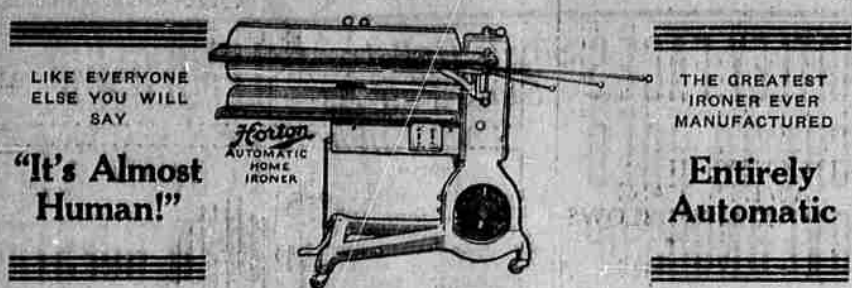

More Than 2,000 Home Shareholders

Reminiscences of Early Days at University of Oregon Recalled by Descendant of Scottsburg's Founder

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore., Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Reminiscences of the day when a loan of \$2000 saved the University of Oregon from being sold by the sheriff because contractors on Deady hall, the first building, had not been paid were given today by William Scott, of Creswell, the first student of the University.

Not only is Mr. Scott the first student, having registered on October 16, 1876, but he is a son of a member of the first board of regents, William J. J. Scott, who then lived in Eugene. Mr. Scott's grandfather, Captain Levi Scott, who was the founder of Scottsburg, which was an important town on the Umpqua river in the early gold mining days, was first janitor of the University.

At seventy years of age, Mr. Scott keeps busy in his spare time by painting, an occupation which he has followed for a number of years. He was born in Scott's valley east of Yoncalla, Ore., and entered the university when he was 20 years old.

Mr. Scott's father, William J. J. Scott, is the man who loaned the University \$2000 to keep the sheriff from foreclosing a mechanics lien on Deady hall. Purchasers were on hand to take over the half-constructed building and property on the fatal day, but the timely arrival of the loan saved the institution for the pioneers who had worked desperately to raise enough funds by soliciting wheat, cattle, vegetables and hogs from farmers to nearly complete the structure.

"There were three members of the faculty when I entered on the first day, and they were President Johnson, Mr. Bailey and Thomas Condon. Mrs. Mary K. Spiller had charge of the preparatory department. About 40 students were registered in the collegiate department. My sister Matilda and my brother Ron were second and third on the registrar's books.

"When my father loaned the University that money he wasn't sure for a while whether he was going to get it back, but about five years later it was repaid. But in those days \$2000 was a lot of money, and it was especially difficult to collect that much since everyone had given his last cent in the campaign to get enough to start work on Deady hall," Mr. Scott said.

By the flickering light of tallow tips and in rooms heated by stoves

the students recited their lessons, according to Mr. Scott. There was no place at the university for them to study so they did that work at home. On the way to class they would pick up a few pieces of wood to feed the stove in the class room.

"President Johnson, we students thought, was a bit old fashioned. He was straight forward and very thorough. I remember several things happened which made him loved by the students. We thought that Friday night was ours for a bit of recreation. Often the late Judge McGinn of Portland was my companion when we visited the places down town where we bought beer. There was a rule that students should not frequent saloons, and when one night President Johnson came in and caught us there. He never said a word, but next day in class he told us he wanted to talk to us. And he gave us a lecture I'll never forget. He told us that a man could not drink and get an education. After that fine talk we were his admirers for life.

"Then once I went on a camping trip with him and he endeared himself to me then, for there never was a more congenial companion or a truer friend," Mr. Scott declared.

"Who were some of my classmates? Well, I have forgotten most of them but there was Thomas Cader Powell, of Portland, 80, and Anne Whiteaker of Eugene, 81, and Al Powell and Chris Workman."

The main student activities were those connected with the two societies of the university, the Lauran and Eutaxian literary organizations, Mr. Scott said. When they met it was usually for a debate.

"I remember one night there was a debate on woman suffrage, a radical subject in those days. My grandfather had given me the keys with which to lock Deady after the debate which I did not know that Mrs. Robert S. Bean and another girl were left in the building. Late at night Dr. Condon got to worrying over where the girls were and walked down on the campus. He let them in and the joke was on me more than on him," Mr. Scott smiled.

QUEEN MARIE IS ANXIOUS TO SEE LIBERTY STATUE

S. S. LEVIATHAN, Oct. 14.—When this queen of the mercantile marine points her prow up New York Harbor next Monday a queen of the realm will be on deck to view Bartholdi's famous statue of Liberty lighting the world and the view of the city's skyline with buildings almost piercing the clouds.

Queen Marie of Rumania has expressed a desire to see the monument unfold as the Leviathan plows its way through Gravesend Bay and up to her dock at the foot of the west 46th street on the Hudson River.

She has informed the Rumanian legation at Washington she wishes to obtain the full effect of a scene of which she has heard so much.

The program of Mayor Walker of New York City contemplated sending down a quarantine the city's official reception boat to take the royal party on board and land them at The Battery for the trip up Broadway to the city hall for the official welcome by the mayor.

The Democratic spirit of Queen Marie which was evoked when she first stepped on the Leviathan from the tender at Cherbourg still manifests. Last night the queen, Princess Helena, Prince Nicholas and other members of the royal entourage saw a motion picture show in the general drawing room of the lines as the vessel made its way through somewhat rough seas. Marie requested a film, "Safe Haven," showing the passing of American sailing vessels from the seas. Then she saw "The Waning Sex," the star of which is Norma Shearer.

The queen and her children are proving good sailors, although it was said Marie was fidgety before she boarded the Leviathan of an attack of mal de mer and brought some specific to ward it off. Last night Marie, Helena and Nicholas had a hearty dinner, but some members of the royal party were not so lucky and sought "the seclusion that the cabin grants."

SUNDAY OPENS THE PHEASANT SEASON; LASTS EIGHT DAYS

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 14.—Hundreds of hunters were leaving Portland today for eastern Oregon to be on the ground for the first day of Chinese pheasant hunting. The season opens in Malheur county on Friday and runs 16 days. In other counties which have an open season on the birds, Sunday is the opening day and the season lasts eight days.

Birds are more plentiful this year than ever before, according to E. F. Averill, state game warden. Malheur county is the best stocked district but there are also lots of pheasants in Umatilla, Union, Baker and Morrow counties. Shooting in the Willamette valley will also be good, however, Averill predicted.

APPEAL LOSER PAYS \$300 LIQUOR FINE
