STANFIELD SPEAKS AT UNION CHURCH SERVICE SUNDAY

COTTAGE GROVE, Oct. 17.—(Special). Senator Robert N. Stanfield reached this city today in time to take part in the laying of the cornerstone of the new Baptist church, which is nearing completion here. Senator Stanfield occupied the pulpit of the First Presbyterian church at the evening service, which was a union service of both churches. The audience that packed the church listened attentively to a fine address on the subject, "Good Citizenship," in which Senator Stanfield brought out the conflict of personal rights and liberties, the duty of citizens to the state and of the whole people of the state and nation. He explained the constant endeavor of the government to make laws for the regulation of conditions that tended to lower the standard of living, and also told of the efforts to promote a better understanding among the people of the nation to remove causes of conflict and injustice. For, said Senator Stanfield, the right to levy taxes is the right to rule.

When the burden of taxation becomes too great the people in the past rose in mutiny and rebellion. He stated that Oregon is not in just such a condition, but that good citizenship means that a way must be found to remove this burden and thereby restore that opportunity for happiness rightfully due the people of the state.

He explained that congress is just in its dealings and desires to do no wrong, and the enactment of the O. and C. bill is an indication of this fact. The principle about which this bill was centered is justice to the rightful owners of the lands—the people of the counties wherein the grant lands were located. As soon as congress learned that they were inflicting wrong, and were shown a solution, they voted to make amends.

He stated that he felt sure he could apply this same principle to the reserved forest lands, which would bring a relief of from 25 to 40 per cent in the tax burden of the state. He told the audience how this might be brought about, of the strategic position Oregon now holds in both the senate and the house of congress, and advised them to look the issues squarely in the face and go to the polls on November 2 determined to act their part as good citizens and vote for the benefit of all Oregon.

REORGANIZED BANK OF IMBLER WILL BE LA GRANDE'S THIRD

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 18.—The State Bank of Imbler, Oregon, has been reorganized and its capital increased from \$15,000 to \$50,000 and will be reopened October 23 in La Grande, Sherwood Williams, president of the institution, announced today. The depositary will be known as the Equitable Savings Bank of La Grande. Raymond O. Williams will be cashier. This brings the number of La Grande banks to three, the La Grande National and the U. S. National having been in operation here for many years.

Public Library System Needs Expansion.

83 Per Cent of America's Rural Population Beyond Reach of Present-Day Service

(Kansas City Star.) The public library is an asset in every densely populated district in America. That it is appreciated is indicated by the continual stream of new ones. It is the only means by which the cultural values of books is made available to a large percentage of those who have progressed beyond school age. The library is a means of self help to those who are desirous of continuing their education.

The ultimate goal of the American library association is adequate public library service within easy reach of everyone. Before this ideal can be attained, public opinion must be convinced of its value. More than 50 million people are without access to local public libraries. This group includes 47 million or 83 per cent of the entire rural population. This inequality is not due to a lack of interest in books, but to a failure to devise means for making available libraries and giving service.

The support of state library extension service should be adequate. It could then give aid in establishing county libraries which would in turn provide service at minimum expense to every resident.

The people who live in sections where public libraries are not available, have a further handicap. They do not have access to book shops. The purchase of books must be made without advice or consultation with anyone who is competent. The school district libraries, especially those in consolidated school districts, are doing a commendable work. The size of the unit frequently makes it impossible to secure a competent librarian and equally impossible to provide an adequate number and variety of books for best results.

The county is the most appropriate unit for service. There are 3,037 counties in the United States,

of which only 233 have tax supported county libraries. Thirty-eight states have library extension agencies in operation. These have laws providing for them, while seven have made no legal provision. In many states provision has been made for service from the state library commission to provide books up on request to any responsible citizen. This service is not fully understood or adequately used. It is capable of wide expansion. Such a service can never take the place of a library in charge of a competent librarian. The county library, efficiently operated, will be of much greater service to the community.

The couple attended the university together for several years. Miss DeWitt left in September for the islands.

Mrs. Godfrey has been in Hilo for almost a year. He is news editor of the Hilo Tribune-Herald and for a time last summer worked on a paper in Honolulu.

(Associated Press Local Wire.) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18.—Eight teams of the Pacific Coast league yesterday brought their 1926 baseball season to a close. Today players were disbanding until the going rings next year for the start of the new campaign. A few players are booked for the majors.

Assured of its seventh pennant victory three weeks ago, the flagging down of the curtain found the Los Angeles club leading its nearest rival, Oakland, by a margin of 11 games. The loss of the mainstay players and their manager, Bert Ellison, in mid-season, appeared to take the heart out of the San Francisco Beavers and the 1925 champions terminated play in the cellar position.

The Missions, holding a San Francisco franchise, closed their campaign in the third niche with Portland in fourth position, twenty-one games behind the victorious Angels. In the second division are found Sacramento, Hollywood and Seattle.
