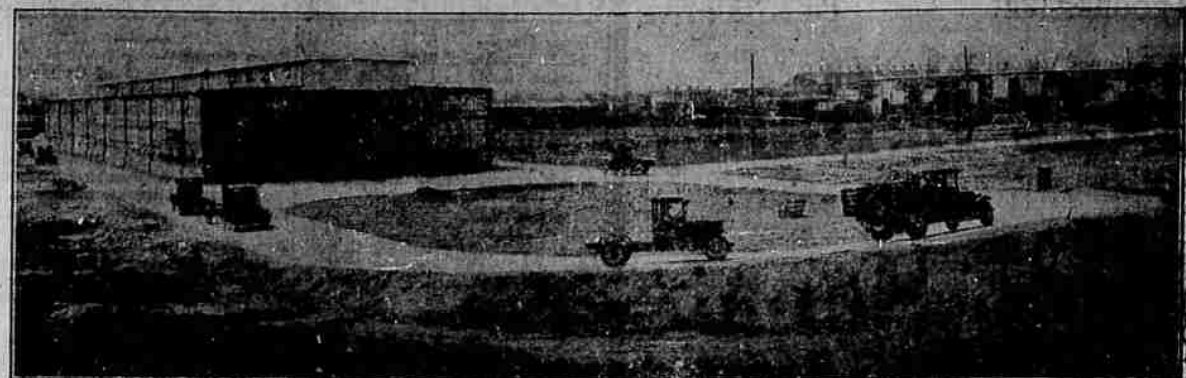

This 320 by 80-foot steel and brick structure, which is to house Graham Brothers final test department, was built 600 feet east of the 600x850-foot building in which their final assembly department is located, and is connected with it by an 18-foot concrete roadway. The quarter-mile concrete test track surrounding the building is 18 feet wide with the outer edge of the turns elevated five feet. "As public highways have previously been used for the purpose," said E. G. ROSEBURG RADIO CLUB PLANS FOR WINTER ACTIVITY

The Roseburg Radio Club is preparing to take up many new things of interest to fans during the fall and winter months. Particular attention is to be given to important legislation that is proposed for enactment to provide a better class of entertainment and to eliminate the interference that comes from such a great number of commercial broadcasting stations filling the air with conflicting wave lengths.

The club feels the importance of securing the attendance and co-operation of all radio owners at meetings and in activities to improve reception. This is particularly true in movements made to eliminate local interference. It is planned to have frequent talks by radio authorities, who will answer questions and give help and advice to fans to enable them to get the best results from their sets. It is desired to have a membership of 500 in the club. The next meeting is to be held on Friday evening, October 22, at the City Hall and the club is making an appeal to all owners of radio sets to be present.

SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET COMMITTEE CHOSEN BY BOARD

A budget committee composed of B. W. Strong, Horace Berg, H. C. Darby, John Bunyan and W. F. Harris, has been appointed by the school board to prepare the budget for the school district for the coming year. The committee is to meet next Monday and outline the probable expenditures for the year so that the amount to be raised by taxation may be determined.

The school district's finances are in a critical condition due largely to the fact that there is such a large outstanding warrant indebtedness. The amount of money received from taxation is just barely enough to pay the running expenses, and when \$2,500 must be used to pay interest on warrants the taxpayers are not obtaining the full benefit of the money paid in.

If the schools could be placed upon a cash basis a saving of from \$2,500 to \$3,000 could be made each year. The only way, however, that this could be done, would be to raise a sufficient amount to pay off the existing warrants and give a surplus large enough to carry the district over from one taxpaying period to another. As it is warrants

must be issued between the times when taxes are paid costing the district a large sum of interest.

STANFIELD TALKS IN HOME TOWN OF FRED W. STEIWER

PENNINGTON, Ore., Oct. 20.—Misrepresentation of facts on the part of the Portland Oregonian was voiced here last night by Senator Robert N. Stanfield in a campaign address before people of Umatilla county. He charged deliberate misrepresentations of facts, coloring of news stories and that the paper had never given him a square deal. The senator devoted fully 20 minutes of his time to a criticism of the Portland paper. His position on the public lands committee in the senate ought, he thinks, be enough to reset him in the upper house. His work on the O. and C. land grant was stressed by him. He also expects that senators from other western states will fight with him against the tax burden.

MULTNOMAH CLUB BIDS GOODBYE TO FOOTBALL GAMES

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 20.—The Multnomah Amateur Athletic club announced formally today that it has disbanded its football team and that games scheduled for the season are cancelled.

The Multnomah club suffered defeat by big scores in the first two games of the season, and there was small attendance at the game here last Saturday with Gonzaga. These factors figured in the decision of the club directors to discontinue football activities.

John Laing, president of Multnomah Club, today issued a statement saying that the club was unable to keep pace with the advance in college football. Club players could not practice often enough to give the brand of football of well drilled college teams.

APPLE SHIPPERS TO ASK LOWER RATES

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20.—Apple growers of Oregon and Washington will meet at Olympia, Wash., Saturday, October 23, to consider a petition to the Interstate Commerce Commission asking a reduced freight rate on apples shipped east, so the big crop of the two states may be moved.

STATE LABOR HEAD UPHOLD IN REFUSAL TO GRANT LICENSE

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20.—Judge L. H. McMahon of the circuit court for Marion county yesterday issued a decree dismissing a temporary writ of mandamus and sustaining Charles H. Gram, state labor commissioner, in his refusal to issue an employment agent's license to S. A. G. Lyons of Portland. Lyons, operating as the Star employment agency, instituted the proceedings, when Gram refused the license of grounds that Lyons was not qualified.

should not exceed \$25,000," he said, adding that he had agreed to contribute up to \$5,000 of this amount and that Logan Hay, state senator of Springfield, had agreed to give \$3,000.

Magill, who followed Rosenwald on the stand, declared that the statement that a fund of from \$300,000 to \$400,000 was to be raised for his campaign was "an absolute falsehood."

"It is an absolute falsehood peddled by Mr. George B. Safford, (superintendent of the Illinois Anti-Saloon league) after he knew that it was a falsehood," Magill declared.

The witness charged that Safford had tried to get him to withdraw his independent candidacy in favor of Frank L. Smith, the Republican senatorial nominee, promising that if he did so, he would have the support of the dry organization in the next campaign.

Magill testified that he and Safford had a disagreement as to the paramount issue in the campaign, the dry leader holding that the important question was prohibition, while the witness insisted that it was morality.

Assailing Safford in vigorous terms, Magill said he would like to call his attention to two commandments:

"Thou shalt not steal.

"Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor."

Magill declared that he was a dry "down state as well as in Chicago," and added: "I will never take dictation from Wayne Wheeler, Scott McBride or George Safford, because they have shown by their actions in this case that they are absolutely unfit to advise or dictate to the decent citizenship of Illinois."

Magill presented his evidence in machine gun fashion and when he had concluded after half an hour, Senator Reed, democrat, Missouri, chairman of the committee, said he had no questions to ask.

Later the witness presented a letter which he wrote to Safford this month offering to permit the Anti-Saloon league to scrutinize his campaign expenditures.

Replying to this letter, Safford wrote that he doubted that Magill's candidacy could become formidable and that it was necessary for the dries to concentrate on Smith's candidacy if they were to defeat George E. Brennan, the democratic senatorial nominee, who is an avowed wet.

Sharply criticizing the source of the funds that Smith expended in his primary campaign, Magill said that "a worse thing is to lead the moral forces of Illinois to condone such a thing."

"That is striking at the very foundation of government," he declared, "and that is what the Anti-Saloon league is doing in this case."

In excusing Magill, Senator Reed said:

"I think you have the same fault that I have been accused of; that is saying what you mean."

Bullitt is Willing.

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 20.—Willingness was expressed here today by A. Scott Bullitt, democratic candidate for United for United States senator, for a congressional investigation of his campaign expenditures.

"My campaign ledger is open to the committee at any and all times," he said. "I welcome the investigation and hope it will begin at once. I will file my campaign expense account, as provided by law, with the proper authorities this week."

Want Jones Probed Also.

SEATTLE, Oct. 20.—The Wash-

ington state Democratic campaign committee today stated that it "welcomes an investigation of expenditures in the campaign which is now being waged against Senator Jones by A. Scott Bullitt."

Jones, Republican, is seeking reelection to his fourth term in the United States senate. Both nominees live in Seattle.

The statement continued: "Senator James A. Reed, a Democrat (and chairman of the committee) has done his duty in promising that an immediate investigation will be made. It should be completed before the people go to the polls November 2, for a candidate, like Caesar's wife, should be above suspicion."

"Since Senator Jones' campaign managers have asked for investigation, we propose that it be sweeping in scope. We shall ask Senator Reed and the committee to investigate the activities of the Anti-Saloon league, which has confessed to giving Senator Jones money, on as it terms it, honorariums."

"I will show that I have expended on my campaign less than the limit fixed by law."

"The sum mentioned by Mr. Sumner as having been spent in my campaign, is ridiculous. I know nothing of any such expenditures and his charges are plainly a smoke screen. I have seen some advertisements in the newspapers of the state, published by the Anti-Federal Sunday Closing league, regarding Senator Jones' Sunday closing bill. I am not connected with this league in any way. I have been a newspaper man, however, and know something of the cost of newspaper space. I know it is ridiculous for Mr. Sumner to talk about advertising in ten dailies and 25 weeklies costing \$100,000. If it cost \$10,000 the league was being overcharged. However, that matter is with the league and not with me."

"I welcome the investigation and I am glad that a fair minded man like Senator McNary of Oregon will conduct it."

McNary Has No Time.

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 20.—Senator Charles N. McNary, designated by Senator Reed to conduct the inquiry of the senate campaign funds committee into charges that large sums of money are being spent in Washington on behalf of the candidacy of A. Scott Bullitt, left here this morning for San Francisco to launch a campaign of five states that will keep him busy every day from now until the date of the election and leave no time for him to conduct the Washington inquiry until after the election.

Such is the statement made this noon by John McNary, brother of the senator, in reply to a query as to when Senator McNary would be able to open the investigation.

CANDIDATE FOR STATE LEGISLATOR IN CITY.

Ben Nichols, republican candidate for state legislator from Douglas county was in Roseburg today attending to business matters. Mr. Nichols has been spending the summer at Tillamook on his large stock ranch and has just brought out 115 head of beef cattle, which were sold today at Riddle to Louis Kohlhaugen and Sam Miller. Mr. Nichols states that his business prevents him from making any extended campaign and that he does not expect to spend any great amount of time in visiting voters in his own behalf.

LAND SETTLEMENT WORK PRAISED

PORTLAND, Oct. 20.—High praise for their aid to Oregon agriculture was the tribute paid to the Portland and Oregon State Chambers of Commerce at the Oregon reclamation congress held in Hood River last week.

By a resolution thanking these organizations for their work in state-wide land settlement and industrial development, the congress endorsed the appropriation by the next legislature of \$100,000 to "give the state of Oregon its proper place in carrying on this work."

During the past three years the land settlement department of the Oregon development fund has expended \$65,000 in the work of securing additional farmers on the unoccupied lands of the state, and has been instrumental in securing 2000 farm families who have invested over \$3,000,000 in homes. The present campaign is considered the most successful of any similar movement in Oregon and it is believed that if continued with an increased outlay of working funds, thousands of additional families will be brought to the state for farm and industrial development as the possibilities of Oregon have been better sold and are better known now than at any previous time.

Encouraging reports came daily to W. G. Ide, manager of the land settlement department, from Arthur Foster who is representing the department and explaining its services to hundreds of prospective settlers in the middle western states at the present time. Evidence accumulates that the next year will see thousands of farmers, energetic, successful and desirable new citizens, on their way to Oregon as a result of the confidence inspired by the reliable methods of the department.
