MISSING GIRL IS NEEDED BY GRAND JURY IN INDIANA

Hunt Goes on For Mildred Meade, Ex-Confidante of Former State Klapp Dragon.

(Associated Press United Wire.)

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 16.—

Investigators for the grand jury that has undertaken an inquiry into allegations of political corruption in Indiana today extended their search for Mildred Meade, 25, who was said to have had the confidence of D. C. Stephenson when he was a power in Indiana politics.

Miss Meade has been missing from her home here a week. She is believed to have knowledge of documents which Thomas H. Adams, publisher of the Vincennes, Ind., Commercial has charged, would show Stephenson's alleged corrupt influence over high officials.

The grand jury adjourned yesterday until Monday. Adams and his associates planned today to assemble information which they say is reaching them from many sources and tending to confirm the publisher's charges.

Earl Klenck, who has been active in aiding Adams was absent from the city again today. He returned yesterday from Michigan City, Ind., where Stephenson is confined for life in the Indiana state prison for the murder of Madge Oberholzer.

Adams has not determined definitely yet whether he will go to Chicago Monday to seek the aid of Senator James A. Reeds senatorial campaign expenditures committee in the investigation of the Indiana situation. The publisher expressed the belief that the publicity which has been given his charges would bring about the "house cleaning" that he declared is needed in public affairs.

Adams was called to testify for a second time before the grand jury yesterday, but he was ill and unable to appear. He was the first witness heard when the investigation opened last Tuesday.

SCHOOL DISTRICT THANKS STANFIELD FOR TAX RELIEF

An appreciation meeting called for the purpose of publicly expressing the gratitude of the district to Senator Stanfield for his efforts in the passage of the O. and C. tax relief bill, was held last night at the Bridge school under the auspices of the school board, women's club and the parent-teacher association. The district received \$12,500 from the government as a result of the bill, and as the school district in the past has been greatly handicapped by the lack of finances the receipt of this money brings much joy to the patrons of the school, and as a result the school building was crowded to the limit.

Senator Stanfield was unable to be present, though he intended to, but sent a telegram which was received with great enthusiasm.

An interesting musical program was given, Helen Murphy Billings, who has delighted radio fans over KGW sang some of her comic songs while an 18-piece band from Myrtle Point also furnished music.

John C. Lane, vice-chairman of the Coast county republican committee made the principal address of the evening.

The meeting of apple growers called for this morning at the city hall to consider plans for the proposed observance of Apple Week was attended by only eight growers and as a result the Chamber of Commerce is considering the dropping of the plans previously announced. Unless full cooperation of the growers is obtainable the special week could not be carried out as planned, for the program called for a great many boxes of packed apples, and much fruit prepared for local sale and shipment.

Notice of the meeting was given by news announcements, and by letters sent out to growers, but apparently there is not sufficient interest on the part of the producers to warrant a local celebration of the special week, and unless some particular request comes in, together with assurance of support and cooperation, the Chamber of Commerce probably will go no further with their plans.
