DAUGHERTY CASE PROSECUTOR SUMS UP FEDERAL SIDE

Buckner Avers Conspiracy Proof Lacks Nothing Except Picture of the Acts.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—At the close of United States Attorney Buckner's summation in the Daugherty-Miller conspiracy case this afternoon announcement was made that the judge would begin his charge and the case would be given to the jury tonight. If the proof of conspiracy in the Daugherty-Miller conspiracy case is to procure conviction the courts of the United States may just as well be closed up except for the "little fellows," Buckner said in his summation for the government in the trial of Harry M. Daugherty, former attorney general, and Thomas W. Miller, former alien property custodian, who are charged with conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with the release in 1921 of \$7,000,000 of impounded assets of the American Metal company, which were enemy owned. Daugherty and Miller, the government contends, shined in a \$441,000 bribe that was paid to cause the claims for this property through government officers of which they were heads.

"The defense has harped on a lack of direct evidence in this case," Buckner said. "Direct evidence? What do they expect me to show? Do they expect me to have had one of my assistants under the bed in that house on H street in Washington to listen to what Daugherty and his faithful Collier dog, Jesse Smith, talked about?"

"The best evidence in this case is silent evidence. There are those five, ten thousand dollar bonds that were found in Miller's accounts. They bore the same serial numbers as bonds Richard Merton paid to John T. Kinz. And Miller was in New York when those bonds were paid. And just because we can't show you a motion picture of King handling them to Miller, are you to acquit him?"

MARION COUNTY FARMER DEAD AND 2 INDIANS HELD

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, Ore., Oct. 8.—T. C. Mason, 62, a farmer of the Clear Lake district six miles north of here, is dead and two Indian brothers held.

AIMEE'S FOLLOWERS TO ERECT TEMPLE.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) COQUILLE, Ore., Oct. 8.—Followers of Aimee Semple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, will dedicate a new \$17,000 temple of the "Four Square Gospel" here Sunday. The temple is expected from Eugene, Roseburg, Grants Pass and other southern Oregon points. The building is of modified mission architecture. It will house a congregation which has grown to 150 from nothing since last spring.

ers, Frank, 55, and Art, 46, are being held on open charges in the county jail in connection with his death, as a result of what officers believe to have been a drunken brawl in the hop house of the Lee Hing hop yard, eight miles northwest of Salem, shortly after 11 o'clock this morning.

A third Indian, David Smith, grandson of Frank Wheeler, is also being held as a material witness. Mason, according to the information in the hands of Sheriff O. D. Bower and District Attorney John Carson, was beaten to death, or died of heart failure from the effects of a beating at the hands of the Indians, in a fight that grew out of an argument over employment in the hop yard.

To the officers Art Wheeler, who poses as a prize fighter, admitted that he hit Mason in the mouth. He said the fight started when he called Mason a "scab" as the latter was bawling hops in the hop house. There were no witnesses to the fight except the Indians, but Lee Hing, Chinese proprietor of the hop yard, this afternoon told of the events leading up to the quarrel. He said that the two older Indians, Frank and Art, had been drunk and raising a disturbance around the hop yard, and that the morning he paid them off. They refused, he said, to leave and he went to his house, about a mile away, and telephoned to the sheriff's office for help.

ALUMNI OFFICER EXPLAINS "DEAL" IN SUZZALO CASE

SEATTLE, Oct. 8.—Not a deal but a dinner caused state auditors to suspect Henry Suzzallo, shelved Monday as president of the University of Washington, of mis-doing, Matthew W. Hill of this city, secretary of the Alumni Association of the institution stated today. In a report of George V. Whitte, who supervised auditing of university books and looked into affairs of the Alumni association for Governor H. Hartley, as given out yesterday by A. H. B. Jordan, president of the University regents, it was said that the faculty members were asked to aid in Alumni association in financing some "Suzzallo deal."

MURDER OF WOMAN RAISES SEX FROM LEVEL OF CATTLE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) POLTORATSK, (Former Ashkhabad) Turkistan, Oct. 8.—As a sequel to the murder of the young communist worker Anna Dechkan, for which five of her relatives were executed yesterday, the Turkistan government today issued a decree prohibiting polygamy, the exploitation of women and the sale of infant girls in marriage.

These were the things against which Anna fought and which aroused her relatives to warn her and finally to descend in a body and stab her to death in the presence of her husband and infant

child. Fifty two wounds were inflicted on her body. Under today's decree the marriageable age for girls is fixed at 16 and boys 18. The professional marriage brokers who thrived on the sale of women are suppressed. It will no longer be necessary for a man to pay a price for a wife, and those forced to do so may later recover in court.

It was revealed at the Dechkan trial that young girls were often sold into marriage without their consent, frequently becoming the third or fourth wife of an old man they had never seen before.
