## PRESCRIPTION OF WHISKEY IS MOOT PROBLEM

**U. S. Supreme Court Faces Duty of Deciding Case From New York.**

**DOCTOR IS APPELLANT**

**Argues That Volstead Act Prohibits Liquor Use as Beverage, Not as Medicine.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8. —(AP)—The interesting question of the right of physicians to prescribe intoxicating liquor without legal limit has reached the Supreme Court in an appeal brought by Dr. Samuel W. Lambert of New York City.

In the practice of his profession Dr. Lambert encounters cases requiring in his judgment the use of whiskey as a medicine, without any effective substitute available. He demanded recognition by the government of what he claimed was his right as a physician and as his duty toward his patients to give them by the untrammelled exercise of his best skill and scientifically trained judgment. He demanded freedom to use such medicine treatment as in his opinion were best calculated to effect a cure.

Says Right Envoiced On. He declared it his belief and judgment, based on experience, observation and the study of medical science, that the use as a medicine of spirituous liquors in certain cases was necessary for the proper treatment of patients in order to afford relief from known ailments. The physical condition of the patient, in such cases, he determined, he insisted, the quantity to be used. He never had and did not intend to prescribe liquor for beverage purposes, he stated, but he declared that the provision of the Volstead act under which he was prohibited from prescribing more than one pint of spirituous liquor to a patient within ten days, was an unlawful encroachment by Congress upon his right as a physician and therefore void.

In this contention he was supported by The American Medical Association, which declared that alcohol had a therapeutic value, and expressed its disapproval of those portions of the prohibition act which interfered "with the proper relation between the physician and his patient in prescribing alcohol medicinally."

Opposite Contention. The government asserted that the limitation placed upon physicians in prescribing liquors was a fair exercise of the police power delegated to Congress by the prohibition amendment. It declared that widely divergent views of the medical profession on the subject made it practically impossible for Congress to obtain any uniform opinion as to how much liquor should be allowed, contending that there was "abundant respectable opinion" for eliminating it entirely. Congress had, however, only restricted the physician, it argued, in the use of liquor for beverage purposes, and had left him free under the law to use it without limitation in medical prescriptions. There was nothing in the law to prohibit a physician, it insisted, from exercising freely his best judgment in the treatment of patients to the extent of prescribing in such medical prescriptions, whatever quantity of liquor he thought necessary.

Ferry Problem Up. The enlarged use of automobiles, in touring and for business, with the consequent improvement of the highways, precipitated the question of the right of states and municipalities to regulate the operation of ferries. It reached the Supreme Court in an appeal by the State of Louisiana, which, with Natchez, Miss., sought by franchise to control a ferry across the Mississippi river. Following complaint by the users of automobiles based on alleged defects in the operation of the ferry, the two municipalities, exercising rights which they claimed under their respective states, passed ordinances prohibiting the running of ferries without franchises. It was proposed that permission to operate should only be granted to those willing to comply with conditions concerning the hours of running, equipment and fares. S. B. McNeely, who had operated a ferry between the two municipalities for years, challenged the constitutional right of states to regulate interstate ferries, insisting that states had no power which could be delegated to municipalities under which the operation of

Interstate ferries could be prohibited. Federal courts in both Louisiana and Mississippi sustained his contention to the extent of holding that municipalities could not compel interstate ferries to obtain franchises as a condition for operation, but permitting them to prescribe reasonable equipment, hours of service and rates. Both sides were dissatisfied with parts of the decision in the Louisiana case, and appealed to the Supreme Court.

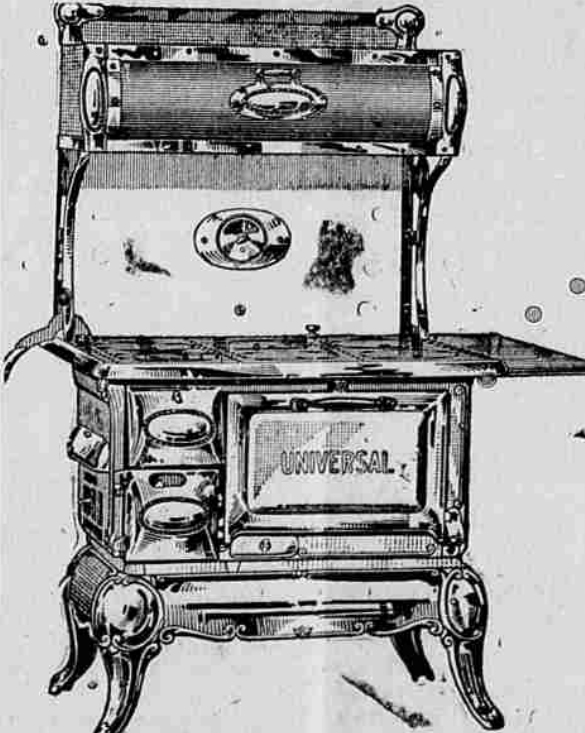
### ONLY FAIR CROWD OUT FOR SECOND CHARITY SHOW

Senator Stanfield was given a wonderful reception, according to reports. Arrangements are being made now for a speaking tour in the Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon and he is endeavoring to secure suitable speaking dates in Roseburg. L. Nesbitt, secretary of the Klamath County Republican Central committee and M. Potts, of Portland, are accompanying Senator Stanfield on his trip. Mr. Nesbitt, who is active worker for Senator Stanfield, will also be a speaker at the Bend meeting tonight.

## PORTLAND HAS WELCOME FOR RECORD CROWD

**All Attendance Figures to Be Shattered at Game Saturday.**

**BANDS WILL PLAY**

**Fifteen Minutes to Be Given to Dedication of New Half Million Dollar Stadium.**

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 8.—(Special to the News-Review).—With the arrival of some 2,000 students from the University of Oregon tonight, Portland will become a college town in every sense of the word, with the downtown streets decorated with flags of Oregon and Washington with all merchants carrying appropriate window displays, containing pictures and pennants of the two universities, which will meet in their annual football game in the Multnomah civic stadium tomorrow. The football game will dedicate the new stadium, said to be the only one of its kind in the United States, most of the seats being entirely under cover. The half million dollar bowl can seat 23,000 persons. Temporary seats to accommodate 10,000 more have been installed.

Although the advance ticket sale already is larger by several thousand than at the California-Oregon game last year, which broke all records for state attendance, it is expected that about 8,000 tickets will be available tomorrow for the game. Tickets will be on sale at the stadium office at 183 Sixth St., until 11:30 tomorrow morning, whence they will be moved to the stadium. The gates will open at 12 o'clock noon. The Washington high school band will give a concert at 1:15 p. m., followed by a concert by the University of Oregon band at 1:45 o'clock. The stadium will be officially dedicated with a ceremony that will continue for fifteen minutes between 2 o'clock and 2:15 p. m. The football players of both teams will then take the field, with the game starting promptly at 2:30. The final event of the week's festivities will be a dance at the Multnomah hotel, sponsored by the alumni of both institutions. Four presidents, Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall of Oregon, Dr. Norman Coleman of Reed, Dr. W. H. Kerr of O. A. C., and ex-president Suzzallo of Washington, will attend as guests.

## FIRES IN AMERICA IN 1925 BLOTTED OUT 14,000 LIVES

**Property Losses Totalled 570 Million—Most of the Blazes Caused by Carelessness.**

LOST—14,000 lives and \$570,000,000.

When? In one year, 1925. By whom? All of us. How? By FIRE.

What caused the fires? Carelessness, mostly.

The National Fire Protection association has made public some figures, which are a startling commentary on the careless habits of the American people.

In one year alone, 1925, over 14,000 people were burned to death and over 16,000 injured by fire in the United States. Of these people, 80 per cent were of the dependent class, namely, mothers, children, the sick in hospitals and unfortunate in state institutions.

A property loss of \$570,255,921 a year means that an average of \$1,562,344 worth of property a day is being destroyed. Reducing this still further, it is found that it is equivalent of \$1,084 for every minute of every day in the year!

This is bad enough, but the worst of it is, the annual loss has been increasing right along, each year. In 1915 the total loss was only \$172,933,200. At this rate of increase, what will it be in 1935?

Are You Safe? You may admit that this looks bad, but you may also say, "I have never had a fire and I am careful not to have any." or, "The Fire department is handy—I am not likely to have a serious loss," or, "I am well insured—the insurance company would make it up to me." Is this attitude justifiable?

It is right, of course, to be as careful as possible, but no matter how careful you are, someone else may throw a lighted match or cigar stub in inflammable material on your property, strike a match while your car is being filled with gasoline, or indulge in some other careless habit that will cause a fire in spite of your own efforts to prevent it.

Consider the fact that this annual fire loss of \$570,000,000 has been increasing right along in spite of the fact that more and better equipment has been constantly added to fire departments. All of the people in the towns and cities of the country who suffered losses from fire were also depending on fire departments to protect them. It is impossible for a fire department to be located near enough to every man's property to always get there in time to prevent the fire from getting beyond control. There are countless conditions which delay fire departments in reaching fires and these are due to no fault of the department. Faulty telephone service, congested traffic, slippery streets, frozen fire plugs, blocked railroad crossings, broken down motor equipment, etc., any one of these may cause a delay which results in thousands of dollars damage before the department can arrive.

Streams of water thrown by hose frequently cause more damage than the fire itself.

What About Fire Insurance? Insurance companies are but collectors and distributors of the fire loss. They pay the losses as they occur, or part of them, but the money comes from thousands of policy holders, all of whom are contributing to the fund from which losses are paid. The rates are large or small in proportion to the fire losses. Every time you have a fire that is paid for by the insurance company, you are making it necessary for the insurance companies to charge higher rates in the future. And you will pay your share of this increase out of your own pocket, not only for your own insurance but also to cover the insurance charges that are added to the cost of everything you buy.

And you pay, continuously, ever increasing amounts, as the total fire losses increase. What, then, is to be done? First, be careful. Instruct your employees and families to be careful. 2. When you build, build with the thought of safety in mind. 3. Make periodical inspections of your heating plant, electrical equipment and wiring in order to see that these are as safe as possible. 4. Keep your premises as clean from rubbish and inflammable material as possible. 5. Seek the advice of your fire insurance agent, the fire chief and building inspector, and fire prevention experts regarding the removal of hazards. 6. See that your property
