Moody Memorial Church Ending First Year

Structure Representing Shrine of Masses Will Celebrate Anniversary Nov. 8.

CHICAGO, Oct. 22.—Erected by a congregation whose scroll counts not a single wealthy patron, a million dollar Romano-Bysantine edifice stands near downtown Chicago as one of America's truly distinctive pieces of church architecture. It is a memorial to the internationally known evangelist, D. L. Moody which will celebrate its first anniversary on November 8.

Colossal yet unpretentious it represents the desire of its congregation and pastor, the Reverend P. W. Phillips, to embody in a building the strong and kindly personality of Moody, the simplicity

of his life, the economy of his organization and a friendly and wholesome atmosphere in which would live the motto of his church, "Ever Welcome to This House of God are Strangers and the Poor."

Six stories high and with exterior and interior of red brick and terra cotta, the Moody Church is semi-circular with a huge half dome covering the church proper. To the right is a two-story office and Sunday School annex. There are seats for 4,000 in the auditorium. Below is an assembly room which seats 1,500, and high to the rear of the auditorium is the pastor's study.

CAMPAIGN FUNDS PROBE TRANSFERS TO KANSAS CITY

(Associated Press-Lead Wire.)

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 23.—Having almost concluded its investigation of charges of Ku Klux Klan control of politics in Indiana, the senate campaign funds committee stood in adjournment today until next Monday, when it will reconvene at Kansas City.

Only three witnesses have been called thus far for the Kansas City meeting. They are Mrs. Vivian Tracy Wheatcraft, a woman Republican leader, Joseph Meyers, formerly of Indianapolis, but now of Kansas City, Mo., and Frederick J. Libby, of New York.

Testimony before the committee has been that Mrs. Wheatcraft formed a women's organization in Indiana to support the candidacy of Senator Watson in the primary campaign early this year, and she is to be questioned about that.

A. Clyde Wall, chairman of the Indiana Republican state committee, has testified that Meyers was the head of an organization which disseminated League of Nations and World Court propaganda in this state, but witnesses who appeared here yesterday declared that he had little funds so far as they knew and no office force while he was in Indianapolis.

WOMAN FOUND IN TRUNK NOT SHOWN POISON VICTIM

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 23.—Investigators were trying today to learn the identity of "Jake," mentioned in the diary left by Mrs. Beata Withers, whose body was found in a closed trunk in her home here Wednesday.

Though the autopsy showed no trace of poison in Mrs. Withers' stomach, tests were being continued to make sure that no poison was present. If none is found death from suffocation would be indicated, as no marks of violence were found.

The diary, devoted principally to telling of Mrs. Withers' love affair with W. R. Frenzle, contained a passage in which she referred to a canoe trip on the Willamette river with "Jake." She followed the account of this incident with the statement that she was "through with Bob," and that she wished she could love Jake as she had loved Bob in the past. Throughout the diary she referred to Frenzle as Bob.
