ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM TO BE BEST EVER HELD

Celebration Will Surpass
Any Previous Holiday
Event.

PLAN AMUSEMENTS

Device to Test Skill of
Auto Drivers Expected
to Furnish Great Deal
of Amusement.

The Armistice day celebration to be held in Roseburg Thursday, November 11, under the auspices of Umpqua Post of the American Legion will doubtless be an event which will long be remembered in this city. In the search for something new to offer in the way of entertainment the committees have struck upon several novel ideas which will provide unlimited amusement and will assure a day of real enjoyment.

The program is to start with a

noise barrage at 9 o'clock in the morning. Noisemakers of all kinds will be called into use and the streets will reverberate with the din for a period of an hour, during which time preparations will be made for the parade, which will take place promptly at 10 o'clock. This parade will be of the usual patriotic order with the various patriotic organizations given places of honor.

The parade will be followed by a program at the Antlers theatre, where a speaker will give an address on a subject appropriate to the occasion.

For those who are unable to find room inside the armory amusement will be provided in the way of street stunts. These stunts are to be unique and original in many ways and will provide a great deal of fun for everyone.

Auto Pivot is New One
The auto pivot is to be one of the stunts which will keep a great crowd entertained. This is a giant teeter upon which an auto may be driven. Side curbs and railings will make it safe and a liberal prize will be given to the drivers who are skillful enough to balance their machines on the device. It is a real test of skill and one which will keep auto drivers busy trying to accomplish the feat, at the same time giving plenty of amusement for the spectators.

The American Legion "Monte Carlo" will be another amusement feature. This will be a group of concessions of various kinds, refreshment stands, etc. They will be centrally located and grouped so that a large crowd may be entertained.

Banquet at Noon
The legion post plans to hold the usual noon banquet for ex-service men. This banquet is open

to all World war veterans, regardless of whether or not they are members of the American Legion. It is always one of the most enjoyable events of the day for it affords an opportunity for all veterans to get together for a social time.

The early part of the afternoon will be given over to street stunts, and the Roseburg-Grants Pass football game will take up the balance of the afternoon.

Two big events have been arranged for the evening. One will be the annual Armistice Day ball and the other will be the showing of the motion picture "Izzy Murphy" at the Antlers theatre as an American Legion benefit.

"Izzy Murphy" is to have its first showing in Roseburg. The film has not yet been released and will be shown for the first time in this city. It is a picture of a Jewish soldier in a regiment of Irishmen and the comedy which results from this situation is of the uproarious kind.

Mr. Vincent booked this film several months ago, when it was first offered. Since that time hundreds of theatres have been clamoring to get the picture for an Armistice day showing, but Mr. Vincent has it secured by an iron bound contract and has refused to release it, although he has been offered several hundred dollars for a release of the contract. Featuring George Jessel, Patsy Ruth Miller, Vera Gordon and Nat Carr in the principal roles it is a show which will be well worth seeing. The theatre management has voluntarily offered a high percentage of the gross receipts from the show to Umpqua Post to assist in defraying the expenses incident with the celebration.

LOCAL TEAM IS HANDICAPPED FOR GAME SAT.

Bruises and Strains From
Eugene Contest Have
Lasting Results.

EPIDEMIC OF BOILS

Several of Regular Players
Suffering From Boils
—Reserve Strength
Is Weakened.

The Roseburg high school football team is in a poor condition for the game with Medford to be played in the latter city tomorrow. The terrific battering received last Saturday from the extremely heavy Eugene team left an aftermath of strained, sore and stiffened muscles which has prevented scrimmage except for one night this week. Several of the boys are still limping or carrying stiff necks, although none were injured seriously. The Eugene team, which had a heavier line than the university varsity, pounded the local high school team, which is only about average weight, until the team was completely exhausted, and then proceeded to walk away with a 41 to 0 victory. Roseburg held until exhausted but the strain has seriously crippled the team for this week's contest.

As if that handicap was not sufficient an epidemic of boils has broken out and several of the boys are suffering as a result. Ray Bell, quarterback, will be out of the game with boils, and several others will probably be unable to play, at least for the full game. As Moritt is still suffering from a stiff neck, as the result of rough treatment at the hands of Eugene players, he may not be able to go through the Medford game. This takes out both regular quarterbacks.

Zimmerick, however, who made a good showing in the last of the Eugene game, and who has been working out at quarter all week, will be able to pilot the team unless injured. The team is badly handicapped, however, for reserve strength.

Half sustained an injured shoulder Wednesday night in the only scrimmage of the week, but will be able to go back in the game against Medford if needed. Allen Moore will also be able to start in the game Saturday if he believed, although the plucky captain of the Roseburg squad is still suffering stiffened muscles as a result of his fight against the superior weight of the Eugene team last week.

Altogether the prospects are not as good as earlier in the season. If the team can come through the Medford contest without injuries to any of the players another week of rest will put them in good condition again and they will undoubtedly be able to make a good showing against Marshfield, which plays here on the 30th.

TEXAS TURKEY GROWERS WOULD DOUBLE TARIFF

FORT WORTH, Oct. 22.—The fall meeting of the Texas Poultry, Butter & Egg Ass'n. which met here on Monday, brought about 300 visitors to the city. The main topic of discussion was the turkey crop, which looks especially fine this year, according to Gilbert Herndon of Fort Worth, vice-president of the organization.

A point of particular interest that came up in the discussions was the inroad that turkeys from Argentina are making on the market for domestic stock. The foreign birds are now arriving in shiploads at New York. With the cheap labor in South America, the producers there are able to undersell the turkey raisers in this country. Mr. Herndon said, and this has kept the price of turkeys down. The association went on record as advocating an increase in the duty on turkeys from 6c lb. to 12c lb., which is the duty on butter.

Texas produces 70 per cent of the turkeys raised in the United States, and this year will ship about 11,000 cars to the eastern market. This is a 25 per cent increase over last year. Most of the birds are raised in the southwestern part of the state. Brady is regarded as the turkey capital. As
