BOXING CARD AT EUGENE PROVIDES THRILLS APLENTY

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 8. — Lex Johnson of Portland fought his way to a decision over Ralph Moore of Eugene in the 10-round headline event of the armory boxing card here last night. Moore substituted at the last minute for Billy Winters, who was ill. Moore was game and displayed a stiff punch, but he was outclassed by the speedy Portlander. Johnson took seven rounds, one went to Moore, and two were even. Moore collapsed after the bout was over. Emil Perkins, a slender battler from Portland, won a decision from Wild Oats Mabion, colored youth from Aberdeen, in six rounds. Johnson Farr, a Filipino, from Portland, but loose with an old-fashioned haymaker in the first round, on the first preliminary, and knocked out Art Haulman, also of Portland. I took three seconds for the Filipino to turn the trick.

ORMISTON NEAR CAPTURE CLOSE TO LOS ANGELES

Time prior to the disappearance of Mrs. McPherson. The report said that two letters—one from "Rose" and the other from "Steve" had been in the possession of the Douglas police.

Asked where the letters were now, Murchison said "Mrs. Kelly of Douglas had them. They had been given to the police by Mrs. Kelly." He witness said, with a description of supposed kidnapers.

"Steve," Murchison said, was described as part Indian, weighing about 175 pounds, while "Rose" had a large nose and weighed about 160.

Discrepancies
The "San Juan" house which Murchison testified yesterday he had not visited in his search for the kidnaper's shack, came up during brief re-direct examination by Forrest Murray, assistant prosecutor.

The witness said that it would be necessary for a person to cross several high fences in walking from the house to Niggerhead mountain. Mrs. McPherson stated at Douglas that she had crossed no fences but recalled having seen Niggerhead mountain, which is close to Agate Prieta.

Murchison was released from the stand and Joe Taylor of the Los Angeles police department, who took the statement of Kenneth G. Ormiston, former radio operator at Angelus Temple and now a fugitive from justice, at Ocean Park, May 27, was called.

Taylor said he last saw Ormiston at the Oceanview hotel at Ocean Park on the day the statement was taken.

The hotel, he said, was headquarters for those searching for the body of the supposedly drowned evangelist.

Ormiston came alone to the hotel, Taylor said. He greeted Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, the evangelist's mother, who was at the hotel at the search, with a kiss.

Taylor identified a transcript of the statement taken from the radio operator.

It was passed over to Gilbert for inspection.

E. J. Donahoe, deputy district attorney, read the transcript.

Ormiston's Statement
In the statement, Ormiston said he had been in Los Angeles since May 10, leaving that day for San Francisco. He said he had come here to "be of assistance to mother Kennedy."

The radio operator had heard comment regarding his disappearance about the time Mrs. McPherson left for Europe in January. He said he had gone to Seattle at that time, remaining until March 24, and returning then to Ocean Park, and remained there until he went back to Seattle several weeks later.

Ormiston said he had called at the district attorney's office earlier in the day but District Attorney Asa Keyes was out and he went to Angelus Temple where he was told Mrs. Kennedy was at the beach. He first heard of a missing action by his wife in March, Ormiston said.

He came to Los Angeles again May 8 and registered under an alias—Wallace, he thought. He denied he had received \$1500 by wire at Seattle.

Regarding rumors that Mrs. McPherson had been named in the divorce action, Ormiston said he had not discussed it with the evangelist, nor had he received any communication from Mrs. McPherson at any time.

Another Hotel Affair
LOS ANGELES, Oct. 8.—The Times says that documentary evidence showing that Aimee Semple McPherson and Kenneth G. Ormiston, her former radio operator, registered at a prominent hotel here on two nights shortly before the Angelus Temple pastor disappeared on May 18, has been uncovered by district attorney's investigators.

They were assigned separate rooms.

Records of the Alexandria Hotel, fashionable downtown town, however, show that Mrs. McPherson registered there at 11:22 p. m. on May 9, the day the evangelist says she last saw Ormiston. She was assigned room No. 657. At 11:55 o'clock the same night a man who signed the register as "Frank Gibson, 1220 Post St., San Francisco," was

given room No. 824.

The records show that Mrs. McPherson returned to the hotel on May 10 and checked out the following day at 10:20 a. m. The man who signed himself as Gibson remained a guest at the Alexandria until May 11, checking out in the evening.

The district attorney's investigator declared "Gibson" was in reality Ormiston. Identification was made through comparison of handwriting and various aliases known to have been used by the fugitive radio man.

Fits Into State's Case
The new disclosures link up with evidence uncovered by the district attorney's office and outlined as follows:

On May 29, eleven days after Mrs. McPherson disappeared from Ocean Park, Ormiston, accompanied by a woman, registered at a San Luis Obispo hotel as "Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gibson." Ormiston later admitted in letters to authorities that he used the name of Gibson in registering at San Luis Obispo, but denied his companion was Mrs. McPherson.

On the same date Ormiston and his companion were stopped by a newspaper reporter as they motored into Santa Barbara. Ormiston gave his name as Gibson and said the woman with him was his wife.

On May 12 Ormiston appeared at San Francisco, visiting his parents there. He arrived at Carmel-by-the-Sea on May 14, when he deposited rent for the Benedict cottage and departed with the explanation that he would return on May 18 or 19 with his wife, whom he said was sick.

On May 15 he registered at the Clark here as "George McIntire," the name he used at Carmel. He stayed at the hotel three days, taking 12 meals in his room and checked out on May 18, less than two hours before Mrs. McPherson disappeared from the beach at Ocean Park. He drove away in his automobile which he had kept stored in the hotel garage.

On May 19 he reappeared at Carmel with a begoggled woman with whom he shared a seaside cottage until May 29.

Ormiston Thought Seen
CINCINNATI, Ohio, Oct. 8.—Kenneth G. Ormiston, radio operator and central figure in the investigation of the disappearance of Mrs. Aimee Semple McPherson, Los Angeles evangelist, was reported to have been in Cincinnati during the last several days, under an assumed name.

It became known today a man who said he was a Chicago deputy sheriff had called on several local detectives and inquired whether they had seen a man answering the description of Ormiston. The deputy did not consult local police however.

J. W. TROMILL
DIES HERE TODAY.

J. M. Tromill, a resident of this city for the past 9 months, passed away shortly after noon today at 120 north Stephens street. The man was stricken with heart failure and died. He came here about 9 months ago from California and was a painter by trade. He was about 30 years old. He was not known by whom he is survived. Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

TWO MURDERERS HANGED.
