Reginald Denny Says Tramping is Great Life.

The greatest life in the world, avers Reginald Denny, the star of the Universal production, "Rolling Home," which is now playing at the Antlers Theatre, is that of an actor in a stock company on the stage.

A remarkable statement this, from a movie star, for most actors abhor the endless grind of the stock company.

Yet Denny declares he has the urge to go back to it, and plans some day, if he can find the time somewhere in his picture contracts, to try a leading man's role in a stock company, playing weekly or semi-monthly change of vehicles.

"All the advantages that working in pictures holds over stage work, have been told a thousand times, Denny declares. "But in spite of what may be said of it, the stage work is infinitely more satisfying to the actor who honestly enjoys his work."

"I played in stock companies all over the world before I went into pictures, and enjoyed it, in spite of the hard grind. Playing one play, and rehearsing another at the same time, changing character once a week to suit the new vehicle, is hard work and no one can deny it, but it is splendid experience, and there is an undefinable satisfaction about doing it."

"I enjoy working in pictures, but it is not the same enjoyment one finds on the stage. It is too mechanical; and it is too much detached from the audience. There is no particular thrill in doing what you regard as a fine piece of work, when you know that your only audience at the moment is a gang of hard-boiled electricians and assistants who wouldn't be moved by Duse, Barrymore and Bernhardt in their greatest scenes."

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The demand for authentic detail in modern motion picture production has opened a new source of revenue for art dealers who are now renting fine paintings for use as wall decorations in elaborate movie sets.

The companies are charged one per cent of the valuation of the picture per week. An original Sir Peter Lely portrait of a lady, was

valued at \$5,000 and rented at \$50 a week. One company this year used a Rembrandt rented from the Clark Collection, a Cranmer still-life, a Blakelock landscape, Rembrandt and Mettling portraits and what was represented to be a true Franz Hals. The latter rented for sixty-five dollars.
