."

Fred Knight and their children
Marjory, Lotus, William and Shir-
ley who played in the order of their
names, piano, cello, clarinet and
violin. Besides the passengers and
musical instruments was several
hundred pounds of miscellaneous
luggage.
