much as a toppled chimney. The clock of the big Union Ferry building here was jarred back nearly five minutes as one freak of the disturbance, but it kept right on going, and trans-bay commuters looking up at its big round face were amazed to find themselves getting to work supposedly five minutes earlier. Many of them had, not felt the shakes.

Santa Cruz Worst Hit
Santa Cruz, sixty miles to the south, reported slight damage to the Casa del Rey Hotel, a big resort structure, and a few cracked walls and stopped clocks. First reports were that the damage would reach \$25,000 there, but this was believed to be exaggerated. It appeared to be the most severely shaken of the towns in the earth-

quake zone. A freak of the disturbance was that many Western Union clocks stopped at 4:36 a. m., the time of the first shock, and some were started again by later shocks.

Lower Market street, which is on made land, appeared to suffer the most here. The Lincoln hotel, near the towering Southern Pacific company office building, appeared to be a few inches out of plumb. Plaster fell in the Seaboard National bank and on Mission street, near the water front, there were a few cracked walls.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—Heavy earth shocks were registered on Georgetown university seismograph today, the maximum being reached between 7:57 and 8:01 a. m., eastern time. Director Tondorf said after shocks were continuing up to 8:30 when he made his readings. Source of Tremors.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22.—The seismic disturbances which jolted a comparatively limited area in northern California early today apparently were caused by a submarine disturbance centering approximately 70 miles southwest of here, at-line measurement, apparently in or near Monterey Bay.

This is the conclusion of Dr. Perry Bierly, assistant seismologist at the observatory of the University of California at Berkeley. Dr. Bierly explained that the needles on two of the three seismographs at the observatory were thrown off the charts by the first shock and that he could not base an entirely accurate theory on the registration of the third chart.

Dr. Bierly said there were three shocks, timed at 4:35, 5:35 and 6:42 a. m., all were from a point approximately 70 miles southwest. The first manifestation lasted seven minutes; the second seven minutes and the third one minute. The intensity of a seismic disturbance, according to Dr. Bierly, is indicated by degrees. Ten degrees is the maximum and means "total destruction." The earthquake of April, 1906, registered eight degrees. He said that although this morning's disturbances were pronounced, the highest only reached a maximum of four degrees.

Parrot Dies of Fright.
MONTEREY, Calif., Oct. 22.—Teri Quito, a parrot belonging to Mrs. W. G. Hubbard of Monterey, was reported as the first casualty of today's earthquakes. The bird was found dead shortly after the first shock and is presumed to have died of fright. Mrs. Hubbard declared the bird was temperamental and easily frightened.
