STATE FAIR HAS WEDNESDAY CROWD OF ABOUT 35,000

Douglas County Exhibits of Grains and Italian Prunes Are Awarded First Prizes.

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 30.—Yesterday was one of the biggest Wednesdays, if not the biggest, in the history of the Oregon State Fair. Officially it is estimated that about 25,500 persons paid their way into the exposition, the total attendance being about 35,000. Salem turned out en masse yesterday, with schools and all places of business closed.

Today is Portland day, and there is sure to be another banner attendance if the sun shines.

Ed School of Albany, was elected president of the Oregon Pure Bred Livestock association which held its annual meeting at the fair grounds last night. Douglas County Men Win W. B. Garrett of Glendale was yesterday awarded the recognition for his exhibits of wheat, oats and rye. The barley sweepstakes went to L. C. Warner of Cornelius.

In the commercial exhibits for the best display of three boxes of fruit, E. R. Oatman of Medford placed first. Among first prize winners on fruit and nut displays were: Pears, D. M. Lowe of Ashland; peaches, E. R. Oatman of Medford; Italian prunes, Arthur Marsh of Looking Glass; Frankette walnuts, Fred O'Brien of Hillsboro; filberts, Dr. Nixon of Forest Grove.

All major awards in the Holstein cattle exhibit, with one exception, went to the Meadow Lawn Dairy of Salem, operated by F. W. Durbin and son.

Horse Show Winners The night horse show again drew a tremendous crowd last night. Shikara, owned by Mrs. Edward Grolle, of Portland, won the blue ribbon in the combination five gaited event.

Nanette, an Aaron M. Frank entry, first in the ladies three gaited saddle group, and for the third night in succession first place in the draft horse competition went to the Dammeier Milk company of Portland, H. G. McCroskey of Garfield, Wash., placing second, while third went to Burge of Albany and fourth to Moss, Leadbetter and Hudson of La Grande.

In the three gaited saddle event, Frank's Nanette won first for the second time, second placing going to Allegra, owned by Mrs. D. W. Mason of Garden Home, and third went to a Leroy Fields entry from Portland.

The heavy harness stake of \$250 went to J. D. Farrell, Seattle railway man, with Tuxton and Seaton Septimus, a pair that were champions recently in the Madison Square Garden show in New York. Oswald West of Portland took second and Mrs. E. E. Stone of Oakland third.

Riding Mildred Muller, Miss Leslie Kerns of Portland won first in the heavyweight hunter group, Aaron M. Frank placed second with Courtney Smith and Natt McDougall of Portland was third with Tiny Tim.

W. R. Kerron of Garden Home won in the roadster pair, Harvey Dick of Portland was second. Horace Stewart, a Salem youth, was awarded the silver cup, winning over five competitors.

A James McCleave pony was winner of the musical chair event, a new feature.

Wallowa Fair Winner. LA GRANDE, Ore., Sept. 30.—The annual Wallowa county fair opened at Enterprise yesterday with the greatest number of exhibits of all classes on hand.

In its history, indications that Wallowa county is relying more upon dairy cattle is shown by the increase in exhibits, estimated at 200 per cent over last year. Although 35 new horse stalls were built it was necessary to utilize nearly every barn in Enterprise to house the equestrian display.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30.—President Donnelly of the Northern Pacific in a statement here yesterday said it was expected that the Interstate Commerce Commission would use its good offices in an effort to adjust the differences between the northern lines and the Southern Pacific in the central Oregon railroad situation, or would permit the northern lines to construct an extension of

the Oregon Trunk from Bend to Klamath Falls independent of the Southern Pacific.

Mr. Donnelly said that conferences between the two groups would be resumed as soon as Chairman De Forest, of the Southern Pacific returns from Europe, possibly early in October.

Chairman Atchison of the Interstate Commerce Commission has written a letter to President Donnelly, suggesting that the roads get together on an agreement, or notify the commission that an agreement is impossible, Donnelly disclosed.

SOUTH DAKOTA IS COMPLAINT OVER RAIL GRAIN RATES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—A complaint against the existing freight rates on grain moving out of South Dakota to Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, California, Arizona, Oregon, New Mexico and Nevada was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission today by the South Dakota railroad commission. Western railroads, the complaint charged, require South Dakota grain shippers to pay a combination of local freight rates, while shippers in other grain growing states are given through rates which in all cases are lower than the South Dakota charges. The commission was asked to prescribe through rates to the complainants.

DOUGLAS COUNTY BOY MAY BE NEXT HEAVYWEIGHT KING

Roy Wilson of Reston Being Groomed by Marine Corps to Battle Gene Tunney.

A Douglas county boy may soon be the heavyweight champion of the world, by Gene Tunney's own admission. The prospective contender for heavyweight honors is Roy Wilson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Wilson of Reston. Roy Wilson, who stands 6 feet 5 inches tall and weighs 206 pounds, is not quite 20 years old, but has been slugging the best of the Marine Corps boxers to sleep in bunks with sailors and marines of the Pacific battle fleet.

Wilson is now being groomed by the Marine corps for a shot at Gene Tunney. Wilson and Tunney had a chat last spring, discussing training methods, and Tunney at that time made the statement that Wilson was a coming champion. Although the lad has been boxing more than a year, he has put away some of the best fighters in the Marine corps and navy. He has the backing of the entire Pacific fleet and with a little more experience will be able to make a fine showing. His ability has already attracted considerable attention among sport fans, and boxing officials predict that he will be a great fighter, particularly as he is a terrific puncher.

Harry Evans, chief petty officer on board U. S. S. West Virginia, to which ship Wilson is now assigned, writes that the local lad is working hard to become the peer of Gene Tunney and that within the next two or three years he can be expected to make a name for himself.

MARKET RATINGS

(Associated Press Local Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30.—Choice apples are cheap, Jonathan and Grimes Golden selling at \$1.00 a box retail.

The local hog market is weak at 19 cents a pound. All dealers are loaded down with country dressed hogs. Veal is also weaker at 16c to 15c. Eggs and butter are firm in price.

Except that light hens are dragging, poultry prices are firm. Production of potatoes reported by the federal bureau of markets showed for September a yield of about 6,000,000 bushels over the estimate for August 1, but the total was still 45,000,000 bushels below the five year average and 26,000,000 bushels above last year's output.

Locally, the rains of this month have matured potatoes to a degree that will make up for the shortage which seemed certain a month ago. No. 1 stock of late digging has not yet appeared in the Portland market, although earlier stuff is well sold out. Demand is reported to be slightly better than usually is noted at this time of year.

Portland dealers are paying \$24 to \$28 a ton for potatoes at shipping points. Only prime quality is desired.

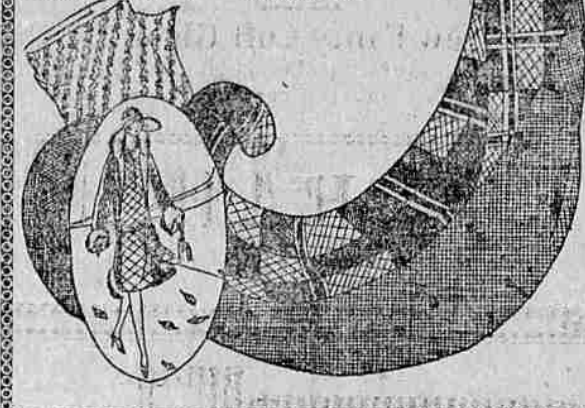
