spirit of appreciation to Dr. Suzzalo.

Story of the Dispute.

Although Governor Hartley has bitterly attacked him, President Suzzalo has never voiced a reply to the denunciations. When informed of his dismissal, Suzzalo told newspaper men that he had nothing to say.

Hartley's ill feeling toward the educator is said to have started when Suzzalo, as chairman of the state council of defense during the World War, advocated an eight-hour day in Washington lumber camps. Hartley, a lumber owner, opposed the suggestion, which was adopted. To the state legislature last winter, the governor advocated curtailment of appropriations for state institutions of higher learning. Suzzalo spoke before a legislative committee in opposition to the recommendation.

The ousted principal graduated from Leland Stanford University in 1899 and taught there and at Columbia, Yale and California universities.

In 1919 he was offered the presidency of the University of Pittsburgh at double the salary he was receiving here.

Dean Thomson came to the University of Washington in 1902 as a professor of Latin. He was appointed dean of the college of liberal arts in 1917 and dean of faculties early this year.

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PEN CONTROL BY STATE BOARD IS PROPOSED

Institution has its manufacturing and industrial plants, farm land, etc., but in spite of these facts it costs \$33 per month for each inmate. Now consider the two state hospitals where many of the inmates are mentally and physically unable to work and we find that the per capita cost is only \$16 per month. These figures show that there is something decidedly wrong in the management and that a change is advisable.

Furthermore, the manufacturing and industrial output of the penitentiary should be increased. This will require good business control. Records show that the state board of control has in the past made a good showing for business ability and the business interests would be safeguarded by placing the penitentiary under the direction of that body.

Will Be Hardboiled

"If elected governor, as I am confident I will be, I promise this, that in the matter of pardons and paroles I will be hardboiled. I believe that the citizens of Oregon should be considered as well as the inmate of the prison in the granting of pardons and paroles. The average term of a man sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oregon state penitentiary is less than eight years. These things I believe serve to break down law enforcement. Indiscriminate pardoning of prisoners leads to laxity in law enforcement.

"Laws should be enforced by people who themselves abide by the laws they are called upon to enforce. I elected governor of Ore-

gon I will appoint to enforce the prohibition law men who are themselves honest and who do not drink. No bootleggers, no ex-convicts, no stool pigeons will be appointed to enforce laws, and at the end of my term you will not find my appointees in the penitentiary for infractions of the laws they were named to enforce.

Budget Is Wanted

"Another change that I will endeavor to bring about is in the matter of the state budget, and here is where no one can say I am desiring to escape responsibility. I believe that the governor should be the budget officer and that responsibility for state expenditures should be placed squarely upon him. He should have the right to appoint the budget board and should be given the authority to supervise the expenditures of all state officers and bureaus. Every appointment which I make as governor will be with the understanding that I shall supervise expenditures and I believe that all offices should be put on the same basis so that the matter of state economy should be put directly up to the governor and he should be responsible.

"Another matter is that of a definitely outlined program. Any man in business plans ahead. He outlines his program for the future. The state should do the same. For instance take the matter of armories. At each session of the legislature there are strong delegations from various places, each wanting an armory. The state cannot afford to build all of these or even half of them. This condition results in a great deal of trading in the legislature. I believe that the governor, the legislature and the state military authorities should get together, lay out a program for a period of years, designating places needing armories of the first class, to be built first, then secondary armories and then armories of a third class. In this way we would get better armories and in a way in which we could pay for them. We would plan ahead for a program of construction over a period of years and work to that program. I use this as an illustration of how the state government should be run.

"In conclusion I want to state that I am bound by no promises. I have made no agreements with individuals binding me to any policy or act. The only promises I have made are those made openly and publicly at meetings such as these. If elected I will give four years of the best there is in me and will not use the state of Oregon as a Chautauqua circuit."

John Warren, tackle, went in to replace Captain Al Sinclair on the first string. Ted Pope also went in at end in place of Ed Stanson, while Nick Carter took center in place of Carl Klippel. More changes may be made before Coach McEwan is ready for the Huskies, he has indicated.

Meanwhile, the Oregon students are making extensive plans for a rally to be staged in Portland Friday evening. The students will leave on special trains Friday afternoon for Portland, and festivities will continue from the time they reach that city until the game is called.
