



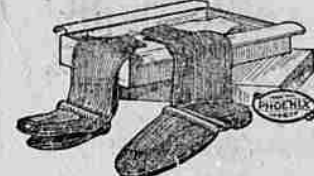

KLAMATH COUNTY POLO RANCH HIT BY \$75,000 FIRE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 7. — Loss of more than \$75,000 was suffered in a fire which destroyed a barn on the Edgewood Polo ranch here late yesterday, burning 70 head of horses, seven of them valuable blooded animals, including Proclamation, which was purchased for \$11,000 from the Whitney Stables, when a yearling. There was \$40,000 insurance.

DETROIT CHURCHES WITHDRAW BIDS TO LABOR UNIONISTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

DETROIT, Mich., Oct. 7. — Following the recommendation of President William Green, the American Federation of Labor convention resumed the regular order of business soon after the opening of the morning session today without approving formal action upon the withdrawal by Detroit churches of their invitations to labor speakers. After two addresses from the floor deploring the action of the Detroit churches, President Wm. Green recommended ending the discussion without a formal expression of the convention.

"It is the opinion of the chair that this unfortunate situation already has made greater demands upon our time than our business program can well afford," Mr. Green said. "The delegates are acquainted with the facts so far as known to the chair. We feel that our organization has not been injured by reception of the convention here and now earnestly recommend that the matter be considered closed."

The convention assembled today with a recommendation to answer "in a very emphatic fashion" the action of the churches and Y. M. C. A., as the special order of business.

MRS. BELL EX- PLAINS MEASURE AT CLUB MEETING

At the meeting of the Roseburg Woman's Club at the Moose hall Tuesday afternoon Mrs. Wm. Bell explained the measure pertaining to the proposed new Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital referendum. Mrs. Bell stated that this measure was passed by the last legislature, and \$100,000 had been set aside to build a tuberculosis hospital, but the state law now provides that all state institutions must be built in Marion county unless voted otherwise by the people, and that this measure is now being referred to the people for permission to build outside of Marion county.

Geographically about two-thirds of the state of Oregon lies east of the Cascade mountains," stated Mrs. Bell. "More than 1,500,000 people live in this territory. For the last six years an average of 70 per cent of these Eastern Oregon people have died of tuberculosis. "The National Tuberculosis Association, which has had extensive survey experience, states that a careful search in any community will uncover approximately seven living active cases of tuberculosis for each annual death. There are then, without doubt, some 500 active cases of tuberculosis in Eastern Oregon.

"The chances for recovery of any tuberculosis patient are greatly increased by at least a few months of sanatorium care, and yet there is nowhere in Eastern Oregon a hospital that makes provision for the care of tuberculosis patients—a few patients go to private sanatoria—a few ex-service men go to Walla Walla—but if the rank and file of all the rest of Eastern Oregon patients get sanatorium care at all they must cross the mountains and go to the State sanatorium in Salem. "Eastern Oregon patients are asking that this addition shall be made over on their side of the mountains where they can have care more promptly when they need it without such great distances from their families." Mrs. Bell urged the ladies to vote for the measure, saying that Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, past state president of the Federation of Women's Clubs, had written asking the support of the measure from club women.
