STILL ON STAND IN "HOAX" CASE

The mass of evidence piled up by the state.

Five persons from Douglas, Ariz., where Mrs. McPherson disappeared June 23, already have arrived in the city and are believed to be only the advance guard of the defense witness body.

When the hearing was resumed in municipal court, Mrs. Lorraine Wieman-Sielaff, co-defendant with the evangelist, her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy and four others charged with conspiring to defeat justice, was the target for continuing cross-examination by W. I. Gilbert, chief of defense counsel.

Mrs. Wiseman, chief accuser of the evangelist, underwent a grilling cross fire from the defense lawyer throughout yesterday, never faltering and leaving the stand apparently as unruffled as when she was released from direct examination a few minutes after the morning session began.

Counter Claims.

The locks of hair clipped from the heads of Mrs. Wiseman and the woman who posed as "Miss X" of the Carmel cottage episode, were seized upon by the defense as weapons with which to blast the story of Mrs. Wiseman that she employed Miss Rachel Wells of Philadelphia to swear that she was the companion of Kenneth G. Ormiston, former Angelus Temple radio operator at the cottage.

The state contends that Mrs. McPherson was the cottage woman and that she herself conspired with Mrs. Wiseman to produce the false character. The defense charges that Mrs. Viria Kimball of Oakland, sister of Mrs. Wiseman, was the woman who made the "Miss X" affidavit at Salinas, California, in the presence of Roland Rich Woolley, personal attorney for Mrs. McPherson.

Elephants Must Be Allowed to Increase

Elephant hunting in the jungles of India is becoming more difficult because of the thinning of the herds. There was a time, not many years ago, when the elephant drive always yielded a good harvest, say 100 or more young ones, from which a number of new recruits could be selected. But now the hunters are fortunate if they get eight or nine good ones from a hunt.

Some of the young elephants are selected for training and are divided into groups of various numbers, depending upon the circus acts for which they are to be used. Others are taught to carry loads and allow children to ride on their backs.

Elephants always are caught in the dry season, says John T. Benson in Popular Mechanics Magazine. At that time their natural food is the poorest and they have to tramp for miles to get a good meal. As a result, they are in poor condition and have to be fed for weeks before they can stand their first sea voyage.

Elephants are subject to numerous ills. They require much nursing, but once they become accustomed they will, with proper care, live to a great age.

Old Bill of Exchange

The oldest copy of a formal bill of exchange known to be in existence, at present, according to the periodical the Market for Exchange, is one dated at Milan on March 6, 1325, and runs in the original as follows:

Pagato per questa prima lettera (lettera) a di IX. Ottobre a Luca de Goro Lib. XLV. Sono per la valuta qui da Marco Reno, al tempo li pagato e poneto a mio conto e li che Christo el guardo Bonomeo de Bonomeo de Milano, li de Marzo, 1325. Or, in English:

"Pay for this first bill of exchange, on the 9th day of October, to Luca Goro 45 livres; they are for value received here from Marco Reno; at the time of maturity pay the same to my account, thinking you may Christ protect you." Bonomeo de Bonomeo of Milan, the 9th of March, 1325."

Guard Against Fire

More than 15,000 lives are lost annually by fire in the United States, the statisticians declare. At least that number of persons are seriously injured. It has been estimated that 65 per cent of these fires occur in homes, and the greatest percentage of the victims are women and children.

The majority of fires could be prevented in their incipency if proper methods of extinguishing them were at hand.
