RECEIPTS OF STATE FAIR NOT EQUAL TO AMOUNT LAST YEAR

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
 SALEM, Ore., Oct. 5.—Receipts of the state fair which closed here Saturday night totaled \$73,520, according to announcement made yesterday from the office of the state fair board. This was \$1220 less than the receipts for the 1925 fair, due to rain that fell four days last week.
 Single tickets at the fair just closed yielded \$35,493.75, while last year's single tickets brought in \$36,968.45. Receipts of the night horse show were \$5,100 as against \$5,410 last year. The drop in grandstand receipts was the most marked. For the year it was \$5,750, while a year ago the total returned by the stand was \$7,269. Rain that kept many persons away from the races was the cause.
 Season tickets produced \$10,026 as against \$14,149 last year. Receipts from the concessions are expected to go higher than ever before, but have not yet been totaled.

SAVING POLITICS KEEPS DARWIN OUT OF SCHOOLS

The controversy over the teaching of the Darwinian theory of evolution in the public schools of the south has its origin in politics, according to an article by Sidney Sutherland in this week's Liberty. Commenting on the recent embargo placed by the Texas Textbook Commission, of certain schoolbooks in which the theory is mentioned, Mr. Sutherland writes:
 "The evolution 'hoax' has been a political football in Texas. It has in other southern states, for many years. Most bills prohibiting its teaching have been sidetracked by the better informed legislators or killed when they came to a vote. There is tremendous pressure, however, from the fundamentalist lobbies, and from time to time such measures are adopted and the schoolbooks changed.
 "In the case of Texas," the writer continues, "the penalty for an author and publisher, who persist in writing such illegal stuff, and for teachers who willfully teach it, seems to be in the fact that the textbook commission simply will not approve the books, and of course they cannot be used in the schools."

Early Peoples Knew of Possibilities of Iron

The peoples of the Near East were among the earliest manufacturers of iron, according to Dr. J. Newton Friend in an address before the members of the Royal Institution, London.
 In 1800 B. C. the Hittites were using iron weapons in their numerous wars, and among the treasures of early history preserved to posterity is a letter thought to have been addressed to Rameses II of Egypt from the Hittite king, saying that he is sending with the communication an iron dagger.
 The Romans were skilled metallurgists, with considerable knowledge of how to handle iron ores. Virgil's Aeneid, written around 40 B. C., contains an account of a smithy in full blast, and Pliny in his "Natural History," which was brought out in 77 A. D., shows an equal familiarity with the working of the metal. An iron ring recently unearthed from a Roman site was evidently made by soldering together the ends of a bent strip of iron with some sort of copper alloy.
 Cast iron, said Doctor Friend, was first known in Sussex in 1850 and soon became fairly common.

Vanishing Heath Hen Was Farmer's Friend

The New England heath hen is now in the last stages of extinction, the London Courier-Journal reports. The farmer has found that he not only has lost a source of food for his table, but a protector of his crops.
 Like the western prairie chicken, to which it is closely allied, and the "Bob White" of the Central West, the heath hen is a great enemy of insect pests. But of the thousands that once inhabited field and woods patch, less than 100 are alive today, and these are found only on the island of Martha's Vineyard.
 The Middle West has a prolific food supply when the passenger pigeons died off. But the wild pigeon was otherwise of little economic value. It was largely a grain eater, though beech mast and weed seeds also formed its food.
 The heath hen, however, is as valuable as the quail to farmers. Ornithologists and conservationists have pointed this out. Hence efforts are being made to save the bird from extinction and, if possible, to bring it back to its former numbers.

Tea-Totallers

The English poor owe their indigestion to their mania for tea drinking. An hour before he gets up every Englishman drinks on an empty stomach a huge cupful of tea as strong as it can be brewed. This furnishes the foundation for the tea jar that he will hold up in the course of the day.
 A peasant woman in an English village once asked an American visitor to have a cupful of tea. But the tea was as black as ink, and the American declined.
 "How long have you had that teapot hanging on the stove?" she asked.
 "Why, miss, I never take it off," the peasant woman replied. "I put in a fresh pennyworth when it gets weak and then, when the pot gets full of leaves, I put in my hand and pull out a handful for my old man to smoke."

French Independence Day

The name "Day of the Bastille" is given in French history to the 14th of July, 1789, because on that day the mob, assisted by the Gardes Francaise, rose in insurrection and destroyed the prison fortress of the Bastille. During the years 1790-1792, the anniversary of this event was called "La Fete de la Federation." The Day of the Bastille is also known as the "Day of July," and is celebrated by the French as a patriotic holiday, much as the Americans celebrate the signing of the Declaration of Independence on the Fourth of July.

China's Many Rulers

The early condition of China was tribal, which before Christ merged into a vast feudal system nominally ruled by many contemporaneous dynasties, dated from 2205 B. C. The king of Ts'in put down all other rulers and assumed the title of Hwang Ti or emperor. The principal dynasties from this period are Han, 206 B. C. to 220 A. D.; Tang, 618 to 906; Sung, 960 to 1270; Yuan the Mongol, 1280 to 1367; the Ming, 1368 to 1644; the Ch'ing or T'ing Manchu, 1644 to fall of the empire and date of republic.
