## WORLD PEACE WEEK IS URGED STARTING NOV. 7

Armistice Day Message  
Sent to Congresses  
by Federal Council.

### WANT ARBITRATION

Many European Nations  
Said to Be Ahead of  
U. S. in Efforts to  
Procure Peace.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—(A. P.)—Declaring the United States, Great Britain and Japan still reserve to themselves the right to resort to war for maintaining their rights and securing their interests, the Federal Council of Churches in an Armistice day message, today called on all the great nations of the world to set up effective agencies for settlement of international disputes by arbitration.

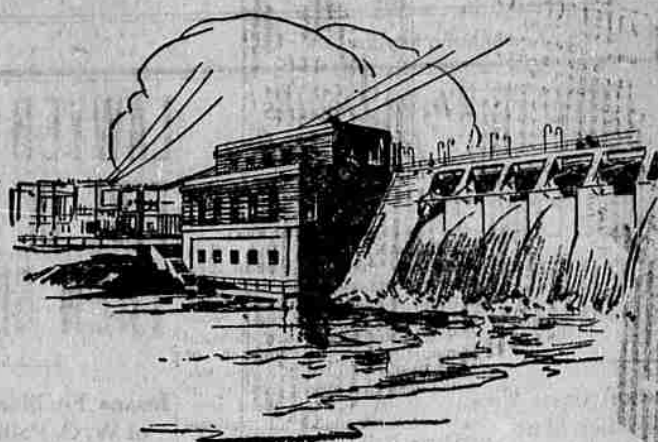
The message, which is being sent to thousands of congregations over the country calling for observance of Sunday, November 7, and of the entire week in behalf of world peace, declared many European nations were "ahead" of the United States in their pledges not to resort to war and unless progress were made toward a general arbitral code the alternative would be "ever increasing competitive preparation for war and recurring wars."

"The United States," the message read, "has a notable record to its credit. It establishes with Great Britain the accord by which, on a 3,000 mile frontier, for over a century, neither government has had a soldier or a foot. It has secured large additions to its territory in ways thoroughly honorable—by purchase. It has settled many serious disputes by arbitration. It has maintained its army at a minimum."

"In the Far East it has pursued a policy that has won substantial friendships. It has agreed with other nations having powerful navies to establish a fixed ratio for capital vessels and, with Great Britain and Japan, it has actually scrapped many powerful battleships. It has steadily set its face against militaristic imperialism. For this record American citizens may well be proud and advocates of world peace grateful."

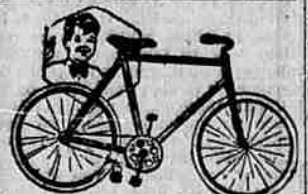

## ROSEBURG TEAM SLAUGHTERED IN MEDFORD GAME

Crippled Local Team in No  
Condition to Meet At-  
tack of Superior Med-  
ford Players.

MEDFORD, Oct. 24.—The Medford high school football team ran amuck against Roseburg Saturday afternoon at Van Scoyoc Field, defeating them 94 to 0, in a game featured by long broken field runs and long forward passes.

Lating, Senn, Newell, Cooks, Del Anderson, Andy Anderson and Fredericks, in the local backfield, behind a fast stepping interference, hindered the visitors throughout the game, for heavy gains. In the last half the locals opened up with a series of forward passes, that either brought them touchdowns, or in striking distance.

"Medford has a wonderful team,"

Coach Turner stated this morning in commenting on the game Saturday. "The team is heavy and fast and is particularly good in running interference. They play clean and beat us fairly."

"Our team was too badly crippled to be able to make a showing. Five of our regular players went out in the first quarter leaving the team seriously weakened, and open to the Medford attack. At the end of the game we had practically all of our substitutes in the field, and Medford put back her heavy first string and with practically no resistance to face chalked up six touchdowns in the last quarter."

"We only had one real chance to score. A 60-yard run from kick-off gave us the ball on Medford's 90 yard line shortly after the game started. We tried a place kick, but the ball was low by inches, and after that we were on the defensive all of the time."

"I want to say this much for our boys, they fought all the time. Crippled and handicapped as they were they did the best they could and never stopped fighting, even when too exhausted to offer any kind of a defense, and when the game was over they ran off the field. They didn't walk off, they ran off, that is, all except the cripples."

"We probably will be defeated by Marshfield next week. Agee is out of the game with a boil infection on his knee, and probably will not be able to get back this season. Moore will not be able to go against Marshfield, and I doubt about some of the others being able to play. This will leave us badly weakened, and as Marshfield defeated Eugene Saturday we do not have very good prospects. We will do the best we can, however, and at least will put up a fight."

"Roseburg played a clean game and was not penalized once during the entire contest."

permanent court of international justice and the sending of representatives to sit with the League of Nations preliminary commission on disarmament.

"American citizens need, however, to guard against undue satisfaction over our national history. A tendency exists in some quarters to exaggerate our virtues and achievements and to ignore our failures and wrong-doings. We have not been quite so altruistic as eulogistic orators have often depicted. Nor have we been altogether free from aggression and the spirit and practice of imperialism."

"And even in regard to our achievements in arbitration there is much misunderstanding. Many of the nations in Europe are ahead of us in their official programs, in their pledges to settle disputes by judicial processes, by arbitration and by conciliation, and in their agreements not to resort to war."

"The senate of the United States has ratified many so-called arbitration treaties; but in none of them has it agreed to submit to arbitration every difficulty regardless of its nature. These treaties merely provide procedures which may be followed in case the senate decides that it is willing that the particular dispute in question shall be settled by arbitration."

"The United States, Great Britain, Japan and several other of the great nations are still unwilling to agree in advance to settle every dispute by processes of peace; they still are unwilling to have their policies and procedures openly questioned at the bar of the world's public opinion; they still reserve to themselves the right to resort to war for maintaining their 'rights' and securing their 'interests'; they still adhere to the doctrine of absolute national sovereignty."

"This general situation makes clear the line along which advance may and now should be made by all the great nations, including the United States."

"The alternative before them is: Either the creation of effective agencies for the settlement of every dispute by arbitration of reason, law and conciliation, with general agreements to use those agencies and solemn undertakings not to resort to war, or ever increasing competitive preparation for war and recurring wars."
