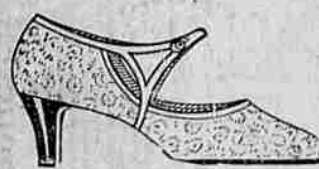

RECENT RAINS CAUSE WRECKS PAST TWO DAYS

Two Injured in Accidents Last Evening and Today —Wet Pavements Cause Skidding.

L. S. Cooley of Tacoma, Washington, received painful bruises and his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Wm. Lawson and two children received minor scratches, when their car skidded on the wet pavement at Myrtle Grove, between Roseburg and Myrtle Creek late yesterday afternoon as the party were en route to California.

The occupants were pinned under the car until passing motorists came to their aid, pulling them from beneath the car. They were brought to Roseburg and Mr. Cooley was taken to Mercy Hospital, where he was attended by Dr. Geo. E. Houck. It will be necessary for him to remain at the hospital for two or three days. The car was damaged to some extent.

S. P. Call Boy Hurt.

Arnold Kepper, Southern Pacific call boy, received injuries early this morning when his motorcycle skidded on the wet pavement and collided with the back of the sedan driven by Irvin Donnette while both cars were traveling south on Sheridan street. Just a few feet north of the Sheridan and Lane street intersection. The motorcycle and sedan were both slightly damaged. Young Kepper was taken to the offices of Dr. E. V. Hoover where an X-ray was taken and it was found he was suffering with a broken right leg and a break of one of the bones of the right foot.

Accident Victim Improving.
Sam Geary of Peel, who received a broken leg Tuesday is improving according to Mrs. Erma Singleton, who was in the city yesterday and who was the one who heard Mr. Geary's cries and found him. The accident, contrary to previous reports, occurred when the clamp on the steering gear broke, and the car ran down a 30-foot grade, throwing Mr. Geary out when it reached the bottom of the grade and turned over. His leg was broken in the fall, but he crawled around the car and dragged himself up the bank and for a quarter of a mile along the road, where his cries were heard by Mrs. Singleton, who went to his aid and with the help of her father put the injured man on a truck and secured medical aid.

Tourists Escape Injury.
C. H. Perdue and his brother of Long Beach, Cal., en route to Seattle, escaped injury when their car skidded on the slippery pavement and turned over as they made the turn at Kelley's Corner yesterday afternoon at 9 o'clock.

The top of the car was badly damaged and the windows were smashed out of the rear. All four wheels were broken off. The car was towed to Coos Bay Junction for repairs and will be ready for Mr. Perdue and his brother to resume their journey by Friday.

DAMAGE ACTION NEW SEQUEL TO RELIGIOUS ROW

ed loss of time and \$2,000 exemplary damages.
Conspiracy Claimed.
Attorneys R. B. Compton and B. L. Eddy appear as attorneys for Mr. Dabell in his court action. The complaint alleges "That in Douglas county, Oregon, on or about the first day of August, 1926, the defendants conspired together and with various, sundry and divers other persons, whose names are to this plaintiff unknown, and did conspire together and with said other persons, to assault, beat and grievously wound the plaintiff by striking, beating, kicking, stabbing and otherwise battering and wounding him and otherwise to cause him great physical hurt and pain and anguish."

The complaint then continues, "at or about 10:15 p. m. on said day, in pursuance of said plan and said conspiracy theretofore entered into, the said defendants acting together and with the said other persons, did, without any cause, reason or provocation thereof, wilfully, brutally, angrily and maliciously set upon plaintiff, pinning his arms and holding him helpless, and while so pinning him and holding him helpless, assault, strike, beat and stab the plaintiff nearly into unconsciousness, beating him to the ground, kicking him in the head after he had been so beaten to the ground and stabbing him in the back with a knife, causing a deep wound in the right side of the small of the back of the plaintiff, which wound bled profusely, causing severe wounds on the back of plaintiff's head, causing wounds inside of plaintiff's mouth, which wounds bled profusely for a considerable period of time, and otherwise severely beating and bruising the plaintiff about the face, head and body, causing plaintiff to lose large quantities of blood, both from the wounds in the back and head, and causing plaintiff to become sick, sore, wounded, and unable to work at all, or labor or attend to his business and causing plaintiff to require medicines, hospitalization and the attendance of a physician."

Treatment Denied.
That thereafter in further pursuance of said conspiracy to maliciously wound, injure and hurt the plaintiff, immediately after said assault, while plaintiff was severely wounded, and was suffering great physical pain and anguish, and while plaintiff was unable to care for himself, and while he was bleeding profusely from said wounds, defendants did keep plain-

tiff for approximately one hour in the town of Canyonville, Douglas county, Oregon, refusing to permit anyone to render even first aid to plaintiff and refusing him any medical attention of any kind whatsoever, and defendants and said other persons did thereupon manacle plaintiff in his said wounded and bleeding condition and cause him to be taken a distance of more than 30 miles in an automobile to Roseburg, refusing him any medical attention enroute, although they passed through the town of Myrtle Creek where a physician was easily obtainable, and to be kept in said wounded condition in Roseburg for a long period of time before permitting him any medical attention.

The complaint goes on to set forth the facts that because of the injury sustained Dabell was prevented from returning to his work and is still prevented from going forward with his business and will not be able to resume his duties for another month. He then sets forth the various items claimed as damages, amounting in all to \$2,250.

The Canyonville church fight has attracted a great deal of attention and interest. The alleged riot is to be investigated by the coming session of the grand jury. Feeling is running high in the community and there is a marked division in the sentiments of those residing at Canyonville. At the time Lawrence Doyle's case was in progress a petition was presented to the district attorney, signed by nearly 100 names, asking that the charges against him be not pressed.

ECONOMICAL TRIP IN A DODGE CAR

Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Gilham and two children returned this week from a tour of Oregon and Washington, traveling 1800 miles in their 1915 Dodge, which was overhauled by J. O. Newland and Son, local Dodge Brothers dealers. Total cost of the trip for transportation was \$39.05, which is two and two tenths cents per mile. This cost includes \$21.50 for gas, \$2.95 for oil and grease, and \$15.50 for depreciation on car and tires. Mileage for the 55 gallons consumed was slightly more than 21 miles to the gallon. Mileage for the six quarts of oil used to maintain the level figures 1300 miles to the gallon. Depreciation on the extremely low market value of the old car was estimated at \$5 and wear on the tires at \$10.50, as Mr. Gilham usually gets 10,000 miles on the old size tire.

In the car Mr. Gilham carried his entire camping outfit, besides the four passengers, making a load of 510 pounds. He traversed all kinds of roads and paid greatly reduced prices for supplies. This is one of the many trips that prove the economical transportation that is obtainable from a good used car.

ABNER RIDDLE, PIONEER, DIES AT AGE OF 85

Civil War Veteran
Abner Riddle was one of ten children in the family and engaged in farming as a lad. On January 10, 1861 he enlisted in Company C, First Oregon Cavalry and served throughout the entire Civil War, obtaining an honorable discharge at Vancouver, Wash.

He returned to Douglas county and settled on the farm where he spent the balance of his life, gradually increasing his holdings and developing one of the finest places in the valley, later dividing his property among the members of his family.

Five Children Survive
He was married in January, 1866, to Miss Alice C. Rice, a daughter of Harrison Rice, who came to Oregon from Illinois at an early date and died in this state. Mr. and Mrs. Riddle were the parents of six children, five of whom are still living, Ernest and Claude Riddle, Mrs. Maud Grant, wife of Louis Grant, Riddle postmaster; Mrs. Grace Logsdon, wife of O. V. Logsdon and Miss Helena Riddle. Two of Mr. Riddle's brothers also survive, G. W. Riddle, commandant at the Oregon Soldiers Home, and Stilly Riddle, a resident
