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Every Ten Has To Support An Office Holder

Many radical professional politicians who make a living out of office holding, and who are continually seeking through legislation to destroy private and build up public payrolls, talk frequently about the malign influence of "the interests" in politics, says the "National Republic".

It is not generally realized that the most active "interest" operative in politics is the office-holding interest, and that it contributes to politics more in time, which means more in (public) money, than all of the other interests combined.

Of our national income in 1924, 8.1 per cent was paid for personal services to local, state and federal governments. This payment to office holders in 1924 represented 16.8 per cent of the amount paid in wages, and 37.3 per cent of the amount paid in wages and salaries, by all the manufacturing plants of the United States in 1923, the last year for which figures are available.

Every ten persons in the United States supports one office holder or public charge. The annual cost is \$126 per person gainfully employed in other than governmental occupations. The professional politician of the demagogic sort speaks often of high transportation rates. But the railroads pay in taxes more than they pay in dividends to their owners. Since 1911 the tax bill of the railroads has risen from \$98,626,818, to \$355,475,479 in 1925.

The declared purpose of the radical politician is to still further lengthen the public payrolls, and thus still further increase the number of office-holders who have interests in politics not always identical with those of the people who pay the bills for governmental upkeep. They object to the activities of private individuals and concerns in politics, even when questions are involved which threaten the rights or the investments of the non-office-holding portion of the population.

The individual investors and workers in private enterprises who are the targets of the socialist and semi-socialist politicians, are engaged in undertakings which increase the common wealth. Some office holders are and some are not, but the public payroll is a charge upon the cost of living for every citizen.

Yankees To Depend on Pennock, Shocker and Hoyt to Turn Back Cardinals in The World Series

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—The five star pitching staff that carried the New York Yankees to victory in 1921-22 and 23 has undergone several changes since the American League opponents in a World's Series. The New Yorkers will place their main dependence in the seven game series on Herb Pennock and Urban Shocker, aided by Waite Hoyt and Dutch Ruether. Bob Shawkey and Sam Jones will probably share the relief work.

Pennock is generally conceded to be the best left-handed pitcher in the big leagues today. With over twenty victories to his credit, the slender slinger of the Yanks has rounded out his best year in baseball. His control has been uncanny and he has pitched several games without giving a base on balls, something rare for a southpaw. Pennock employs a spinning curve that breaks down and in to right-handed batters and keeps them popping the ball in the air. He requires at least four days of rest between games and will doubtless face the National Leaguers in the first game. He beat the New York Giants two games in the World's Series of 1923.

Shocker came to New York from the St. Louis Browns in a trade for Joe Bush. Shocker showed little last year because of illness but this season found him again the cunning upthaller that made him so feared when with St. Louis.

Shocker is a right hander and will doubtless be selected to pitch the second game of the series. He has won about a score of games this year. He has never been in a World's Series.

Hoyt is seasoned. Waite Hoyt started the season in a blaze of glory, but an injured elbow threw him back and it was not until this month that he flashed his early season's form. Hoyt has been through the World's Series fire in the campaigns of 1921-22-23. His best record was in 1921 when he faced the New York Giants in three games and held them to two runs in twenty-seven innings of play. A bad error let in one run. He lost his only game when his mates failed to score a run, the contest going to the Giants 1 to 0.

Ruether May Start.

Dutch Ruether came to the Yanks from Washington by the waiver route the latter part of this season. His winning record was good with the Senators, but there was a belief that he had reached the end of his effectiveness. Joining the Yankees Ruether pitched several good games and Huggins hopes to use him in the series. Last year he was not started against the Pittsburgh Pirates in the World's Series either because of lack of training condition or the accepted belief that the Pirates were poison to left handers. Ruether pitched for Cincinnati in two games of the 1919 World's Series.

winning one and losing the other. Jones Close Loser.

Sam Jones has been through the World's Series mill. In 1913 he pitched the fifth game for the Boston Americans against the Chicago National and was beaten 3 to 0. Jones only appeared for a couple of innings in two games of the 1915 Series. In 1922 when he pitched for the Yankees against the Giants, but in the following year he faced the Giants in the October game 1 and lost a well pitched game 1 to 0. Jones held the Giants to four hits, but Casey Stengel's home run beat him. In the final game Jones pitched the last two innings, but the victory of the Yankees was credited to Pennock.

Braxton, a southpaw, Walter Bonl and Myles Thomas, are second string hurlers of the Yanks, but will not likely be seen on the mound.
