WASHINGTON U. REGENTS WANT NO SEEKER OF GLORY

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 16.—The Regents of the University of Washington adopted here today a resolution of policy as to selection of a president to succeed Henry Suzzallo. The resolution said the new man must lack "ambition for power and glory," other than inherent in his position.

The regents adopted another resolution, "earnestly soliciting the cooperation of the Alumni association when it functions for the good purposes for which it was organized."

The Alumni association had declared that it would legally take the position that when the regents October 4 placed Suzzallo on an indefinite leave of absence he retained the presidency and therefore nobody else could be elected to that position.

FARM POINTERS

Every opportunity for bee colonies to build themselves up under most favorable conditions is given by successful Oregon bee men, reports the state college extension service. Those bee keepers make it a point to be sure that every colony is headed by a reasonably young queen from good stock and that it is supplied with enough brood-raising room to take care of itself. Stimulating feeding in this period is successfully used by some keepers.

For building up a good band of ewes, retaining the ewe lambs rather than buying yearlings has many advantages and is recommended by the college extension station, especially for farm flocks. On the range this plan is not at all practical. Operators who may find a small band of two to three hundred yearlings a nuisance, in this case raising of the yearlings can best be left to the man who can make a pa stronger yearling band.

In building up a dairy trade on the high quality dairy products, it is always to be kept in mind that a constantly available supply must be maintained the experiment station dairy department points out. This is because satisfied consumers mean continued demand and equally that dissatisfied customers are quite certain to turn to other sources of supply. This important fact is to be made the principal of those interested in developing a plan for more efficient sale of high quality Oregon dairy products.

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NAVY DIRIGIBLE COMPLETES ROUND TRIP IN SAFETY

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

LAKEHURST, N. J., Oct. 15.—The first major flight of the dirigible Los Angeles since the Shenandoah disaster ended at 5:35 o'clock this morning, when the craft arrived over the air field after a 780-mile trip from Detroit.

The flight was completed in 19 hours and 5 minutes, cruising at an average speed of sixty miles an hour. The ship traveled a total of 1,350 miles.

"We had a very pleasant trip," the skipper, Lieutenant Commander C. E. Rosendahl, said. "The only trouble we had was caused by a wireless antenna wire becoming loose after we left Lakehurst."

The storm that caused the unexpected return was not encountered on the flight, Rosendahl said. It was due over the Great Lakes region this morning.

A slight frost forced the Los Angeles to hover over the air field for an hour and a half. Each time it attempted a descent to the cold level within 100 feet of the ground, the ship bounced like a huge rubber ball.
