REDSPOUT MAN STABBED TWICE DURING FRACAS

O. H. Spencer, clerk at the Umpqua hotel, was arrested this morning charged with assault with a dangerous weapon, following an altercation in which Frank Kernan, Redspout contractor, was cut about the face and hand with a pocket knife wielded by Spencer. Kernan was arrested on a charge of assault and battery.

Kernan, who stopped at the hotel last night, according to the story given District Attorney Cordon and Sheriff Starmer, was disturbed by the snoring and groaning of a man in an adjoining room. This morning Mr. Kernan made a complaint at the desk regarding the disturbance and was told that the person occupying the room was Mr. Spencer, who was standing nearby. An altercation then developed. It was stated, Mr. Kernan finally returning upstairs to obtain positively the number of the room from which he claimed the disturbance emanated.

Upon his return with the statement that the number of the room corresponded with that of the one occupied by Mr. Spencer the altercation assumed more violent proportions.

According to Mr. Kernan's statements he was called several vile names and finally reached out and slapped Mr. Spencer, who retaliated by inflicting a knife wound along Mr. Kernan's face and also stabbing him in the hand.

The Redspout man went to the office of Dr. Wade, who sewed up a cut about three inches long in the left cheek. The wound in the hand penetrated the thumb joint, the point of the blade having been thrust entirely through the hand. Dr. Wade states that there is danger of the wound leaving a permanent injury by stiffening the thumb. There is also danger of serious infection, he reports.

A complaint was sworn out against the hotel clerk, who was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon. He secured Attorney J. O. Watson to represent him and was admitted to bail in the sum of \$250.

A complaint was also sworn out against Mr. Kernan charging him with assault and battery. Mr. Kernan appeared before Justice of the Peace George Jones on the assault and battery charge and entered a plea of guilty, paying a fine of \$5.

Mr. Spencer, through his attorney, J. O. Watson, demanded a preliminary hearing, and appeared in the justice court this afternoon at 2 o'clock for the examination. The hotel management announced that Mr. Spencer has been discharged from his position and will no longer be connected with the hotel.

(Associated Press Local Wire.)

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20.—A material reaction in storage holdings of butter and eggs on the Pacific coast is shown during the past week, according to Department of Agriculture figures just released.

Six of the principal markets on the coast showed a total reduction of 480,830 pounds of butter while Portland holdings were reduced 29,257 pounds.

Storage holdings of butter are still liberal and it will require a steady withdrawal to move out the surplus by the time the next heavy production season arrives.

The local butter market is again displaying a fairly steady tone, especially on high scarce stock. Under grade butter comes into competition with cooler stocks and is hard to move at any fair profit.

No change is shown in butter quotations in the local dairy exchange for the day.

The local fresh egg market continues to display a good healthy tone. No further advances were made in exchange quotations today but recent gains held steady. The Portland egg prices are now more in line with other markets than they have been for some time. Receipts are still light, however, and higher prices are likely.

Improvement is shown in the demand for country dressed veal and trading along the street continues stagnant with 15 cents the general top. Real fancy calves will bring a fraction more when buyers are found. Country hogs steady at 19 cents.
