WOOL GRADING TO BE DEMONSTRATED BY ASSOCIATION

Wool grading, as practiced by mill graders, will be demonstrated at a series of meetings to be held in Douglas county from October 25th to October 30th. These demonstrations are being made by Fred W. Herrin, field representative of the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers and James Cook from the grading department of the Portland warehouse. They will be assisted by local representatives of the association in each of the communities where the demonstrations are being made.

Representative valley fleeces of both wool and mohair will be used and the growers attending instructed as to just why the various factors such as coarseness of fiber, length of fiber, etc., will place one fleece in the quarter blood grade or another fleece will grade as half blood.

Assistant Manager Edgar L. Ludwick will attend these meetings and explain to growers the methods which the Pacific Cooperative Wool Growers has followed during its six years of successful operation in handling 20,000,000 pounds of wool, these operations including the financing of growers, assembling, processing and selling the graded wool. He will also tell of the work the association is doing

in cooperation with the National association of Wool Manufacturers to popularize and increase the consumption of wool products. During the winter and spring months the Pacific will hold similar demonstrations at some fifty other points throughout western Oregon and northern California.

SHARKEY DEMANDS BOUT WITH TUNNEY; WILLS SUSPENDED

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—The State Athletic Commission today "placed on file" the challenge of Jack Sharkey, Boston heavyweight pug, Gene Tunney. It is the first and only challenge of Harry Wills, a title match with the new champion directed at Tunney since the latter won the title from Jack Dempsey.

Wills was suspended for thirty days by the commission for fouling Sharkey in their match at Ebbets Field a week ago, this discipline being in conformity with the boxing board's rules.

M'NARY-HAUGEN BILL IS OPPOSED BY GRAIN DEALERS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, Oct. 19.—Opposition to any equalization fee plan for disposing of surplus crops was expressed to President Coolidge today by delegates of the farm Grain Dealers association, in annual session here. The organization represents 4,000 farmers' elevators in the eleven grain producing states from Oklahoma to North Dakota and has its headquarters at Omaha. An equalization fee, to be levied on crops to make up a fund for handling the surplus, was a feature of the McNary bill which failed at the last congress. Hope was expressed by the delegates that in the cooperative marketing movement no legislation of a compulsory character would be enacted. The need for adequate tariff protection on grains was also voiced as was the necessity for keeping down the present production by not encouraging new farmers to enter the field, especially on new reclamation projects.

receipts hanging in the cooler. No explanation for the slump, other than a seasonal falling off in consumption, is forthcoming.

Best calves today were quoted at 15 to 16c but holders admitted that they would cut prices later in the day rather than to allow accumulations.

Country killed hogs are not influenced by the stagnant tone in veal. Very little pork is coming and good hogs are moving out promptly at 18 1/2 to 19 cents.

The poultry market is generally steady with a good call for hens and good dressed turkeys. Springs are moving slowly.

Egg prices continue on upward trend. First and current receipts are a cent higher today at 47 and 44 cents respectively. Other grades held steady and unchanged, with extras at the 51 cent level.

WHITMAN SQUAD IS HEAVIEST IN YEARS

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 19.—With its first northwest conference game, a clash with Pacific scheduled for Saturday in Portland Whitman college football team has undergone radical changes in the forward wall. Ted Hertel, 189 pound tackle from last year, was declared eligible and went to left guard; Leo Rees, 180 who has played that position, going to left end, Paul Gardner, 188, returned to his regular post at right end and with Bland, 195, freshman going in at right tackle. Meister, star halfback, out of practice, for a week with an injured arm, worked at left half, with Roy Reed at the other half, Mackelson calling signals and Yennet at full back. The squad today averaged more than 184 pounds in the line and 169 in the backfield, one of the heaviest Whitman has put on the field in several years.

committee to accomplish this end. Nearly 300 persons enlisted for active work. It is the first time, a governor's recall has been sought in Washington.

J. Grant Hickie, secretary of state, said he expected to pass on the legality and validity of the petition by tonight.

If the recall petition is approved the secretary of state must set a date to canvass the petitions signed by the people. The date must be within ten days of the filing of the complaining petition, when the signatures have been checked and approved the secretary of state fixes a date not less than ten or more than fifteen days later for calling a special election. Election must be held between 30 and 40 days from the date of the call. A majority vote is needed to recall.

It would be at least two months before a vote is taken. If removed the governor is succeeded by the lieutenant governor, who is W. Lon Johnson of Colville.

**FORMER TEACHER
AT OREGON U. DIES
DAY AFTER RESSLER**

SEATTLE, Oct. 19.—Edwin J. Saunders, assistant professor of geology in the University of Washington, who died yesterday, taught in the last summer session of the University of Oregon but had been ill since the current academic year opened.

Saunders was in educational work in Washington state 24 years. He was at Ellensburg Normal school until 1908, when he came to the university. In the World war he was with the Red Cross. He graduated from Toronto university and took a master's degree at Harvard university.

The body of Edwin Devore Ressler, who was dean of vocational education at Oregon Agricultural college for 17 years, was sent to Corvallis, Oregon, today for burial. Ressler had been ill for six months. He died here yesterday.

Liquor Issue Won't Down.

Prohibition continues in the debate, however. Governor Smith accused Mr. Mills of "double dealing and dodging" on that issue. Robert F. Wagner, Democratic candidate for United States senator, accused Senator Wadsworth, his opponent of trying to "straddle" to get the support of both wets and dries. Senator Wadsworth speaking in Buffalo last night, suggested a substitute for the 18th amendment to end "hypocrisy" and encourage respect for law and promote temperance.

Franklin W. Cristman, independent Republican candidate for the senate on a dry ticket, speaking over the radio, charged that the wets control the two major parties in the state and pictured Wadsworth as "lured to his political destruction by relentless, ruthless whiskey bosses that know no purpose but to rule or to ruin."

Senator Lenroot of Wisconsin and Colonel William J. Donovan are announced to speak in behalf of the Republican ticket in Albany on October 29. This despite the warning of Cristman's managers to national Republicans to keep out of the senate party fight here.

Cristman declares he is as good a Republican as Senator Wadsworth and his supporters have intimated retaliation will follow if outside Republicans enter the state dry fight.

Chicago Mayor "Explains."

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 19.—Chicago suffers from the sins of its suburbs, in the opinion of Mayor William Dwyer.

Asserting that crime in democratic controlled Chicago is at a low ebb, the mayor ascribed the evil name attached to gang warfare in the metropolis to the operation of gangs largely from adjoining suburbs which he said were "still under the domination of the Republican machine which notoriously countenances but protects the rum rings whose excursions into the city have resulted in fatal shootings from time to time."

Mr. Dwyer was addressing a meeting in the interests of the senatorial candidacy of George Brennan, Democrat.

He also touched on prohibition.

declaring the dry law "was imposed upon the people without their consent."

"Suppose the Anti-Saloon League's statement that there are 20,000 stills in Chicago is true. What can we do about it? We have but the search warrant left and it was never intended that this instrument was to be used for this purpose. It never will be used for that while I am mayor."

Dry Denial Slush Fund.

CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—A flat denial of the testimony of two Anti-Saloon League officials concerning a \$400,000 "slush" fund for the independent senatorial candidacy of Hugh S. Meyer of Chicago, was made today before the senate campaign funds committee by the Rev. Bert O'Brien, a Methodist minister of this city.

O'Brien said he had discussed the candidacy of Magill with F. Scott McBride, national superintendent, and Dr. George B. Safford, state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League.

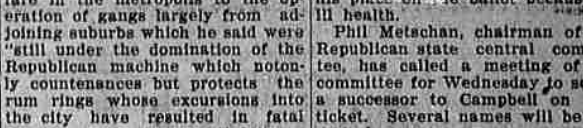
