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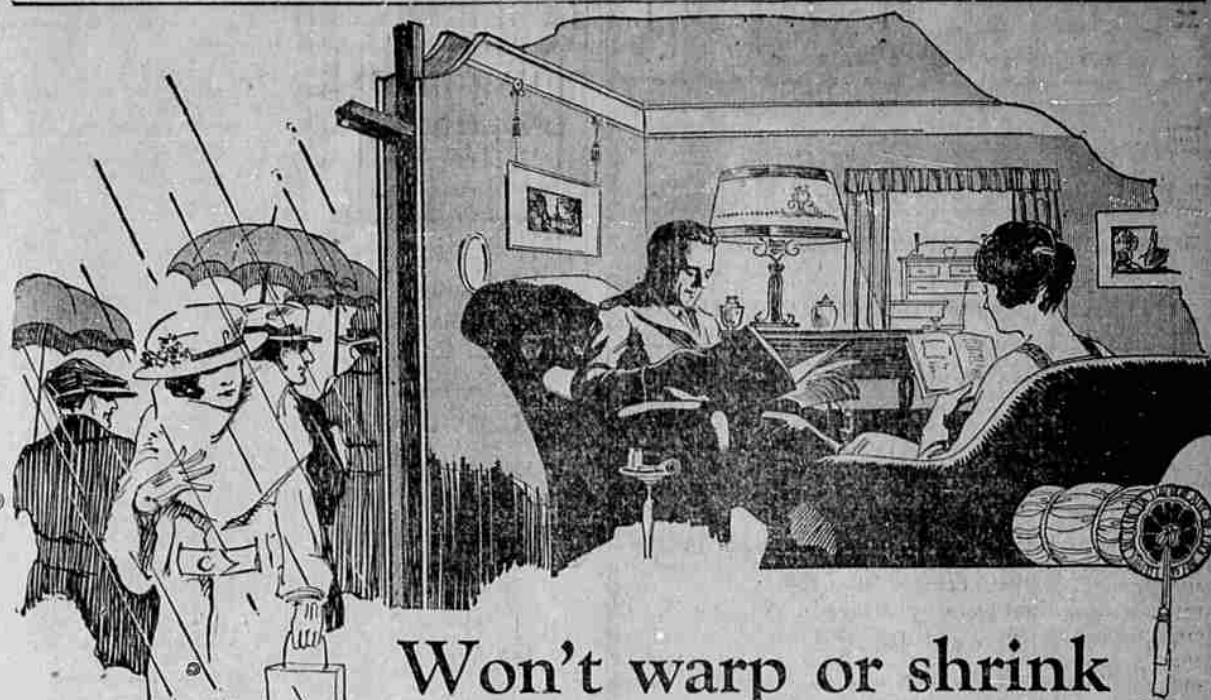

**Multnomah Civic Stadium to Be Dedicated
at Oregon-Washington Football Game to
Be Played in Portland, Saturday, October 9**

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON—Of the crowds entering and leaving Eugene, Ore., Oct. 6.—(Special).—One of the most up-to-date stadiums on the Pacific coast will be dedicated Saturday, October 9, when football eleven from the University of Oregon and University of Washington take the field of the new Multnomah Civic stadium at Portland for their annual gridiron tussle.

The stadium, built at a cost of \$500,000, is the only one on the Pacific coast which boasts of a covered section. There are 23,000 seats in the stadium proper and of this number 15,000 are covered. Twenty-seven rows of seats and 560 boxes are situated.

The concrete structure of the stadium proper is now complete and the wooden seats placed over the concrete foundation. There will be 22 entrances to take care of the crowds entering and leaving the stadium. In addition to the 23,000 seats in the grandstand there will be 10,000 temporary bleacher seats erected for the Oregon-Washington game and dedication ceremonies, but even the total of 33,000 is not thought to be more than enough to take care of the crowd which is expected to throng the turnstiles on October 9, as 20,000 tickets were sold two weeks in advance of the game.

Oregon and Washington's annual battle which is the first game to be played in the stadium also is the first big Pacific coast conference game of the 1926 season. These two universities have long been rivals for the football supremacy of the northwest.

Oregon is playing its first conference game under the leadership of its new coach, Captain John McEwan, against Washington, coast champions in 1925. That the game will have a direct bearing on the conference championship is the prediction of close followers of Pacific football and these experts also give Oregon a chance against the 1925 champions.

Since the forming of the conference in 1916, Oregon has won three games, lost two and tied two against the Huskies. Oregon nearly lost last year by holding the Huskies to a 14 to 15 score. Only a spectacular field goal turned defeat into victory for Washington. In one of the most bitter gridiron battles played between the two teams in their 20 years of competition.

In 1924 the Huskies would have tied with California and Stanford for the conference title but for the 7 to 3 defeat handed Washington by Oregon.
