PAYMENTS MADE ON BONDED DEBTS, STATE OF OREGON

(Associated Press United Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., Oct. 1.—State Treasurer Kay today paid to the Oregon fiscal agent in New York \$641,000 principal and \$840,000.45 interest on state highway bonds, a total of \$1,481,000.45. This makes the total paid \$2,633,250. The debt of \$1,197,000. Prior to this year \$1,436,250 has been paid, which, with the amount paid this year makes the total paid \$2,633,250. This deducted from \$38,700,000, the total amount of highway bonds sold by the state, leaves \$36,066,750 still outstanding.

Also paid today with \$503,625 interest on world war veterans' state aid bonds of which \$23,000,000 is outstanding.

A. L. Lindbeck of Salem, with single comb Rhode island reds, won first prize for the best five males of one variety, with second place going to O. R. Winters, of Newberg, with his single comb black minoras.

Best birds in each of the four main classifications were as follows:

Asiatic class, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Crittser, Mullina, first, light Brahma cock, second with light Brahma hen.

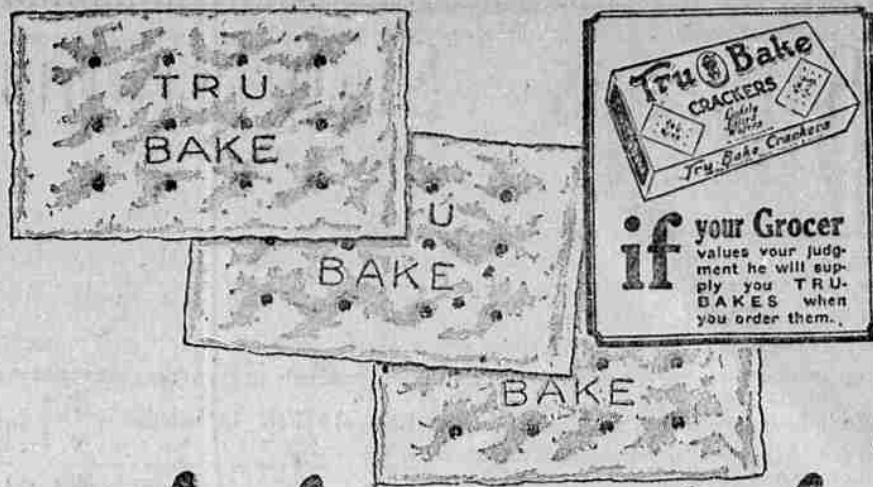

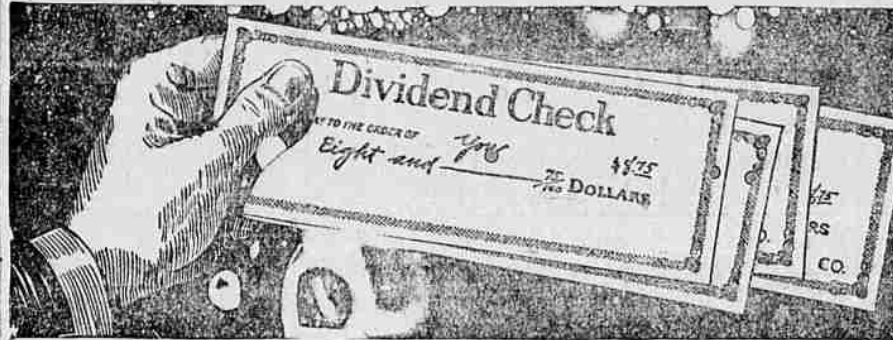
