All Home Run Records For World's Series Broken By Babe Ruth In Game at St. Louis Today



Yankee Swat King banged out three homers in today's sweeping victory over the St. Louis Cardinals, setting new records for home runs in one game and for the number of home runs batted by any one person in world's series games. Ruth batted 1,000 per cent today, getting three home runs and two passes in five times at bat.



Cutting a generous slice from three long-standing transcontinental records, "Cannonball" Baker arrived in Los Angeles last week in his Ford roadster, which, sealed in high gear, he had driven from New York City in just 5 days, 2 hours and 43 minutes. Baker was sealed in a fashion that made it impossible to replace the gears without breaking the seal. On Baker's arrival in Los Angeles, the seals were inspected by Joe Nikrent, famous racing driver and automotive expert and found intact.

Excessive speed did not account for Baker's new record but rather long hours of steady driving. Light weight pistons of Baker's own design helped to negotiate the steep mountain grades encountered on the road. He sacrificed just ten hours to sleep on the entire trip, yet finished the journey in amazingly good physical condition. He was accompanied by Paul J. Riley who acted as observer, but took no part in piloting the car.

Officials of the Western Auto Supply Company were particularly interested in the performance of Baker's car due to the fact that it was equipped with many accessories sold by the Western Auto stores.

Baker reported that he had no trouble with any of the accessories on the entire trip—not even a spark plug was changed, throughout the long grind.

This run attracted nationwide attention among Ford owners because this is the first time a Ford has taken part in a long-distance record performance since the days when Henry Ford built the famous Ford racing giant that was driven by Barney Oldfield on the state tracks of the country. This is the first ocean-to-ocean record ever made with a Ford car sealed in high gear and the fact that it smashes a mark established by a car of the six-cylinder class makes it all the more sensational.

IMPROVEMENT AT SOLDIERS HOME CEMETERY URGED

American Legion Post to
Back Request of Offi-
cials for Changes
Thought Needed.

Umpqua Post of the American Legion will make a determined effort to secure the funds desired for the improvement of the cemetery at the Oregon Soldiers' Home. For a number of years the cemetery has been badly in need of improvements and the budget of the institution has each time carried an item of \$1,700 to provide funds for the work, but the budget board has persistently eliminated the item. It was also brought up once on the appropriation bill, but because of political juggling was eliminated. The condition of the cemetery is such that the veterans feel the state is being disgraced by its lack of attention to the matter, and a resolution was ordered prepared to be submitted to the legislators from Douglas county and to the state legislature. It is expected to be the appropriation before the legislature where the veterans expect to back the Soldiers' Home officials in the efforts to secure the money needed.

The post also decided to put on an effort to get out a big vote at the general election to be held November 2. It was decided to take the drum corps, quartette and saxophone band on a ballyhoo trip just prior to the election date, giving programs in each town along the highway. A short program will be given in each town by the drum corps, saxophone quartette and singers, or some other form of entertainment provided and a speaker will also be present to show the necessity of a big vote on election day.

At the meeting last night Attorney Gordon, who was appointed to inquire into the provisions of the state memorial law, which provides that counties may appropriate \$10,000 for a war memorial made his report. The matter was referred to the executive committee. A resolution submitted by McMinville post, providing for a new system for selecting judges for drum corps competition was read and adopted by the local post.

their crops, but in advertising the various apple growing centers. In Roseburg there will be an effort made to increase the local consumption of apples during the short period. The greater stress, however, will be placed upon advertising through the medium of apples sent to people in other localities. Roseburg residents will be urged to send boxes of apples to friends in other parts of the country as gifts, and it is believed that thereby there will be built up a greater trade than ever before. This plan demands whole-hearted cooperation on the part of the producer. It means that the producer must supply to local purchasers apples properly graded and packed and fully equal to the best apples supplied the regular trade. It is not expected that any spectacular results will be accomplished this year, but it is hoped that such procedure through the succeeding years will work to the bettering of the apple market through a wider advertising of the product and the education of the tastes of the consumers of the country.

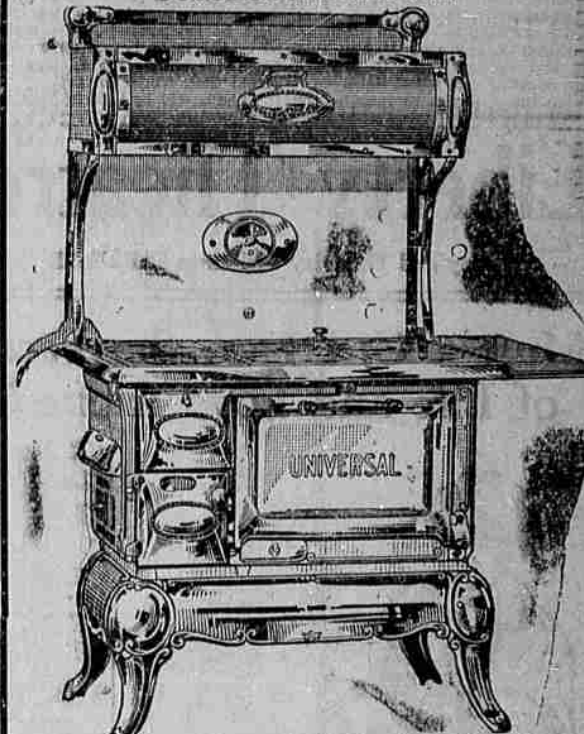
