MISSIONERS FLEE WUCHANG BUT ARE TAKEN BY BANDITS

Soldiers Paid to Protect Them Run Away—City Still in Desperate Situation

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

HANKOW, China, Oct. 4.—Bandits yesterday attacked a large party of missionaries while they were proceeding to their stations at Shenchow, Hunan province, and robbed and carried off three Americans. The Americans are Miss Minerva S. Well, Reformed Mission; Miss Lydia Koebbe, evangelical mission and Karl H. Beck, Reformed Mission. Seven other missionaries who escaped are now safe at Taoyuan. They are Miss G. Brunner, Mrs. J. Granner, both Americans, or the Evangelical Mission; Miss Schweitzer of the Evangelical Mission; Misses R. N. Mesamer, Amisaki and Henneberg and a Mr. Helgenman, all of the Reformed Church.

The party had paid \$153 for the services of thirty armed soldiers of the Chinese guard but when the bandits appeared, the soldiers fled. About 500 northern troops who attempted a sortie from the beleaguered city of Wuchang today in an attempt to recapture Pagoda Hill from the Cantonese, were mowed down by the southerners who used machine guns. The northerners attempted to return to Wuchang and found the city gates closed against them. It is believed all were killed. The northern troops within Wuchang, who have been holding it for some time, are growing desperate. While the Cantonese without have adopted the embargo method of besieging the city, the civilian population is starving.

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MILL CREEK MAY BE USED AS FEEDING SITE FOR SALMON

Little Mill Creek, near Reedsport, a tributary of the Umpqua river, has been recommended to the commercial fishermen as the location for the proposed feeding ground of young silversides, according to the announcement made by R. E. Clanton, supervisor of commercial fish hatcheries in Oregon, who was a visitor in Reedsport Friday and Saturday of the past week, says the Port Umpqua Courier.

Mr. Clanton, accompanied by J. A. Zachary, deputy warden of this city, has been spending the last three weeks in this territory investigating proposed sites for the only suitable location found is the feeding grounds, but so far the Little Mill Creek. The investigators had in mind a location where there would be a natural outlet from the reservoir into the Umpqua river or into the Pacific ocean. In this manner they propose to reduce the loss of young fish before they reach the sea. Approximately a saving of between twenty-five to fifty per cent could be brought about in the output of the young silverside salmon. At present there is a tremendous toll paid to the lake and other predatory fish in the Umpqua river.

With the location of a feeding ground where the silversides can be held over the second winter, until they had attained a growth of ten inches in length, a cost saving could be made of the hatchery at the upper Umpqua station. The idea for the next year is to prepare for the bringing down of the young silversides in cans when they have reached the proper size for liberation into ponds, constructed in Little Mill creek, and to have properly constructed fumes, carry for the surplus water and to care for the spring frosts.

"I believe the plan is a practical one and can be worked out to advantage. At Alsea, where we have one of our best hatcheries, the site is located on a creek with fumes to care for the surplus water from the ponds. Dams can be made to improve the water and the fumes to carry off the surplus. At Little Mill Creek the water can be impounded in a like manner the fumes constructed and the silversides fed and held over the second winter until they have reached the proper size.

"All the fishermen that I have interviewed are favorable to the plan and it is up to them to secure the feeding grounds. If they want them there, action can be taken to have them established. The plan is absolutely feasible and the feeding grounds at Little Mill Creek can be an actuality," commented Mr. Clanton.

Additional ponds can be made, the fish increased in length and enough feeding space for several million of the silverside salmon. No action will be started upon the proposed site until after the fishing season, the same sort of concerted action will be launched by the fishermen of the lower Umpqua.

STEIWER URGES STATE SUPPORT G. O. P. REGIME

Our nation was faced with the grave situation which inevitably followed the World War. We were then technically at war with the central European powers. We had incurred a war debt of approximately twenty-seven billion dollars. The federal payroll was the largest in American history. We were facing a process of deflation in prices. Debt settlements with the allied nations had not been effected. A spirit of doubt and uncertainty filled the minds of the people and we were hearing on all hands the threat of bolshevism. For the past six years the American nation has addressed itself to the great problem of reconstruction. The war debts are nearly all settled. Over five billion dollars has been paid upon our own war obligations. By successive reduction in expenditures and by increase in the national income, the burden of the greater part of the tax of federal taxation has been removed from the backs of the people of America. This achievement of reducing war debt in spite of reduced federal tax burden is a

notable achievement. It is more notable because it has been accomplished by a prosperity fairly well distributed over the country. Still beside this great achievement, still a greater accomplishment in the cause of good government has been made by American people. They have turned their backs upon the theory of economic restraint. The threat of bolshevism has been dissipated and constitutional government is as safe in America, if indeed it is not safer than it has been for a full half century. A happy law-abiding and fairly prosperous people who enjoy the privileges of American citizenship are almost entirely alone in their good fortune. The achievement of successful reconstruction following the World War is peculiar to America. No place in the Old World can even approach it. It is a splendid tribute and it is a splendid testimony of the capacity of American people for self-government. The fact that it is under a Republican administration commends that administration to the faith and confidence of the patriotic citizens of this country.

Oregon's Allegiance
So far as the election of the United States Senator is concerned, the paramount question for the people to determine is, whether a great Republican shall remain true to its Republican principle and send to the national capital a Republican senator who will aid a great Republican administration to carry on and maintain this work of reconstruction which the American people entrusted to the Republican party and which is yet unfinished.

"And now may I speak directly of my candidacy as the regularly elected nominee of the Republican party. I am a standard bearer only elected by the people. I am attempting to
