DEMOCRATS CLAIM CREDIT FOR WAR DEBT SINKING FUND

Declare Republicans Are Merely Following Policy Enacted Into Law by President Wilson.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—The democratic administration of Woodrow Wilson, and not the subsequent republican administrations, is entitled to credit for the cumulative sinking fund law under which \$1,740,552,550 already has been paid on the public debt due to the world war, the democratic national committee contended today in its latest pre-congressional election statement.

"The republicans in speeches and other publicity try to make it out that they are entitled to all credit for payments on the debt," the statement said, adding that the law was "enacted by a democratic congress and signed by President Wilson, March 3, 1919, Carter Glass, now senator from Virginia, being then secretary of the treasury."

Total payments on the public debt from ordinary receipts were \$2,746,839,839 to June 30 last, the statement continued, this including in addition to the sinking fund payment of \$1,740,552,550, interest payments received on debts owed the United States by foreign countries approximating \$440,000,000 to that date.

"So that part of the debt payment," the statement said, "is merely administrative compliance with the provisions of a law the democrats, with sound financial foresight, enacted."

Payments on the public debt out of surpluses have amounted to \$2,081,407,901, the democrats declared, "the application of surpluses to debt payments having begun in 1920, in a democratic administration, the amount for that year being \$239,085,706."

Of the \$1,750,000,000 payments on the public debt by decreases in the net balances in the general fund, \$1,324,982,558 was in 1919-1920, according to the Wilson administration, the statement asserted, adding that "reports of the secretary of the treasury shed a telling light on the effort to make the people think the republicans are entitled to all the credit for payment of the public debt."

POTATO PRICE SOARS AS WEATHER HALTS DIGGING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13.—Continuous wet weather during the past week has halted the digging of potatoes in the Pacific northwest and materially strengthened the market. Growers are eager to get into their fields and resume digging but it will take two or three days of warm sunny weather to dry out the soil sufficiently to be worked.

In the meantime primary markets are getting bare of ready offerings and prices are climbing. At Yakima growers have forced the price on combination grades of Nette Gems up to \$31 a ton, an advance of approximately \$5 a ton within a week. The weather continues cloudy with threatening rain through the Yakima valley.

Oregon primary markets are inactive. Very little buying is going on, although offers of \$35 a ton, sacks and hauling furnished, are being made by some jobbers. This approximately is \$1.40 per hundred Portland. Some buying is going on in Clarke county, but no real activity is contemplated until the weather clears up and digging is resumed.

The local wholesale market is generally steady at \$2 to \$2.25 for U. S. No. 1 Gems and \$1.75 to \$2 for the same grade of Burbanks. Combination Yakima stock is held at \$1.75 to \$1.85 per hundred.
