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Prohibition Before Voters in Eight States at November Poll

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—(A. P.)—A section of the state constitution "enabling the legislature to provide for manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, such amendment to be operative so long as in conflict with the laws of the United States."

The Missouri vote will be on the question of repealing the state enforcement laws passed in 1923.

The Montana proposition is on the question of repealing all state laws relating to liquor control, except the law forbidding sale of liquor to minors.

The Nevada referendum is in the form of a memorial to congress to submit the Eighteenth Amendment again to the states.

W. C. T. U. Active
In these eight states, the W. C. T. U. with 699,000 members, has laid plans to concentrate a fight to get a "100 per cent dry vote."

In Illinois, George E. Brennan, democratic candidate for U. S. senator, who has advocated modification of the eighteenth amendment in his campaign speeches, is being actively opposed by the dries.

In New York the dries are backing F. W. Cristman, independent and dry opponent of Senator Wadsworth.

Depend On Federal Law

England's Unique Trio

Mrs. Pankhurst and 2 Daughters Far Apart in Life Work.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—(A. P.)—Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and her two daughters have been given the title of England's most remarkable family trio.

Mother and daughters all sit down at the same table, now and then, but their interests in life and their aims, politically and religiously, and their methods of bringing about their respective reforms designed to regenerate society, are as far apart as the poles.

But they never discuss politics or religion over the tea cups.

Mrs. Pankhurst, long known as the militant suffrage leader, has taken up the cudgel against Communism, while her daughter Sylvia goes on, more energetically than ever, advocating the teachings of Lenin.

Miss Christabel, the eldest of the two girls, is tremendously interested in religion. She loathes politics.

Mother After Votes
Mrs. Pankhurst herself has joined the Conservative party and for weeks has been addressing meetings in her endeavor to rouse the British women voters against Communism and all its works.

As one who did her share in the effort to win the rights of citizenship for women, she is now "out" she declares, to defend what she has long worked for: the voting power of citizenship in order to defeat the "dreadful machinations of the revolutionaries."

Christabel's Religion
While Mrs. Pankhurst is renewing her youth and seeking to save society by political propaganda, Christabel has soared into the atmosphere of religious prophecy.

Miss Christabel is preparing to start a lecture tour in London and the provinces under the auspices of the Second Advent Movement. Miss Pankhurst will tell her audience that she sees nothing ahead but economic trouble, social and political decadence, which can only be cured by the second coming of Christ, which she believes to be at hand.

She notes the signs in wars and rumors of wars, earthquakes and the rise of false prophets. But these things must be; it is the Divine program, she feels.

Sylvia Preaches Sovietism
Miss Sylvia has no use for constitutional propaganda, or the Second Advent in her scheme for saving the world. She has separated herself from her mother and sister and allied herself heart and soul with the Soviet Movement in Russia.

She is a person of a certain kind of courage and Moscow. She considers Sovietism as accomplishing all the reforms needed for the regeneration of society.

While she earns her living as an artist, she helps to spread the tenets of her faith. Her movements are "secret in mystery." Her old friends of the days when she edited "The Worker's Dreadnought," in Fleet Street know her no more.

Change Architecture.
When this overtopping occurs, a structure can still hold its rank as one of the "leading buildings" through distinctive features other than height. HUNDREDS PERISH FROM STARVATION IN CHINESE CITY

Negotiations to End Siege of Wuchang by Cantonese Forces Have So Far Proved Failure.

(Associated Press Special Wire.)
HANKOW, China, Oct. 1.—The civilian population of Wuchang, across the Yangtze River from here, is entirely without food and hundreds are reported to be perishing. Colder weather is increasing the suffering. There is no coal and no fire wood and the meager remaining food supply is held entirely by the military.

The result of the siege laid to the city by the "red" Cantonese forces who have blocked it to force the surrender of the northern troops holding it.

Peace negotiations at Wuchang have been broken off entirely, but through the efforts of the chamber of commerce both the contending factions have agreed to permit removal of the women and children to Hankow.

The rumored advance toward Hankow of the armies of Sun Chuan-fang, overlord of the five eastern provinces who is now arrayed against the Cantonese, apparently has not alarmed the latter who assert they have the Kiangsi situation well in hand.

APPLE INDUSTRY IN WEST SHOWS RAPID GROWTH

The great apple industry of the far west has come to the front within the past twenty years. It began after half a century of commercial apple growing in the east, but has expanded rapidly along its own lines. In many recent seasons nearly half the market supply of apples has been produced in the eleven states known as the "western boxed apple region."

The industry has developed methods of its own in handling, packing and marketing. These methods are so different in all the various operations which attend the progress of the fruit from orchard to consumer that the western boxed apple is considered as a class by itself in recent apple investigations conducted by the Department of Agriculture.

In a bulletin, "Marketing Western Boxed Apples," a comprehensive survey is given showing the start and rapid growth of the industry and how it tended to concentrate in a few northwestern states, favored by conditions of climate, soil, and water supply, and helped by suitable methods of production and marketing.

Washington, Oregon, and Idaho, usually termed the Pacific northwestern apple region have been shipping the greater part of the winter supply of boxed apples. A few productive valley regions such as the Wenatchee, Yakima and Hood River sections, have become prominent because of immense annual shipments of high grade fruit.

The reputation of northwestern boxed apples seems to depend on choice varieties that are well grown, handled carefully, graded uniformly according to size and color, and put up attractively. Thus the number of fruits in a box and the appearance of the apples may be determined quite reliably by the marks on the package, and trading is placed on a fairly definite basis.

The list of varieties is composed of apples excelling in color, quality, and general appearance, such as the Winesap, Jonathan, Rome, Spitzenberg, Delicious and Yellow Newtown. Many leading eastern kinds like Baldwin, Greening, Northern Spy, York, and Ben Davis, are not important in the boxed pack.

The high standards of the western pack are attended with relatively heavy expenses for labor and material. There is a large percentage of loss from unused cull stock. High cost of shipment to distant markets and numerous marketing expenses are other handicaps. Apparently the western grower received but little more for a bushel of his fruit than does the eastern orchardist notwithstanding the higher price paid in eastern markets.

A study of the retail price indicates that growers may receive less than one-fourth of the amount paid by distant consumers. The main advantage and source of profit of the boxed apple industry is in the larger and more regular crops produced under irrigation, cultivation and favorable climate.

Growers sell their apples through local cash buyers or through co-operative associations. In the consuming markets to dealers and to some extent through commission firms. Most of the apples are sold to a shipping point. Co-operative selling is more prominent than in eastern apple regions. Sales in city markets are made chiefly through the usual classes of dealers, but the fruit auctions handle possibly 20 per cent of the shipments. In some markets most of the boxed fruit goes to the auction room. This method of selling is not usually applied to eastern apples, but is practicable for the western pack because of the uniformity and established reputation of many of the brands.

Boxed apple exports exceeded six million bushels in each of several recent seasons. The boxed pack is becoming popular in continental Europe and in various markets of Latin America. Direct shipments from Pacific coast ports by the water route have proved a successful and growing branch of the export trade.

The department's bulletin "Marketing Western Boxed Apples," (No. 1415-1) tells of the little known apple sections in western valleys and along mountain slopes. It describes methods of harvesting, packing, selling, storing, transportation, and distribution. Principal markets for boxed apples are described with their differences of practice and preference and other features. Cost of marketing is worked out in some detail and much special information is given on prices, foreign markets, the trade outlook, and the statistical side of the industry.
