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CITY OBTAINS BID ON LANDS HELD FOR LIENS

May Dispose of Lots Upon Which Foreclosure Has Been Made.

STOP SIGNS WANTED

School Board Asks That Precautionary Measures Be Taken Near Junior High.

The city council held a short meeting last night to give attention to a number of matters demanding consideration.

An offer was submitted by Ralph L. Russell who offered to buy 41 lots in West View Addition for the amount of the city's liens. The city holds these lots for delinquent taxes and assessment liens. He offers \$692.71 for the lots, which are situated in the extreme part of the city fronting on Reservoir street. The proposal was submitted by Mr. Russell's attorney, R. W. Murders, and the council accepted the bid subject to approval of the city attorney.

A petition was presented by the school board asking that stop signs be placed at the intersections of Stephens and Washington streets, Rose and Washington and Douglas and Rose, and that the speed limit between signs be reduced to 10 miles per hour. Speeding automobiles in the vicinity of the Junior high school are a menace to the safety of the children, the board stated. The petition was referred to the street committee.

H. L. Epstein, the city engineer, submitted a report for the extension of the proposed drain through the East and Schleimann properties. The city is endeavoring to create a drainage district in North Roseburg to carry off water accumulating at the intersection of Jackson street and Winchester street and Second avenue. It is proposed to build a drain across Jackson and Winchester street, running across the East and Schleimann properties and emptying into Deer Creek. The city had proposed to empty the water into an open drain, but the owners of the land have protested and it may be necessary to construct a pipe line to the creek. The cost of the extension was estimated by the engineer at \$1,081.20. The heirs of the East estate offer to donate the right of way if the city will put in the drain.

Mayor Hauke announced the appointment of Leon McClintock as a member of the boxing commission to succeed H. C. Darby, who has resigned. The council ratified the appointment.

It was decided to restore the regulation system of purchases for all departments of the city, and in the future all purchases made by city officials or employees must be made upon a regulation signed by the chairman of the committee under which the purchase comes and countersigned by the mayor.

CHICAGO TURKEY DEALERS ADVOCATE HIGHER TARIFF

Increased Rate on Fowls From Other Countries Needed to Stabilize Market.

CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—The subject of a higher tariff on turkeys has attracted just as much interest here as it has in other markets. The original proposal to make the matter a subject of discussion at the National Poultry, Butter and Egg Association convention came from A. S. Roe, of A. S. Roe & Co., chairman of the Dressed Poultry committee of the National Mr. Roe has carried on extensive correspondence and has aroused the interest that has resulted in a free discussion of the subject throughout the turkey raising section and in the principal markets as well. He was highly gratified to hear that The Produce News had taken up the matter for discussion and said he believed that a campaign of this sort should redound to the benefit of the entire industry.

John B. Mitchell, of J. H. White and Co., has also made a study of the situation and is heartily in favor of an increase in the existing rates, largely because the growers of turkeys need additional protection. The raising of turkeys has been crowded from the more thickly populated areas of the East and middle West to the remote and sparsely settled districts of the far Southwest, the far Northwest and the intermediate districts. A large part of the output of these birds to the eastern markets at present is undertaken by the raisers themselves and quite frequently by individuals, because, as they are isolated and widely separated, co-operative shipping and marketing into packages is practically impossible.

The transportation of dressed poultry from the far West to Chicago and New York is a heavy drain on the producer because of high express tariffs. Although prices of turkeys in recent years have been on a fairly high level, the net proceeds to the raiser have in many instances been so low as to discourage him and thus to curtail production. In other sections of the West that are more favored by transportation rates, individuals are striving to develop the propagation of turkeys into an industry. They have been discouraged in this effort because the present tariff has rendered values uncertain. At almost any season of the year, without warning, immense shipments of dressed turkeys have come from Europe, from South America and from Australia, affecting our markets beyond the ability of any producer or dealer to forecast. Mr. Mitchell says that in order to stabilize markets, a higher tariff is a necessity. Unless this protection is afforded, the turkey as an American product may become extinct. Mr. Mitchell advises that in putting up the matter to the Tariff Commission, the suggestion be advanced that a reciprocal agreement be made with Canada to permit Canadian turkeys to come upon the American markets at the present tariff of 60 cents.

These Canadian turkeys do not interfere greatly with the marketing of the American product, because they come on the market at the same time as the American turkeys and can easily be figured in the possible crop to be marketed. On the other hand, the Argentine and Australian birds usually arrive after the American crop has been stored and this supply cannot be figured at the time a value is put upon the American birds.

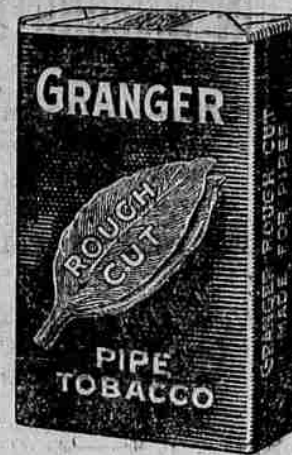

SNAPSHOTS OF THE WORLD'S NEWS

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Indications that the traditions of Kultur are not being maintained under the republic are seen in the fact that cities and states this season have been forced to subsidize municipal and state operas and theatres to the extent of approximately \$10,000,000.

Berlin alone spend about \$1,000,000 a season to discontinue Kultur from the stage. Cologne spends \$500,000; Düsseldorf \$430,000; Dresden and Munich \$445,000 each. Directors of the Frankfurt opera say they cannot pay expenses beyond Christmas time, because the city council just recently lopped off \$100,000 from the \$400,000 operating budget. Charges that the large deficits are caused by inefficient management and too high prices directors are heard in a number of cities. Civic operas were subsidized under the monarchy, but not in all cases to the extent they are today.

The 1300 year old City of Rothenburg, Bavaria, renowned in history for its burmester who nearly 300 years ago saved the city from being plunged by invaders by draining a three quart mug of wine in one draught, is in danger of losing rows of its old and picturesque houses. Modern automobile traffic rattling over the cobblestoned narrow streets, is doing what the burmester prevented happening from accomplishing long ago. Several landmarks already have been shaken to pieces. Plans are being taken to preserve others.
