BRIDGE REPLACED OVER SMITH RIVER

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 13.—The temporary bridge across Smith river near Adams station on the Redwood highway, washed out Saturday when heavy rains raised the river level, has been replaced in much less time than was at first expected. Del Norte county put up \$50, the Crescent City Chamber of Commerce \$50 and the Coast Auto Lines \$50, and work was rushed. This bridge again eliminates the French hill, which is a steep and narrow grade.

SEVERE QUAKES ARE RECORDED BY SEISMOGRAPHS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
VICTORIA, B. C., Oct. 13.—An earthquake of severity pronounced comparable to the one that laid Yokohama, Tokyo and surrounding cities waste in Japan September 1, 1923, was recorded here at 11:15 this morning. Three shocks recorded here last night and today were placed 2400 miles away and in the vicinity of Kamchatka. Kamchatka is a peninsula of Asia and is 1500 miles north of the district affected in 1923.

The last of the three shocks continued at 1 o'clock this afternoon. It was then very pronounced, Gonzales Heights observatory reported and likely to continue three hours more.

WEAVERVILLE, Cal., Oct. 13.—A slight earthquake was felt in this section today, beginning at 11:40 a. m., and lasting for two minutes. No damage was done.

Still Continues.
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 13.—A severe and distinct earthquake was registered on the seismograph at Yale University today. It started at 2:17 this morning and reached its maximum at 2:56 and was still continuing late this afternoon. Officials of Peabody Museum said they could not estimate the location or distance of the disturbance.

EMPLOYER LEADERSHIP LABOR ORGANIZATIONS MEETS OPPOSITION

DETROIT, Oct. 13.—The American Federation of Labor today voted to oppose "to the full extent of its power" the development of labor organizations under employer leadership.

The annual convention approved the report of its committee on resolutions characterizing local plant organizations as a "menace to the trade union movement and to American industry."

The executive council was given carte blanche authority to levy special assessments on all affiliated organizations for the formation of a fund to finance a national campaign in the execution of the policy approved.
