JUDGE FITZGERALD OF PENDLETON DIES

PENDLETON, Oct. 1.—Judge Thomas Fitzgerald, 72, Pendleton

DEFENSE GIVEN HEAVY JOLT IN AIMEE'S TRIAL

Mrs. McPherson by sight and recalled having seen her at the hotel carrying a "portfolio" on May 18. Cross-examined by Gilbert, Melville said he first saw Mrs. McPherson at 10 o'clock in the morning. She wore a white felt hat. District Attorney Keyes, apparently determined to take more drastic measures to protect his witnesses, was on his feet repeatedly as Gilbert shot his questions at rapid fire.

Melville said he went to see Roland Rich Woolley, Mrs. McPherson's personal counsel, but denied he had made any sworn statement at that time. Melville said Mrs. McPherson wore a white dress when he first saw her but would not agree positively that it was a "temple uniform." The woman went to a hotel room, staying there half an hour. Gilbert exhibited a white dress with gold stripes.

Melville refused under a barrage of questions to definitely say "yes" or "no" as to whether the dress "looked like" the one the woman wore.

A moment later Keyes jumped to his feet in a general protest at what he called Gilbert's unfair tactics and won his point. Gilbert was forced to change his line of questioning.

Gilbert produced what purported to be a statement by Melville at Angelus Temple taken by a shorthand reporter. When certain statements in it were challenged by the witness, Judge Blake ordered Melville to take the transcript and mark the mistakes.

Gilbert then read the statement. In it, Melville told of seeing the evangelist's name on her portfolio. The description of the woman's clothing coincided very closely with Melville's testimony today. She came out of the hotel, the statement said, about 10:20 or 10:30. The transcript ended with a wish by Melville that his statement would not prove detrimental to the evangelist.

later at a hotel. The trial at San Diego occasioned considerable acrimony. Some witnesses testified that they believed Colonel Williams was ill and not intoxicated, as alleged.

General Butler maintained he violated no traditions as a guest in bringing the charges and that his charges were not based on what went on at the Williams home, but on the colonel's conduct later at a hotel. General Butler said that cocktails were served at the party but that he did not partake of them but sat on the porch while most of the drinking was going on. After conviction, Colonel Williams was reduced several points in his ranking and transferred to San Francisco, May 22 last, where he was placed in charge of marine recruiting in the western district. General Butler also was transferred to San Francisco later.

An autopsy performed by Dr. Shelby Strange showed no trace of alcohol in Colonel Williams' stomach. The stomach was sent to the city chemist for a thorough analysis.

The board of inquiry, appointed by Rear Admiral Thomas Washington, commander of the twelfth naval district, is composed of Colonel D. P. Hall and Captain William R. MacNulty, marine corps, and Lieutenant Commander H. C. Bishop, U. S. N.

Another theory as to the cause of Colonel Williams' death gained strength. That was that he was asleep at the wheel of the car as he reached the eastern extremity of Townsend street. The car did not turn into the embankment at Townsend street, eye witnesses said, but continued straight across the waterfront artery and onto the pier without its occupant making an effort to stop it.
