

## American League Entries Have Won 12 Out Of 21 Series, But Nationals Registered More Runs

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—(A. P.)—The American league's entries have been triumphant in twelve of the twenty-one world's series conflicts since 1905 but there is plenty of hope for the National league's followers in the championship record over this period.

In games won and lost, the American leaguers have only a scant margin of three while the National league's outfits actually have tallied more runs.

Brightest of the feathers in the National league cap, however, are the achievements in three times downing the junior circuit entry without the loss of a game. The Chicago Cubs anothered the Detroit Tigers in 1907, the Boston Braves ran roughshod over the Athletics in 1914 and the New York Giants overwhelmed the Yankees in 1922. The games in each of the 1907 and 1922 conflicts were the best the American Leaguers could do in these series.

Another outstanding fact in world's series history is that no Boston team ever has met defeat. The Red Sox hanging up four triumphs and the Braves one, will fall the burden of filling in as

an infield substitute in case of accident or should any of the regulars be withdrawn for another batter during a game. Gazzella for several weeks substituted for Joe Judge at third this year when the Yank third sacker suffered from injuries. Gazzella showed that he was equally at home at shortstop when Mark Koenig showed unmistakable signs of nerves by booting easy chances in tight games. Gazzella is a light hitter averaging under the 250 mark but does his best work in pinches.

Aaron Ward, for years the club's second baseman and who to the New Yorks as a third baseman, has been seen little in the infield this year. He has been called to hit for left-hand pitchers against the Yankees from Washington where he played as a substitute last year at second base for Bucky Harris. Adams saw a few innings of world series play against the Pittsburgh nationals. He has been called upon as a pinch batter and substitute runner this year but has done little work in the infield.

The New York outfield regulars are Ruth, Mousell and Combs but within the last six weeks of the season's play, Huggins has withdrawn Combs when the opposition put in a left-hander and stationed Paschal in centerfield. This weakens the defense but Paschal does on left hand pitching, which offsets his lesser fielding ability. Paschal is a 300 hitter, a fine thrower and a fast man on the bases.

Carlyle was purchased this season from the Boston Red Sox for use as a substitute pitcher against right hand hurling. His batting average is close to the .300 mark. Carlyle is an uncertain fielder.

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## KLAMATH FALLS STILL TRYING TO DIVERT AIR MAIL

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 2.—Vernon Brookwater, pilot for the Pacific Air Transport, who left Portland this morning with air mail to be landed at Medford for transport south, was unable to land anywhere in the Rogue River valley because of dense fog and brought the mail in here.

Long distance communication with the mail landing field at Medford disclosed the fact that the pilot due in early this morning with San Francisco mail from the south had not landed, nor had been heard from since leaving San Francisco.

Pilot Brookwater since landing here, has tried unsuccessfully to rise above the Rogue River fog banks and take the mail into Medford, but was forced to turn back near the summit of the Cascades, when from an altitude of nearly two miles he saw that the entire valley was blanketed with fog which made landing impossible.

He is now awaiting orders at the landing field of the Klamath Air Service company.

Accompanying him is Relief Pilot P. W. Anderson, flyer who ran into the same fog bank Thursday and who was forced down near Marshfield.

## ROSEBURG WILL PLAY COTTAGE GROVE FRIDAY

The Roseburg high school football team will have its first test Friday, October 2, at 2:15 p. m., when it meets the Cottage Grove squad in the first gridiron battle of the season. An effort is being made to have the stores and offices of the city closed during the game, as it is very important that the team this year be given cooperation and support in its activities.

One of the most important reasons for closing is the need of financial support. The school has a year to play five out of seven games at home. This means that they must pay the expenses of the visiting teams, and consequently must depend upon Roseburg people to attend the contests and contribute to the funds necessary to bring the outside players to the city. The high school this year has much less money to operate its athletics than formerly, due to the fact that the organization whereby the 9th grade goes into the Junior high school, cuts down the student body, so that the smaller amount of dues received this year gives a reduced athletic fund.

The layers also need support and encouragement for without the moral support of the home town, the team's morale is apt to suffer. Roseburg has a good team this year. It may not win all the games, but at least it will be a fighting team and one able to give a good account of itself and is deserving the full support of Roseburg people.
