WOMAN WHO MADE MISS X AFFIDAVIT IS CONTRADICTED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

HALL OF JUSTICE, LOS ANGELES, Oct. 21.—Judge J. A. Bardin of Sullinas, California, positively identified Mrs. Virlia Kimball of Oakland, as the woman who signed the "Miss X" affidavit at Sullinas August 15 in furtherance of the confessed scheme of Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Slater. Mrs. Kimball's twin sister, to produce false characters in the Almee Sample McPherson kidnaping case.

Judge Bardin, appearing as a defense witness in the evangelist's conspiracy hearing, surveyed Mrs. Kimball on the witness stand and then, called to the box himself, declared she was the woman who had affixed her signature to the document intended to dissipate rumors that the evangelist had been the cottage companion of Kenneth G. Ormlston at Carmel last May.

Mrs. Kimball, under examination counsel, a moment before, equally by W. I. Gilbert, chief of defense positively denied that she had ever been in Judge Bardin's office, but admitted she had spent several hours in Sullinas on the morning the affidavit was made.

She declared she went to Sullinas accompanied by Mrs. Wiseman and Miss Rachael Wells, Philadelphia. Mrs. Wiseman, state's witness and co-defendant with Mrs. McPherson, testified she had brought as Ormlston's companion at the Miss Wells from the east to pose reaction and under the pay of Mrs. McPherson.

Judge Bardin detailed the visit of Mrs. Wiseman, who also signed an affidavit at Sullinas stating she chaperoned Miss Wells at the cottage, to his office on the morning of August 15. Mrs. Wiseman told him and Roland Rich Woolley, personal counsel for the evangelist, who was present at the judge's office, that she had the lady with her who was known as the "Miss X" of the McPherson case.

Mrs. Wiseman represented her companion as her own sister, the witness said, stating she had brought her from the east. Woolley and himself, he said, were asked not to cross-examine "Miss X" because of the attending humiliation.

Judge Bardin said Mrs. Wiseman evaded all questions concerning the Carmel cottage, which he said he had visited the day before. A delegation of Mrs. McPherson's followers of the Four Square Gospel were on hand when court opened in response to the pulp appeal of the Angelus Temple pastor last night that they come early today and "sit in" at the hearing.

Ramon D. Gonzales, who testified yesterday Mrs. McPherson was prostrated at his home at Agua Prieta, for an hour when she came out of the desert June 23, was under continued cross-examination for a short time before Mrs. Kimball was called. He admitted that he had signed a statement in July saying that Mrs. McPherson had told him she had walked about seven miles before reaching Gonzales' house and had been taken to that point in an automobile.

In explanation, Gonzales said he was not sure when he made the statement whether the evangelist said seven or seventeen miles that she had walked.
